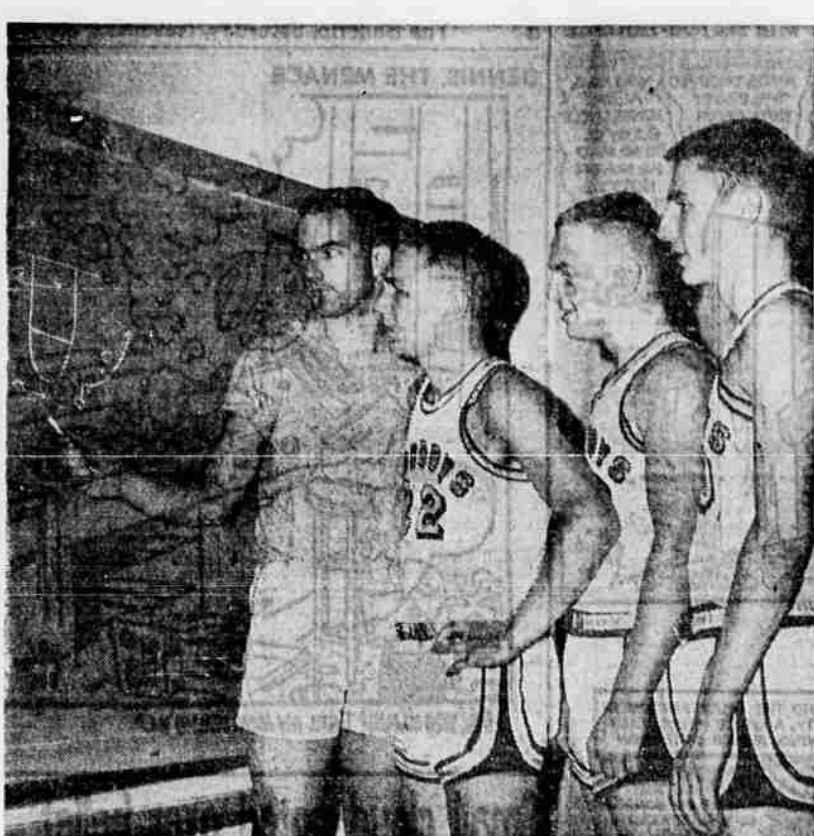

'Civil War' postponed...

EUGENE (UPI) — The Oregon - Oregon State football game will be played here next Saturday instead of today because of the death of President Kennedy.

The announcement was made jointly Friday afternoon by the school's presidents, Dr. Arthur S. Flemming and Dr. James H. Jensen of Oregon State.

Oregon is listed as a slight favorite. Both teams will rest until Monday.

All Big Six games also were postponed.

National sports leaders today express shock

National sports leaders today expressed shock, anguish and sorrow over the assassination of President Kennedy, a man who was an athlete in his youth and a sports fan throughout his life.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick voiced his grief in solemn tones.

"I can say little because I am terribly shocked," Frick said. "The death of President Kennedy is a terrible blow."

Frick said he and the President were neighbors for a time in Bronxville, N.Y., "and we were all fond of him."

Pete Rozelle, commissioner of the National Football League, expressed "deep shock" at the tragedy.

American Football League Commissioner Joe Foss said: "It is difficult at this time to comprehend the full impact of President Kennedy's loss as a man as well as the head of our government. Words are useless at a time such as this. The magnitude of his loss can only be measured by time and his accomplishments as a heroic serviceman and a devoted servant of our country. Our sympathy is with the Kennedy family in its hour of bereavement."

The late President had also been a vital force in bringing together the warring amateur sports bodies, the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Amateur Athletic Union, for a cohesive effort toward fielding a strong United States team in the 1964 Olympics.

Walter Byers, executive director of the NCAA said Kennedy's "vigor, his leadership and his inspiration are qualities which will forever endure."

Tom Hamilton, executive director of the Big Six Conference on the West Coast, expressed a deep loss to the nation and to the people in the world of sports.

"Mr. Kennedy was most interested in the Olympic Games and in all other sports," Hamilton said.

Art Rooney, owner of the National Football League's Pittsburgh Steelers, said "it was shocking when I first heard it and hard to believe. It was a terrible tragedy."

Hubbard named top Waltonian

PORTLAND (UPI) — Richard L. Hubbard of Portland will receive an award as "Waltonian of the Year" from the Oregon Division of the Izaak Walton League of America tonight.

The presentation is scheduled to be made at an awards banquet at the conclusion of the state organization's 41st annual convention.

