

TCU has 'jinx' over Texas... they play today

If Coach Darrell Royal were a superstitious man, he wouldn't even let his University of Texas Longhorns take the field for today's Southwest Conference game with Texas Christian.

True, Texas is unbeaten and untied in eight games this season; granted, the Longhorns are the top-ranked college football team in the nation; and furthermore, Royal's team is playing on its home field in Austin.

Yet, those very circumstances should persuade Royal to move the location of the game, change the opponent, or cancel it. You see, TCU has done nothing more in its last two appearances in the Texas capital than knock Texas from the unbeaten ranks.

That would be in 1959 and 1961, and another "odd" year has rolled around with the two clubs in the exact same positions. The Frogs' Harry Moreland dashed 56 yards to halt the Steers' nine-game winning streak in 1959 and a Sonny Gibbs to Buddy Iles pass shattered a 12-game Texas stranglehold in 1961.

Navy Faces Jinx

Navy, No. 2 in the nation, runs into a jinx of its own in Durham, N.C., where the Middle Tennessee State is 12-point choice but Duke, currently wedged in a three-way tie for the Atlantic Coast Conference lead, hasn't bowed to Navy since 1954 and plastered the Middles 30-9, in their last meeting (1961).

Fifth-ranked Pittsburgh, which was manhandled by Navy earlier this year, attempts to gain some military satisfaction from Army, which enters the important eastern contest a 7-point underdog. In another game with no conference overtones, fourth-ranked Michigan State has an opportunity to further batter Notre Dame's beleaguered forces. The Spartans are 13½-point picks.

In featured Southeastern Conference skirmishes, Mississippi, No. 3, is expected to smother Tennessee with its powerful defense, while seventh-ranked Alabama seeks revenge against rugged Georgia Tech. The Engineers were the only team to knock off Bama last season.

Auburn, No. 10, meets Georgia in another SEC contest. The Plainsmen are still licking their wounds from last week's defeat at the hands of Mississippi State, which dropped Auburn from the unbeaten ranks.

The muddled Big Eight and Big Ten races might clear a little by sundown: sixth-ranked Oklahoma, 4-0 in Big Eight play faces tough Missouri, which has lost only one game in five league matches. Ninth-ranked Nebraska, which leads the Big Eight with a 5-0 mark, is a whopping 16-point favorite over Oklahoma State.

In the Big Ten, Ohio State and eighth-ranked Illinois will attempt to make hay while leader Michigan State is away. The Buckeyes, runnerup in the conference with a 3-0-1 mark, play fading Northwestern. The Illini, 3-1-1, are three-point underdogs to tough Wisconsin at Madison. The Spartans' league-leading mark is 4-0-1.

Washington gets a chance to nail the lid on the Big Six title when the Huskies oppose UCLA, winner of only one of their eight games this year.

In Friday night's major games, Southern California came from behind in the third quarter to defeat Oregon State, 28-22, and Detroit scored the first touchdown against Xavier in the Ohioans' last four games for a 6-0 upset win.

Oregon State quarterback Gordon Queen threw three touchdown passes to end Vern Burke, giving Queen 16 scoring tosses in nine games, breaking the school mark set by Terry Baker last season.

49'ers in top condition for Giant grid tilt

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Giants counted three players "definitely" out today for Sunday's meeting with San Francisco while the Forty Niners are perhaps in the healthiest condition of an injury-plagued season.

The Giants, seeking their sixth straight win, are a 17-point favorite over the Forty Niners, who have had only five players 100 per cent healthy all season.

Missing from the Giants' lineup will be No. 1 fullback Alex Webster, safety Allan Webb and left linebacker Bill Winter. However, three injured New Yorkers came off the injury list — Rosey Brown, offensive left tackle; left corner back Erich Barnes and tight end Joe Walston. All six have had leg miseries.

San Francisco (2-7) will be making its first visit to Yankee Stadium in six years before the usual sellout crowd of 62,000-plus.

The Forty Niners were last here in 1957 when they whipped the Giants, 27-17, behind the passing of quarterback Y. A. Tittle. Sunday, however, Tittle will be on the opposite side of the line.

The 37-year-old quarterback is enjoying his finest season in his 13 year NFL career, making a runaway of the league passing race. He has 140 completions for 1,979 yards, 23 touchdowns and a completion percentage of 62.5 and only three interceptions, in guiding the Giants to a 7-2 record and a first-place tie with Cleveland in the Eastern Conference.

The Forty Niners, who upset Chicago last month and also defeated Dallas, lost starting halfback Bill Kilmer before the season and No. 1 quarterback John Brodie early in the campaign. Linemen Charley Krueger and Walter Rock also received injuries that knocked them out for the year.

Coach Allie Sherman has warned his Giants of the Forty Niners' speed and insists the Prospectors' defense is better than the record of 246 points allowed in nine games would indicate.
