

Schwartzwalder offers East as 'the best' in football

NEW YORK (UPI)—The airborne major from Syracuse leaped squarely on the rest of the nation today with an analysis that Eastern gridiron powers are as good as any in the country.

Part of it is due to a 10-year simmer, for after Ben Schwartzwalder's team was clobbered 61-1 by Alabama in the 1953 Orange Bowl he was accused of doing the East irreparable damage. Not even a national championship team unbeaten in 1959

and a Cotton Bowl victory over Texas erased the sting.

"I'm glad I've seen it come back," grunted the former paratrooper with pointed inference as he took a lusty swing at both the South and Midwest and included everybody else who wanted in.

"Just look at the intersectional record of about six teams and you'll see what I mean," said forthright Ben, pointing to the football exploits of his own Syracuse, Navy, Army, Pitt, Penn State and Boston College. "Those six have won 31 inter-

sectional games against only four defeats. It's a pretty good record."

It is, too. Intersectionally, Navy is 7-1; Army is 5-1; Pitt 5-0; Penn State 6-0; Syracuse +1, and Boston College 4-1.

And they didn't do it against a complete bunch of humpties, either. For the list of victims include such as Michigan, Ohio State, Duke, Maryland, West Virginia, Notre Dame twice, Air Force, UCLA, Washington, California, Oregon, Oregon State and Rice.

"Look at it this way," said

Ben, "Florida beat Richmond by one touchdown. Then Florida beat Alabama. Then we 'nosed out' Richmond."

Syracuse "nosed out" Richmond by 50-0.

"We gained a few yards against Richmond," Ben elaborated, "although Richmond brought along a couple of Richmond officials who knew their style of play. It only cost us 138 yards in penalties and three touchdowns. I'd like to see our people work out the same system. We've good officials in Syracuse I'd like to take along

with us when we go away.

"However," he pointed out the Syracuse superiority, "we managed to keep 469 yards."

Asked what Syracuse was doing wrong to incur so many penalties, Schwartzwalder shrugged:

"We looked at the films and we're wondering, too."

Schwartzwalder, who defends his straightaway playing strategies with the simple statement that his club is "dedicated to moving people," quoted Notre Dame scout Bill Early to prove that straight football is played

by the always highly regarded Big Ten, too.

"Early tells me that the reverse is unheard of out there," Schwartzwalder needed, "and they think the screen pass is a trick play."

The rugged Syracuse coach said he felt it was "enlightening" that whereas some years ago there might be one Eastern team high in national ratings, "the record proves that the number at the top has increased remarkably."

"There's ample evidence in our intersectional victories," he

added, "and it also proves that intersectional play is an equalizer in itself. This way every section sees the best from every other section and copies the best. So why shouldn't the East be as good as any."

Ben's men go against Notre Dame at Yankee Stadium on Thanksgiving Day and he'll get another chance to prove his claim. You can bet the boys from Syracuse will be ready. Intersectional games are a "jump" sign to the old paratrooper.

Sellout crowd of 90,000 to watch 66th annual 'Big Game'

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—California has a mediocre 4-1 football record this season. Stanford has a sad 2-7.

But the 66th annual "Big Game," to be played at Stanford on Saturday will have its usual sellout crowd of 90,000 on hand.

Not only that but coach Marv Levy of Cal and John Ralston of Stanford both expect to win it. So it may end in a tie.

Ralston, a line-backer at Cal, was on the squad for four "Big Games" right after World War

Wilt hard to jilt from NBA scoring records

NEW YORK (UPI)—Wilt Chamberlain and the National Basketball Association scoring lead are a hard combination to separate.

Chamberlain embarked on a campaign to concentrate on playmaking for the San Francisco Warriors this season and thus his point production isn't as prodigious as in previous years. But with each passing week his name is becoming more evident among the scoring leaders.

Big Wilt now has the best scoring average in the league with a 32.1 mark and is the only player to show a field shooting average over .500. In last week's action, Chamberlain advanced from fourth place to second in point production with 44.

Jerry West of the Los Angeles Lakers is the scoring leader with 456 points, but he has played in two more games than Chamberlain and has a 28.5 average. Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks, who became the second player in NBA history to surpass 18,000 career points, has 449 points this season with a 28.1 average.

Oscar Robertson of the Cincinnati Royals is fourth in scoring with 415 points and Elgin Baylor of the Lakers has 392.

Chamberlain's field goal percentage is .506, and he is followed by Jerry Lucas of the Royals with .497 and Terry Dischinger of the Baltimore Bullets with .491.