Lewis & Clark places two on UPI Little All-Coast Team

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The greatest collection of gridders ever to perform for the West's small colleges—many of them headed for the pro ranks—was named to the 1963 United Press International Little All-Coast College Football Team today.

Every man was a star for his club and some of the statistics of these lightly-publicized stars are fantastic.

Long Beach State, Lewis & Clark in Oregon and Central Washington each placed two men on the first team.

Heading the cast was fabulous Beau Carter, Fresno State's great signal caller.

"He's the best quarterback we've played against all season," said Coach Bob Titchener of San Jose State, "and that includes Craig Morton of California."

Petit seeking to regain NBA scoring crown

Bob Pettit would like nothing better than to regain his old National Basketball Association scoring title from Wilt Chamberlain.

Pettit, the high-flying hawk from St. Louis, led the point parade in 1958-59 and then faded from the spotlight as Chamberlain entered the scoring stage.

Chamberlain dominated the scene from his rookie year in 1959-60 through last season, but now has run into some determined competition.

Pettit, who this week followed Dolph Schayes as only the second man in NBA history to achieve a career total of 18,000 points, took over the individual scoring lead through Thursday's games.

The former Louisiana State star pumped in 44 points for a total of 493. Chamberlain of San Francisco has 469 and Jerry West of Los Angeles, the leader earlier this week, has 491 points.

This trio's scoring feats reflect the standings in the Western Division. Los Angeles leads second place St. Louis by a half game and third place San Francisco is a game back of the leading Lakers.

Boston, as usual without a scorer in the top 10, tops the Eastern Division with a 12-1 record, 4½ games in front of second place Cincinnati.

Friday's full schedule was postponed in deference to the death of President Kennedy.

Final 2 rounds are postponed

Grant beats Roseburg in A-1 prep playoff Friday

Grant of Portland ground its way into the finals of the Oregon Class A-1 high school football playoffs Friday night with a 19-14 victory over Roseburg.

The Generals' victory at Roseburg sent them into next weekend's championships against the winner of tonight's Beaverton - North Salem game at Salem.

The latter contest was postponed from Friday night as a result of the assassination of President Kennedy. The Grant-Roseburg game went on as scheduled because the Portland team already had started for the Douglas County city, the Oregon School Activities Association said.

Grant drove 71 yards for the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter, with Karl McDade getting the touchdown on a 2-yard run.

Roseburg jumped into a 7-0 lead on Jim Beamer's 63-yard run in the opening minutes, but the Generals tied the score on 27-yard scoring pass from McDade to Craig Pienett. A 25-year-run by Jeff Kempe gave Grant a 13-7 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Roseburg regained the lead at 14-13 in the third quarter with Beaver scoring again on a 4-yard run. That set the stage for Grant's winning drive.

All action in the state class A-2, B, and eight-man playoffs was scheduled this afternoon.

Some exceptions Sporting events get postponements

The sports world reacted to the assassination of President Kennedy with postponements and cancellations that reduced weekend activity to about a score of college football games plus some pro basketball and pro football games.

There also will be horse racing at some tracks and a normal National Hockey League schedule unless President Lyndon Johnson declares an official period of national mourning. In that event, indications are that virtually the entire weekend sports schedule will be postponed or cancelled.

Some 30 college football cancellations included such games as Yale vs. Harvard, Dartmouth vs. Princeton, Wisconsin vs. Minnesota, Indiana vs. Purdue, Air Force vs. Colorado and Kansas State vs. Oklahoma State. Several of the 30-odd games effected have been or may be rescheduled.

AFL To Be Idle
Three of the National Basketball Association's four Saturday night games will be played unless President Johnson declares a national mourning period and the National Football and National Hockey leagues will play their regular Sunday schedules. The American Football League, however, postponed its entire weekend card.

Flat and harness racing at all New York state tracks was cancelled until next Tuesday at the request of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and a Friday night television fight at Madison Square Garden was postponed.

The most important sports event of the weekend will be the Michigan State-Illinois football game today which will determine the Big 10 football championship and a Rose Bowl bid. Officials of the two schools rejected a suggestion by Gov. George Romney of Michigan that the game be postponed or cancelled.

No Football Telecasts
Army and Navy cancelled all sports activity scheduled for today, but there was no decision whether the annual inter-service football classic scheduled for Nov. 30 in Philadelphia will be played.

"We will have to wait and see whether there is a reasonable time after the funeral," said a West Point spokesman. President Kennedy's funeral is scheduled for Monday.

The only sport with events in progress at the time of Mr. Kennedy's death was horse racing.
