New high speed crop harvest methods tried

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Hot, dry weather in many sections of the country during October gave farmers an opportunity to demonstrate new high rates of speed in completing harvests.

The Agriculture Department pointed to the corn crop as an outstanding example. The corn crop is giant in size, the first to top four billion bushels, with a new record average yield per acre. During October, the corn harvest in the main corn belt areas moved from just starting to well past the peak of harvest.

In Illinois, the department said, corn was 85 per cent picked by the end of October. About one-fourth of the entire Illinois crop of more than 752 million bushels was harvested in a single seven-day period toward the end of the month.

The agency said corn harvest throughout most areas outside the corn belt also moved much ahead of normal stage.

The crop reporting board said soybean harvest was about completed in principal areas in October, except for late plantings and an occasional weedy field where combining was postponed, awaiting a weed-killing frost. Sorghum grain harvest was more than 90 per cent complete in Texas, more than 85 per cent complete in Kansas, and 70 per cent complete in Oklahoma.

The rice harvest was virtually completed early in October in Texas and Louisiana. The Louisiana sugarcane harvest started in mid-October and was about 25 per cent completed in the month.

The department said fruit harvest was nearly completed in most leading areas by Nov. 1.

The crop reporting board said sheep and lambs on feed for market in seven major feeding states totaled 2,089,000 head on Nov. 1. This is 15 per cent, or 355,000 head below the 2,454,000 head on feed in the states on Nov. 1, 1962.

Each of the states showed a decrease in the number on feed from a year ago. California had the greatest decline at 25 per cent. Nebraska decreased 20 per cent. Colorado was off 19 per cent. Kansas declined 12 per cent. Iowa and Texas each was down 9 per cent, and South Dakota decreased 3 per cent.

The crop reporting board said winter wheat acreage available for fall and winter grazing in the central and southern plains will be below the previous two years. In central Kansas and north central Oklahoma, top growth was rated as good on Nov. 1. But in southwestern Kansas, western Oklahoma and the Texas panhandle, wheat growth was rated as only poor to fair.

Icon purchase set by church

NEW YORK (UPI) — A 13th century, emerald-studded icon credited with miraculous powers will be purchased by the Russian Orthodox Greek Catholic Church for \$500,000, a church spokesman said Wednesday.

Its six emeralds are from King Solomon's Mine, and the Russian Czarina donated its crown of diamonds. The icon, called Our Lady of Kazan, was smuggled out of Russia during the Russian revolution.

The announcement of the purchase from the collection of Miss Anna Mitchell-Heddes of Berkshire, England, was made as more than 500 of the church's priests and bishops began their "sabor" or conference which is scheduled to end Friday.

The conference was for the election of members to the Metropolitan Council and the study of reports on bylaws and finances as well as a report from the Most Rev. Metropolitan Leonty, archbishop of New York and metropolitan of all the Americas.

Delegates Wednesday discussed the ramifications unity with the Roman Catholic Church and heard a report on the Ecumenical Council in Rome from the Very Rev. Alexander Scheman.

The 10-by-13-inch icon, presently on display at the Orthodox Cathedral in downtown Manhattan where the conference is being held, is made in gilded silver repousse (reverse hammered).

Controversial British TV program is cancelled

LONDON (UPI) — More controversy today greeted the news that the government-owned British Broadcasting Corp. (BBC) is canceling Britain's most controversial television show, which once made fun of Queen Elizabeth.

"That Was The Week That Was," a ribald, irreverent video satire, will go off Dec. 28 because general elections are scheduled next year, the BBC announced Wednesday.

The cancellation of the show was announced three days after the debut of an American version which was staged by the National Broadcasting Company.

Politics make up a major portion of the show's satire, the BBC explained, and it would be extremely difficult to treat the matter fairly in an election year.

Reaction to the show's demise

was prompt and loud. Sir Cyril Osborne, a Conservative member of Parliament, said he was "damned pleased" it wasn't English at all.

Labour party leader Harold Wilson charged "political pressure" was behind the move but the BBC denied this.

The BBC is a government-owned corporation, financed by annual taxes on radio and television sets. But it operates independently and without direct control of its political content. All of London's daily newspapers put the news in front-page headlines and some charged that the show's death was forced by disgruntled politicians or embarrassed BBC executives.

That Was The Week That Was—which came to be known as TWTWTW and later as simply TW3—based its Saturday night shows on the events of the previous week and evolved a loose-knit cabaret style that was used to poke fun at such sacred institutions as religion and royalty.

AT&T had asked the FCC to interpret the terms as a guide to consideration of special rates for press users of leased telegraph and telephone services.
