EUGENE (UPI) —Oregon's Ducks, primed by their first victory over a Big Ten opponent, pointed today for dead-end Oregon State in the two team's annual Civil War battle Saturday.

The Webfoots edged the Indiana Hoosiers in Portland last Saturday, 28-22, as a last minute pass with 11 seconds remaining clicked for the Ducks. Quarterback Bob Berry tossed it and flanker back H. D. Mur-

Grant conquered TYV league champ West Linn 18-0 on the Wilson high school turf Saturday. Beaverton kept in the title chase with a 19-7 victory over Parkrose.

In Class A-2 playoffs, Siuslaw of Florence blanked Junction City 13-0 and will meet North Catholic of Portland next weekend.

The Royals rolled over Willamina 33-0 in Portland Saturday.

The other half of the A-2 slate features Vale, 28-20 conqueror of Woodburn, and Phoenix. The Southern Oregon school whipped Douglas 38-0 in a mud-spattered contest at Ashland.

Class B-11-man contests find Jefferson at Yoncalla and Merrill at Wasco. Jefferson upended Knappa 19-0 and Wasco defeated Joseph 51-6.

In Class B, 8 man, Eagle Valley gained the finals by defeating Mt. Vernon 33-27. The Richland school will meet the winner of the Camas Valley-Dufur contest next week. Camas Valley advanced with a 52-0 slaughter of Eddyville.

The Beavers' passing combination of quarterback Gordon Queen and end Vern Burke clicked for two touchdowns in the second period and another in the fourth period, but otherwise Oregon State's passing attack was bottled up.

Grays Harbor gets 13-0 win

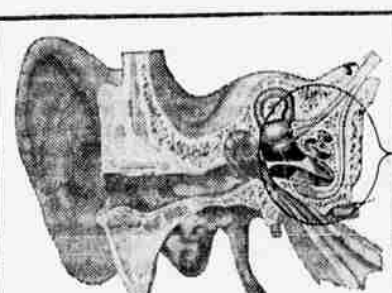
HOQUIAM (UPI) — Quarterback Terry Larson scored both his team's touchdowns to lead the Grays Harbor J.C. Chokers to a 1-0 victory over Wenatchee J.C. in a nonconference football game played in a driving rainstorm Saturday.

Casanova blamed the soggy Multnomah Stadium turf for the slow start on offense all through the first half of the contest.

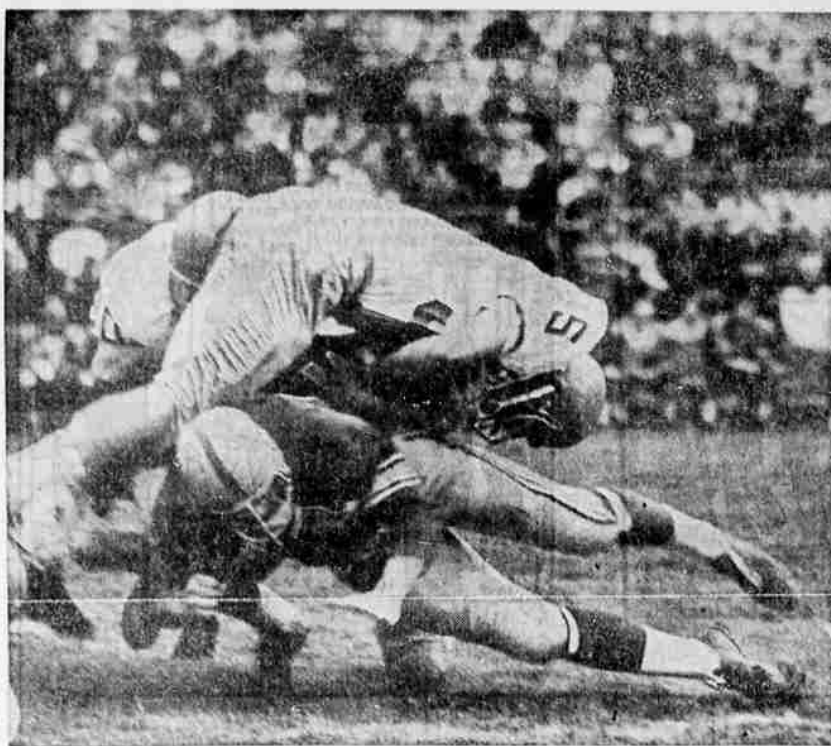
"We couldn't seem to get the ball out of that muck on the baseball end of the field," he said.

After the first half, with the Webfoots trailing 13-6, the game opened up with Oregon collecting 6 points on a Renfro run from 4 yards out then adding another 2 as the all-American halfback went over the top.

In the final period the lead changed hands four times.

Indiana's Rich Badar touchdown from the one put the Hoosier's ahead 19-14. Oregon came back with a 37-yard scoring pass from Berry to Larry Hill; and Indiana drove to the Webfoot 21 and a field goal by Tom Nowatzke put the Hoosier's back in front by one, and finally the desperation play climaxing a 75-yard drive that won it for the Ducks.

Oregon will be in top physical condition for the Beaver encounter at Eugene — Oregon's homecoming. OSU, which dropped a 28-22 thriller to USC last Friday, will be hobbled by a number of injuries suffered in the Los Angeles contest.

Killer frost nips Husky rose garden

SEATTLE (UPI) — As any rose grower knows, you don't force the buds before the dangerous frost is past. The Washington Huskies' rose garden suffered a severe, possibly fatal, case of frostbite Saturday when the UCLA Bruins chilled Washington 14-0 in a football game at Los Angeles.

This upset of the week turned the Rose Bowl race into a three-team affair.

If UCLA, an outfit which previously had squeezed out but one victory this season, should come on to defeat the University of Southern California Trojans, what then? Will the Big Six fantasy representatives, the fellows who will pick the most representative team for the Rose Bowl, deny a late blooming team capable of trimming the Huskies and Trojans on successive Saturdays?

Or, if USC should wind up the season by walloping UCLA while Washington rebounds to victory against the Washington State University Cougars, will it be the Huskies or the Tro-

jans at Pasadena on New Year's Day?

This outcome would give Washington the conference championship with a 4-1 record and a 6-4 record for the season. USC would be 3-1 in conference standings and 7-3 for the season with one of the Trojans' losses a 22-7 thumping absorbed on a muddy field in Seattle.

One thing is clear. Washington cannot afford to lose Saturday if the Huskies have any desire to play again in Pasadena.
