Possible test of Nixon status seen in Oregon

SALEM (UPI) — Richard Nixon's availability for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination may be put to the test in Oregon.

The former vice president just might be listed on the Oregon presidential primary ballot.

The possibility adds spice to the politically important Oregon election — and could have an impact on New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation primary.

Under Oregon's unique election law, the secretary of state lists whomever he finds "generally advocated in national news media" on the presidential primary ballot.

The secretary of state doesn't ask the prospective candidate if he wants to be listed, and the candidate has but 72-hours in which to file an affidavit declaring he "is not and does not intend to become" a candidate.

March 6 Key Date

Adding zest to the Oregon primary list is the fact it will be announced March 6, just four days before the New Hampshire primary.

Disavowal statements must be filed by March 9 — the day before the New Hampshire vote. Howell Applegate Jr., a Republican, isn't saying who's going to be on the list.

But it seems likely now that Nixon, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, and Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater would top the list.

Nixon, who missed the White House in 1960 by only 119,000 votes, won the Oregon primary, and carried the state in the general election.

At the Western Republican Conference, held in Oregon last month (Oct. 10-13), both Goldwater and Rockefeller said they thought Nixon was a contender for the GOP nomination.

Oregon's Gov. Mark Hatfield, mentioned both as a GOP vice presidential hopeful and presidential dark horse, says he will not allow his name to be placed on the Oregon primary ballot.

Likely Convention Delegate

Hatfield expects to be a delegate to the national convention. In Oregon, delegates are elected and required to back the winner of the state's primary.

Hatfield used the Western Republican Conference as a platform to invite all GOP hopefuls to enter the May 15 Oregon primary "to try the track for time and distance."

He pointed out "any candidate who is successful in Oregon gains additional momentum to carry him into the California primary a few weeks later and into the convention itself."

Hatfield is following a policy of neutrality.

Because he is required to back the Oregon primary winner, the bigger the field, the stronger Hatfield's position becomes.

And having Nixon in the Oregon race could solve Hatfield's dilemma — the Oregon Primary could reveal whether the former vice president still has voter appeal.

It was Hatfield who nominated Nixon at the 1960 GOP national convention.

Hatfield rated GOP possibility

PORTLAND (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield is rated as a possible nominee for the Republican vice presidential nomination. Sen. Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky, former GOP national chairman, said Thursday.

"In fact," he said, "he could even be a presidential candidate."

Morton, here for a series of weekend speaking engagements, said he did not expect to see a major develop at the Republican national convention but that he would have a better view on this after the March primary in New Hampshire.

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Board of Higher Education adjusts budget \$8 million

SALEM (UPI) — The State Board of Higher Education adjusted its budget by \$8 million Thursday, but its proposals to raise tuition fees and admission standards collided with a new Senate resolution.

The board's cuts — some of them tentative — affected the state's system of universities, colleges, and medical, extension and research services at most levels.

There were two key parts of the board's plan: A general increase in tuition charges next year; and higher admission standards for the fall, 1964, term only at the University of Oregon, Oregon State, and Portland State College.

Under present figures and estimates, the effect of a \$38 per term tuition increase would be to raise \$3 million more outside state funds, making only \$5 million in real cuts necessary.

It also would discourage some students.

Would Defer Some

The effect of temporarily raising freshman admission standards from a 2.0 average to a 2.25 average for the fall term at three institutions would be to defer some students to later terms, detour some students to other colleges in the system, and discourage some altogether.

In essence, the board's plan avoids turning away from the state system next year any stu-

dents who are presently qualified. But it makes it harder and more costly for some of them to get into the school of their choice next fall.

As the board met the Senate Rules Committee voted to permit introduction of a resolution that would direct the board to leave both admission standards and tuition fees where they are now.

If both houses pass the resolution, it would become a directive to the board. It would probably not be legally binding. But if the board defied it, the state would be set for the legislature to strip higher education of some of its independence in 1965.

The board meeting itself was scheduled suddenly in the wake of legislative prodding and threats.

A band of legislators, who for some time have been seeking stricter controls over higher education, said they were strongly displeased over the board's plan to postpone its budget — cutting decisions until after the legislature adjourns.

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AFS exchange student speaks to Bend BPW

Janet Dawson, American Field Service exchange student from England, was guest speaker at the regular dinner meeting of the Bend Business and Professional Women's club Wednesday evening.

Miss Dawson, a Bend High School senior, gave a humorous, informal comparison of her life in England and her impressions of the United States since her arrival here in August.

To attend a co-ed high school after six years in an English girl's school is "simply fantastic," she said. To say nothing of the fast cars — 50 miles an hour is tops in England — the wide-open spaces between towns — the luscious hamburgers, sherbet and coleslaw — and all the many gadgets that make for an easy life here.

Miss Dawson particularly admires our low rambling houses. Her father, a journalist, owns a large six-story mansion-style house which has been converted into flats. She lives in one of these and is used to running up six flights of stairs to her room on the top floor several times a day, besides walking to and from school.

She remarked that here she is getting lazy. Her friends at home are green with envy. Sweat shirts are unheard of in England. These are high on her Christmas list. "America is wonderful!" she concluded.

The president, Mrs. Ken J. Holman, read a letter from Mrs. Vernelle Smith, Springfield, on behalf of the Women's Prison Council, requesting a box of gifts for Rocky Butte women's prison in Portland. All BPW clubs in Oregon have been asked to donate. It was voted to respond with a box by December 1.

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Diabetes detection drive to start here on Sunday

The year-round Diabetes Detection Drive in Bend will start Sunday, the first day of 1963's National Diabetes Week, and will be headed locally by Dr. Robert L. Cutter and C. D. (Bud) Rose as co-chairmen.

The chairmen said that from Sunday through Saturday, a community-wide effort under the direction of the Central Oregon Medical Society will be conducted to test as many as possible for diabetes since over 1,400,000 people in the United States have the condition without knowing it; inform everyone about the symptoms of diabetes, and persuade those whose tests for diabetes are positive to seek medical care as soon as possible.

It was noted that diabetes can be dangerous if not diagnosed and brought under control.

"Our Diabetes Week Committee," Dr. Cutter and Rose said, "urgently requests everyone in the community to respond to the campaign for diabetes testing."
