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Romney's plan for tax law changes beaten

LANSING, Mich. (UPI)—Gov. George Romney's ambitious plan for rewriting Michigan's tax laws lay demolished today, but he refused to concede total defeat for the plan.

Romney, a possible 1964 Republican presidential contender, who had campaigned extensively for support of his fiscal reform program, said "there was more Republican support than ever before for basic tax reform."

The program, which included personal and corporate income taxes, was officially killed Thursday in the House of Representatives, which is controlled by the Republicans by six seats.

Prosperity apparently was a major contributing factor in the program's defeat. With the state riding the crest of an economic boom, few legislators were anxious to test their voter popularity by enactment of an income tax.

But Romney, who last January became Michigan's first Republican governor in 14 years, claimed increased support for tax reforms.

"More citizens and organizations than ever before responded to the call for support," he said. "There has been more general support for tax reform this year than at any time during the six years I have actively engaged in the effort to straighten out Michigan's tax structure."

Romney was active in the tax reform movement before entering politics and while president of the American Motors Corporation.

The governor's reform package centered around adoption of a statewide income tax on individuals and corporations, exemption of groceries and prescription drugs from the 4 per cent sales tax and extension of business and property tax relief.

As in the last two major efforts to rewrite the tax laws—which occurred in 1959 and 1962 under Democratic Governors G. Mennen Williams and John B. Swainson—the income tax proved to be the weak link.

But unlike the efforts of his predecessors, Romney made his fiscal reform move with Michigan in an economic boom.

Romney's plan called for a gross income tax of 2 per cent on individuals, 3½ per cent on corporations and 6 per cent on financial institutions.

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Give yourself lots of time to find a Christmas tree

Planning on picking up the old family axe some evening, after work, to harvest a Christmas tree?

If the tree is to be cut from U.S. Forest Service lands and these are about the only lands that can be legally entered in in quest of a yule tree, better plan for a bit more daylight than the late evening. Trees will not be found in the backyard this season.

This became evident when the Deschutes Forest Service recently released a list of the special areas that have been set aside for cutting Christmas trees, which this year will cost \$1 each.

Two areas have been set aside on the Bend District. One is in the Browns Mountain country, near the Wickiup Reservoir, and the other is in the same general region. They are some 40 or more miles distant from Bend. Lodgepole pine, white fir, will be available.

Areas set aside on the Fort Rock District are in the China Hat country, in the Jones Well region and along the Bonneville power line south of Bend. Local residents will find jackpine along the Bonneville power line, the nearest trees available. First of the trees are on the right of way about two miles south of Lava Butte. From that point, the yule tree strip continues into the south.

Also accessible to residents of Bend and adjacent areas will be the Black Pine Springs acre-

Mme. Nhu goes into seclusion

ROME (UPI)—South Viet Nam's Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu was secluded today behind the walls of a Roman Catholic convent.

She was reunited with her three youngest children when they were brought to the convent Thursday night by Archbishop Ngo Dinh Thuc, her brother-in-law.

The archbishop, in Rome for the Ecumenical Council, is the brother of Madame Nhu's slain husband, Ngo Dinh Nhu, killed in the Nov. 1 military coup.

Madame Nhu arrived Thursday night from Los Angeles with her fourth and oldest child, Le Thuy. Both were drawn and grim, and Madame Nhu, who had been crying when the plane stopped earlier in Frankfurt, appeared on the verge of tears.

The three children who waited here in Rome were Ngo Dinh Trac, 15, Ngo Dinh Quynh, 11, and Ngo Dinh Quen, 4. The two eldest are boys.

Ex-governor faces operation

NEWPORT, Ore. (UPI)—Former Gov. John Hall, 64, of Newport, said Thursday he will enter Good Samaritan Hospital in Corvallis next week for removal of his vocal cords and voice box.

Hall said he has learned he has a low-grade cancer. He said he is scheduled to enter the hospital Wednesday and undergo surgery Friday.

Hall was governor of Oregon in 1947-48. He was speaker of the House when he succeeded to the unexpired term of Gov. Earl Snell who died in a plane crash.

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Yule lighting agreement set

PRINEVILLE — City streets here will have at least a measure of Christmas atmosphere through street lighting during the holiday season.

That was settled at the November meeting of the city council this week, when Ivan Chappell, Chamber of Commerce manager, appeared before the council to ask for the services of one city employee in putting up and removing street decorations.

Both the county and the Pacific Power and Light Co. have each offered the services of a man for the project, Chappell stated. He said it would take about two days to put up the decorations and one day to remove them.

Involved in the process, he said, will be the replacement of some 200 light bulbs which the chamber will purchase. Street decorating in the past several years has been conducted by the Jaycees, in a contract with

the Chamber of Commerce. This year, Chappell said the chamber has not sufficient funds to pay for having the job done. This lack of funds had made it seem, for a time, that city streets would go undecorated in Prineville this year. City officials agreed to furnish the services of an employee to make up a three-man decorating team.

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
