Portland faces gang upsurge

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Metropolitan Youth Commission was warned Friday that the Portland area faces an upsurge of juvenile gang activity with racial undertones.

Portland Police Chief David Johnson made the report at a special session of the commission. Multnomah County Sheriff Donald E. Clark said there were indications the county would be faced with a similar pattern.

"Gangs of juveniles seem to be taking advantage of any opportunity to create a situation where it is unsafe for a person to walk down the street," Johnson said.

He added some of the gangs "have the avowed purpose of assaulting individuals of the opposite race."

Members of the commission, as well as school officials, police and leaders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, agreed that removal of the leaders from gang activity would aid in solving the problem.

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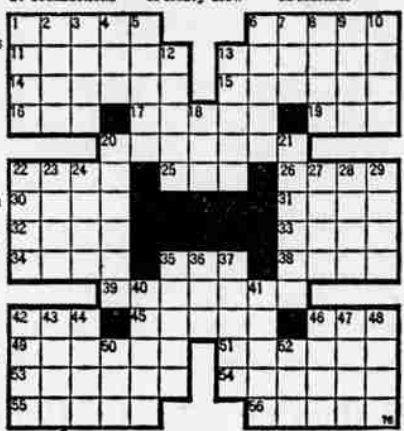

Grid rivalry sparks Athens riot

ATHENS, Ohio (UPI) — Between 300 and 1,000 students, apparently spurred by football rivalry between Bowling Green State and Ohio universities, rioted last night, throwing bottles, jeering police and blocking traffic.

Bowling Green and Ohio clash today in a football game that will decide the Mid-American Conference champion.

City police called for assistance from the Highway Patrol, which sent two cruisers. Traffic was tied up for more than a half-hour, and even after police said the disturbance had been broken up many students from both universities continued to mill in the area.

Assistance was also requested from the Ohio University campus police.

A highway patrolman said he believed some arrests were made, but an officer at city police headquarters said the department was making no statements about the incident. Police Chief J. B. Grogan was not available for comment, nor were Ohio University officials.

No one was believed seriously hurt in the riot, which one officer said may have involved 1,000 students, although several fights broke out.

Another report indicated only about 300 students were involved in the incident. This source said four students were arrested on charges of disturbing the peace, but the arrests could not be confirmed.

"We're making no comment on it," said a city policeman at headquarters when questioned about the riot.

Apparently no major damage was caused by the students.

The Ohio University security force at first reported nothing had happened out of the ordinary for a Friday night — "Just a couple of drunk students," said one officer. Later it acknowledged there had been trouble off campus but no comment.
