

'Watch out for Wichita' — cry Midwest coaches

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Watch out for Wichita. That's the new warning being sounded by basketball coaches throughout the Midlands before the season even opens. Even Cincinnati Coach Ed Jucker, whose teams have dominated the Midlands since 1958, agreed that the reign of his potent Bearcats apparently ended when they lost their bid for a third consecutive NCAA cham-

ampionship last March to Loyola of Chicago. "Wichita should lead the whole parade in the Midlands now," said Jucker. Whether Wichita can rule the Midlands with the iron hand that Cincinnati wielded is yet to be determined. But coaches in both the Missouri Valley and the Big Eight conferences, during a recent meeting here, agreed that Wichita is the team to beat. In the Big Eight Conference,

the coaches indicated they are most concerned about the potential of Kansas State and Oklahoma State. But the eyes of the Midlands coaches are on Wichita as a team and on 6-foot-7 Dave Stallworth as an individual. Stallworth is the lad who led Wichita to a 19-8 record last season, good for sixth place in the final 1963 national rating, and to two stunning upsets—over no lesser teams than Loyola of Chicago and Cincinnati.

Wichita loses only center Wayne Durham next season, although guards Leonard Kelley and Ernie Moore will be available for only one semester each. Cincinnati, on the other hand, loses Tom Thacker, his fellow playmaker Tony Yates, and Larry Shingleton. Bonham and 6-foot-8 center George Wilson will be back, however, and Jucker has a strong crop of sophomores. The Big Eight coaches saw no particular favorite in their

league, which they feel will be stronger. But Oklahoma State Coach Hank Iba sounded a warning of his own. "We have a lot of potential," he believes. "This is the best squad we've had since we entered the league." Oklahoma State returns its top four scorers, including All-Conference guard Larry Hawk, from the team that posted a 16-9 record last season.

Kansas State and Colorado, which currently share the Big Eight championship, both have All-Conference players returning. But Colorado, the nation's ninth-ranked team in 1963, lost Big Eight player-of-the-year Ken Charlton. Colorado still has Jim Davis, another All-Conference selection, and Kansas State has All-Conference Willie Murrell. Both are forwards. Tex Winter of Kansas State,

Dick Harp of Kansas and Bob Vanatta of Missouri said their teams would be improved this year. The only teams that appeared to be out of the running were Iowa State, Nebraska and Oklahoma. The strongest independent in the Midlands was expected to be Oklahoma City University, as usual. Coach Abe Lemons will have back the core of his 1962-63 edition, which finished the season with a 19-10 record.

Lewis & Clark fails to get bowl bid

PORTLAND (UPI) — Lewis and Clark football players, disappointed at not receiving a bid to compete in the NAIA playoffs, turned in their suits today. The team had been working out since completing the regular season with an 8-0 mark in hopes of landing a berth. But the NAIA today announced College of Emporia, Kan., and Prairie View A&M of Texas were picked for the final two spots in the four-team playoff. Lewis and Clark had an 8-0 record.

"Well, that's it," Coach Joe Huston said when he was notified.

Navy's Roger Staubach gets All-American quarterback honor

CHICAGO (UPI) — Roger Staubach of Navy today was named quarterback of the 1963 college All-America football team selected by the American Football Coaches Association. The Midwest, however, dominated the first team with three selections. The Far West, Southwest and Midlands had two each. Staubach was the eastern representative and Duke halfback Jay Wilkinson, son of the Oklahoma coach, was the South's only choice.

Center Dick Butkus of Illinois, end Jim Kelly of Notre Dame and tackle Carl Eller of Minnesota were the Midwest choices. Vern Burke, an Oregon State end, and Dick Redman, a Washington guard, were the Far West representatives while tackle Scott Appleton of Texas and fullback Tommy Crutcher of Texas Christian represented the Southwest. Guard Bob Brown of Nebraska and halfback Gale Sayers of Kansas completed the first team. Staubach also was named the back of the year and Appleton the lineman of the year. Brown was cited as the best college blocker of the season. The 1963 team is composed of

Texas' football reign rivaled by 50's Sooners

NEW YORK (UPI) — The seven-week reign of the Texas Longhorns atop the college football rankings has been rivaled only by the famed Oklahoma Sooners of the mid '50s. Sporting a perfect 9-0 record, Texas today was ranked No. 1 for the second consecutive week by 32 of the 35 coaches comprising the United Press International rating board.

