Beaverton, Roseburg win in A-1 playoffs

Roseburg edged defending champion Medford 7-6 and Beaverton clubbed Parkrose 19-7 as the Oregon class A-1 high school football playoffs opened Friday night.

Games today sent North Salem to Pendleton and Grant of Portland against West Linn in Portland.

In the class A-2 playoffs, top-ranked Phoenix blasted Douglas 38-0 at Ashland. Action in that division today matched Junction City against Siuslaw at Florence and Woodburn at Vale. North Catholic plays Willamina in Portland tonight.

Alan Young's extra point kick was the margin of victory for Roseburg, which was held to a tie with Cottage Grove for the Midwestern League title this fall. The Indians moved 63 yards in the third quarter with Jim Beamer plunging for the score from the 1-yard line.

Medford moved 69 yards, mostly on Mike Barnes' passing, in the fourth quarter and Jim Cox plunged into the end zone from the 2. Roseburg's line blocked Bill Collins' extra point kick and that was the margin of victory.

Beaverton survived a touchdown by Parkrose in the first five minutes and scored in the first, second and fourth quarters for its victory.

The Beavers drove 82 and 45 yards after Russ Jordan's 25-yard return of a pass interception accounted for their first score.

Phoenix scored at least once in every period on Douglas and held the Trojans to minus 21 yards on the ground. Phoenix also intercepted four passes and recovered two fumbles.

Al Balding 2 up in big \$16,000 Mexican Open

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Using oxygen and a hot driver, Al Balding, the Canadian PGA champion, went into the third round of the \$16,000 Mexican Open today two strokes up on Juan Neri of Mexico.

"The altitude of 8,000 feet has to be taken into consideration on every shot made here," Balding explained. "That ball really travels. My driving kept me in there yesterday. I also used oxygen, which proved to be a big help."

The 39-year-old pro shot a 69 Friday. He overcame four bogeys with seven birdies and missed a hole-in-one by two inches to break out of an opening round tie with Neri, who bagged his second eagle in two days but settled for a 71. Balding's two round total was 136 after a blistering 67 Thursday.

Sugar Ray may interrupt tour after bout tonight

Sugar Ray Robinson may interrupt his current European tour if he fails to make a good showing against Emile Saerens, middleweight champion of Belgium, in a scheduled 10-rounder at Brussels tonight.

"Much will depend on Ray's performance against Saerens," said George Gainford, the former champion's advisor. "It's hard for him to keep in condition while traveling around, changing water and food, and attending reception after reception."

Robinson, though, insists he's in "good shape."

"I wouldn't be fighting if I wasn't," said the 43-year-old New Yorker. "I never went into the ring out of shape."

Sugar Ray, who held the middleweight title five times and would like another shot at the crown, apparently has put on a few pounds while bouncing around Europe. He asked that the weight limit for tonight's fight be raised from the contracted 161½ to 163 pounds.

Trojans take OSU in 28-22 thriller

If today's West Coast gridiron show can match its overture, it should be a solid hit with even the most critical football fans.

Southern California and Oregon State both brought 5-3 records to the Los Angeles Coli-

seum Friday night and the Trojans won a 28-22 thriller.

USC's flashy halfback tandem of Mike Garrett and Willie Brown starred. Garrett, leading rusher in the Big Six, piled up 156 yards and one touchdown. Brown scored on a 54-yard run.

Craig Fertig again filled in well for injured Pete Beathard at the quarterback spot. Fertig clicked on 9 of 20 passes. Trojan Hal Bedsole, who has had a poor season after his All-America fame of 1962, turned in his best game this year and caught a touchdown pass.

Oregon State's attack revolved around the Gordon Queen to Vern Burke passing combination. Queen hit the great receiver for touchdown passes of 12, 22, and 34 yards and now has pitched 16 scoring tosses. This erases the school mark set by Terry Baker last year.

Today's biggest contest also takes place in the Coliseum where Washington can clinch the Rose Bowl bid by dumping UCLA.

Stanford hosts Washington State in more Big Six action, while California faces Utah in what should be an aerial circus unless the weatherman fails to cooperate.

Brigham Young, which lost 12 of its gridgers as a result of disciplinary action this week, faces a University of Pacific team that has lost all of its seven games so far with its squad intact.

Halfback Mel Renfro returns full-time to the Oregon lineup to help make the Ducks the pick over Indiana. He was only available for spot duty against Washington State last week, but still went for 63 yards on six carries.

Fresno State hosts San Jose State in a traditional rivalry. A conference title was partially settled Friday night. The Cal Aggies and Sacramento State, two of four teams tied for the Far West Conference lead, met with the Aggies winning 17-8.

The Aggies will learn how many teams they share the title with today when San Francisco State meets Nevada and Humboldt State battles Chico State. San Francisco and Humboldt were also tied for first going into Friday night's play.

In another contest Friday night, it was Occidental 32 Cal Tech 8.
