

Thunderbird sale reported

Mr. and Mrs. Elmer A. Kohler, Canby, are new owners of the Thunderbird Club and Motel, on Highway 97 north of Bend. They purchased the business from Mr. and Mrs. Jack Fuls for a price understood to be in excess of \$400,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Fuls and their two children, Juliana, 11, and Jon, 5, plan to leave in February for an extended vacation, or possible permanent residence, in Australia.

The Kohlers' eldest son, Larry, is the general manager for the new owners. He and his wife and children, Vicky, 2, and David, 1, have moved to Bend and are living temporarily at the motel. The elder Kohlers are planning to move here later.

Elmer Kohler, who handles real estate investments, also operates a 60-acre cattle ranch near Canby, and for the past year, has owned the Silver Saddle Motel in Lakeview. He is reportedly considering purchase of a cattle ranch in Central Oregon. His Canby cattle operation is the Molalla River Cattle Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl M. Wheeler are managing the club for the new owners, and Mrs. Lois Hanson is continuing as resident manager of the motel.

Mr. and Mrs. Fuls have owned the Thunderbird Club, formerly Glen Vista, for the past eight years, acquiring it from the Bend Investment Co. a year after it was built. The motel and swimming pool were built five years ago.

Fuls became acquainted with the island areas near Australia in World War II, when he was in the Navy, and has always wanted to return "down under," at least for a visit, he said.

Area joins in mourning JFK

Central Oregon joined the nation and the world today in paying homage to John Fitzgerald Kennedy on this day of mourning.

In Bend, flags continued at half staff, whipped by a mild breeze from mountain snowfields. Clouds partly covered skies that were star-decked in the pre-dawn hours.

Services were held at many churches in Bend this morning, with large numbers attending the memorial rites. At St. Francis Catholic Church, the third requiem high mass in three days was celebrated.

Downtown Bend this morning was virtually lifeless as thousands remained home to watch the final rites honoring the President who was assassinated in Dallas, Tex., on Friday.

Bend's major industry, the milling of timber, came to a full halt today, with the big Brooks - Scanlon, Inc., plant joining in the national tribute to President Kennedy.

Schools were closed in Central Oregon, and throughout the state. Locally and in other Mid-Oregon towns, all federal, state and local offices and virtually

all places of business were closed.

There will be no classes at Central Oregon College tonight, Don P. Pence, president, said.

The Bend High School play, "Night of January 16," will be presented Tuesday, November 26. Curtain time will be at 8:15 p.m., in the school auditorium. This will be the only evening performance, according to Mrs. William Bauer, director. Both scheduled performances were canceled.

Bend chapter No. 109, Order of Eastern Star, will meet tonight at 8 o'clock at the Masonic Temple, as scheduled. However, the initiation originally scheduled for this meeting, has been postponed.

Norlin said formal notification of the new meeting date will be sent to all members.

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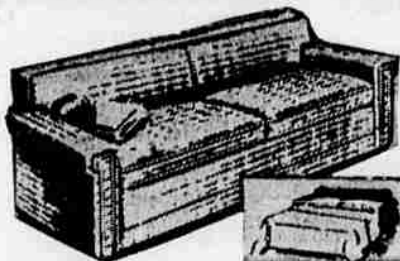


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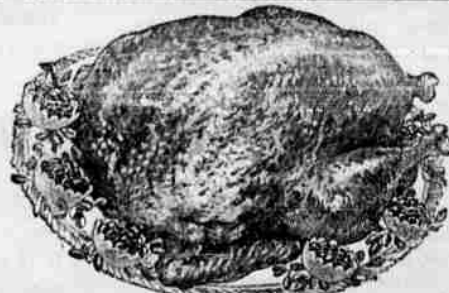


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