Michigan State and Nebraska made major advances in the ratings this week. The Spartans forced Mississippi out of third place for the first time in a month by a single point, with Pittsburgh a very close fifth. Nebraska replaced Oklahoma in sixth after defeating the Sooners for the Big Eight championship and Orange Bowl invitation. Nebraska, ranked ninth last week, shoved the Sooners to 10th. Navy nailed down the runner-up position to Texas for the

third week running, receiving two first-place ballots.

Alabama (No. 7) and Illinois (No. 8) remained stationary, and Auburn moved up a notch to ninth with its victory over Florida State.

Not since 1956, when Oklahoma held first place for nine of the 10 weeks the ratings were conducted, has one team so dominated the scene as the current Longhorns.

Syracuse again led the second 10 in 11th place followed by Arizona State (No. 12), Penn State (No. 13) and Mississippi State (No. 14)—the same trio it headed last week although in inverted order.

Wisconsin gained a step to 15th, Southern California and Kansas rated 16-17, respectively and Memphis State, North Carolina, Baylor and Utah State knotted for 18th.

NAIA selects two teams from Southwest to vie for bowl tiff

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics today announced selection of College of Emporia (Kan.) and Prairie View (Tex.) A&M as the third and fourth teams to compete in semifinal playoffs for the NAIA football championship.

Last week, St. John's (Minn.) and Kearney (Neb.) State were chosen for the playoffs. A. O. Duer, NAIA executive secretary, said Kearney (9-0) and Prairie View (8-0) would meet Dec. 7 at Kearney, Col. College of Emporia (10-0) and St. John's (8-0) will meet this Saturday at Metropolitan Stadium in Minneapolis.

Winners of the playoff games will collide Dec. 14 in the Camellia Bowl at Sacramento, Calif. Winner of that game is regarded as the nation's small college football champion. Northern Illinois (9-0), ranked

No. 1 in today's final NAIA football ratings, could not participate in the playoffs because conference rules prohibit the school from competing after November.

St. John's finished second in the balloting, followed by Kearney in the No. 3 spot and College of Emporia and Prairie View tied for fourth.

After that came Northeastern Oklahoma (10-0) in sixth place, Southwest Texas State (9-0-0) in seventh and Lewis & Clark (Ore.) (8-0) in the No. 8 spot. Rounding out the top 10 are Central Washington State (9-0) and Florida A&M (7-1).

Rabbit disease breaks out

SALEM (UPI) — The State Department of Agriculture today reported an outbreak of a virus-caused disease among rabbits in the Rogue River area in Southern Oregon.

Dr. R. A. Bennett, disease investigator, said some rabbit breeders in the area estimated "a loss of adult rabbits in excess of 500."

The department identified the disease as myxomatosis. It said the disease had characteristics similar to some forms of cancer and was spread by biting insects.

It apparently affects only rabbits, the department said. There is no known cure or immunization for the disease.

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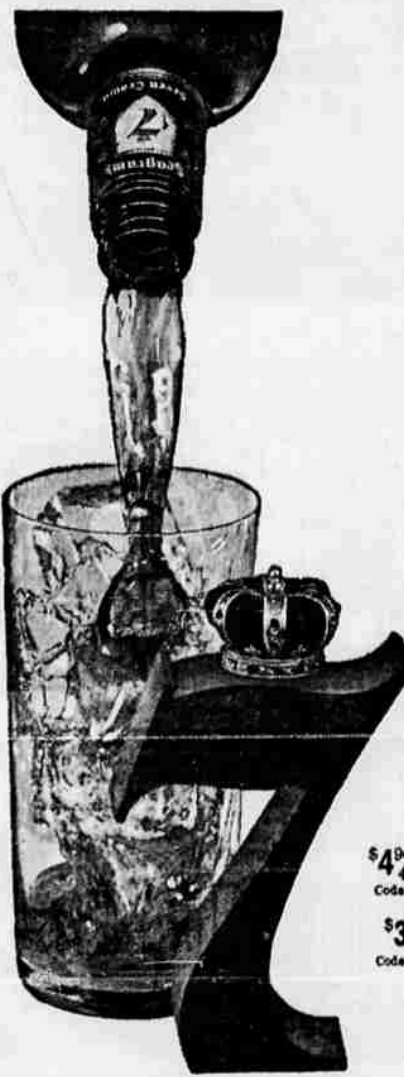


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