John Egan of the Detroit Pistons is the new free throw leader with an .878 percentage and Robertson is far ahead in assists with 148.

Chamberlain also jumped from third place to first in rebounding with 313 and an average of 22.4 per game. However, Bill Russell of the Boston Celtics, runnerup in actual rebounds with 306, has played in two less games than Chamberlain and has a better average with 25.4.

II, and came back as an assistant coach for three more and has a 5-1-1 record. And this is Levy's fourth Big Game battle.

"I'm confident we can win it," says Ralston, possibly with tongue in cheek in view of how his boys looked like prep school lads in being drubbed by Washington State in their last outing.

"I'm also confident that on a given day we could defeat any college football team in America."

The Indians won't have to be that good—because Cal doesn't rate in the top ten listings. But Stanford will have to improve.

"Cal has scored 81 points in its last three games," says Ralston. "I have to figure they have one of the finest offenses in the West."

Levy didn't disagree with that as the coaches unfolded very few of their battle plans to the Northern California Football Writers luncheon.

"We'll be meeting the biggest and fastest line we've faced all season," said the Cal coach. "But I think we can win. We don't go into games believing we'll lose."

Levy gave a big build-up to his quarterback, Craig Morton, and the writers chose him as the "Northern California Back of the Year." Marv Harris of Stanford got the same accolade among the linemen. And Pat Malley of Santa Clara was named the region's outstanding coach of the year.

Other coaches at the session pointed out that the Stanford-California game wasn't the only one in the region on Saturday.

At the same time as the "Big Game," San Francisco State, co-champion of the Far West Conference, closes out its season in a battle against San Diego State, co-king of the California Collegiate Athletic Association.

And that same night, Santa Jose State plays host to University of Pacific in another traditional game that dates back a half century.

'Hot' Big 10 race to push champion Loyola

CHICAGO (UPI)—Defending NCAA champion Loyola could dominate Midwestern college basketball again this season, but the Ramblers, who lost only twice last year, probably will have to share interest with one of the hottest Big Ten races ever.

Michigan and Ohio State rated a shaky nod for the Big Ten crown in pre-season speculation but league balance this year may be the best in a score of years and upsets more or less routine.

Northwestern, Minnesota, Indiana and Illinois could be major Big Ten challengers and Iowa, Michigan State, Purdue and Wisconsin, while probable second division finishers, could be capable of surprise at any time.

Loyola lost only one man from its firehorse five which won the NCAA crown from two time champion Cincinnati in an overtime, Jerry Harkness, but George Ireland has his other four starters back and Vic Rouse, Leslie Hunter and John Egan will have better bench strength behind them than ever.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Winning isn't everything to IC-4A cross-country champion Vic Zwolak if it comes without perfection.

The Villanova student has everything to be proud of after breaking his own meet record for the five-mile Van Cortlandt Park course Monday with a time of 24 minutes, 46.8 seconds and winning the IC-4A title for the second straight year.

Instead, Zwolak complained of a pain in his right side and a "stupid" race that prevented him from recording a time of 24:20 as he had planned. The 5-foot, 9-inch Zwolak established the old record of 24:47.3 last year.

Despite Zwolak's heroics, Villanova was unable to retain the team crown, which went to Notre Dame. The well-balanced Irish squad placed five men among the first 20 finishers for a low total of 55 points. Brown was second in the university division with 133 points, followed by Michigan State (154), Villanova (158) and Rutgers (193).

Zwolak, whose next stop is the NCAA championship at East Lansing, Mich., next Monday, finished 100 yards ahead of Steve Machooka of Cornell. Machooka, an exchange student from Kenya, Africa, who won the IC-4A crown in 1961, was clocked in 25:08.

Bill Clark of Notre Dame was third by just another yard with a time of 25:09, and he was followed by sophomore Richard Sharkey of Michigan State in 25:13 and Frank Carver of Notre Dame in 25:28.

Paul Minehan of La Salle College retained his title in the college division varsity race won by La Salle in 26:30.6.

GET TWO PLAYERS

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—The Cincinnati Wings of the Central Professional Hockey League, seeking their first win in their new home, acquired center Ken Laufman and right-winger Ron Leopold Monday from the Portland Bucs of the Western League in exchange for center Sid Finney. Leopold was assigned to Cincinnati for only one year under the terms of the trade.

Jack Kemp and Bill Miller of Buffalo regained first place this week in passing and pass-catching, respectively. The other individual leaders were the same as last week's — Clem Daniels of Oakland in rushing, Jim Frazier of the Denver Broncos in punting and Gino Cappelletti of Boston in scoring.

Record is set by legislature
