

New president seen boost for Western Demos

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's elevation to the leadership of the nation is expected to help some hard-pressed 1964 Senate Democratic candidates—especially in his native West.

For Johnson, born and bred in Texas and seasoned in Washington, "talks the language" of the West. He has crisscrossed the area in past campaigns for present incumbents and others. And this region contains the Democratic Senate seats which have been regarded as most in jeopardy.

Twenty-four Democrats and nine Republicans are up for reelection next year. Unlike most tests for the Democrats, only three of the seats are in the so-called "Solid South."

Democrats have been most worried about the West—Utah, Wyoming, California and North Dakota. Even Texas, with one Republican senator, has been shaky Democratic ground.

Two In Danger

Two Western Democrats who have been viewed as in danger from the GOP drive to narrow the 67-33 Democratic margin in the Senate are Sens. Gale McGee of Wyoming and Frank E. Moss of Utah.

McGee said today that even though GOP strength had been over-estimated and President Kennedy had "surprising" support in Wyoming, "President Johnson can only increase what we have."

"Lyndon Johnson is a Westerner," he said in an interview. "He talks our language—cattle and oil. Wyoming has always been ready to identify itself with Johnson."

Throughout the West, Democrats contend, Johnson would draw votes from the segments of population attracted to Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., the GOP presidential front-runner.

Kennedy Preferred
McGee said that a "secret" GOP poll on Wyoming political tides, conducted for the Sept. 3-11 period, showed Kennedy preferred over Goldwater by a 3 to 2 margin.

He said Democrats "stumbled" on the Republican poll, which he claimed also showed him favored 8 to 7 over any of six Republican senatorial prospects.

The poll findings, he said, ran contrary to press speculation that Wyoming was almost a push-over for the Republicans. California's Sen. Clair Engle, D-Calif., has been recuperating from brain surgery and is a question mark for reelection.

Other Western Democrats facing reelection contests include Sens. Quentin R. Burdick, N.D., Howard W. Cannon, Nev., Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., Henry M. Jackson, Wash. and Ralph Yarborough, Tex.

Fishing treaty said one-sided

SEATTLE (UPI)—The president of one of Japan's largest fishing companies said here Tuesday his country considers the present North Pacific fishing treaty one-sided.

Koichiro Kobayashi, 66, outlined his nation's fishing policies. He said the Japanese fishing industry was conservation-minded and added he regretted the American image of Japan as a nation which plunders fisheries stocks.

The present treaty bars Japan from fishing for all salmon and most halibut east of 175 degrees west longitude in the North Pacific. Kobayashi said Japan considers this line inequitable and they think it extends the territorial waters of the United States and Canada to the middle of the ocean.

Kobayashi said what Japan wants in place of the abstinence principle of the present treaty is some joint conservation measures.

He suggested a quota system or a regulation of fishing times.

Brooks-Scanlon offers top bid

Brooks - Scanlon, Inc., Bend, was successful bidder for an estimated 21,400,000 board feet of timber in the Dugout Lake area of the Sisters district at an auction here Tuesday afternoon.

Bidding against Brooks-Scanlon for the high eastern Cascade stumpage was the Sweet Home Veneer, Inc., of Sweet Home. Representing the west-side firm in the bidding was Vernon B. Geil, president. Hans Milius represented Brooks-Scanlon.

The bidding took place in the Deschutes National Forest office.

Minimum acceptable bid for the mixed timber was set at \$376,865. Fifteen different bids by Brooks - Scanlon and the Sweet Home firm boosted the final total to \$403,845.

The area holds 14,200,000 board feet of ponderosa pine, minimum acceptable price for which was set at \$23.45 per thousand. Minimum acceptable price for the 6,900,000 board feet of white fir and other species in the area was placed at \$6.05 per thousand. Also in the stand is an estimated 300,000 board feet of lodgepole pine, with \$7.10 the minimum price.

The stumpage is west of Sisters and north of the McKenzie Highway. The western edge of the stand touches the McKenzie lava fields. Dugout Lake, from which the area gets its name, is at the edge of the lava beds.

Logging of the area by the Bend firm will start late in the 1964 season.

Planes drive off Red guerrillas

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI)—Fighter-bombers drove off an estimated 200 Viet Cong guerrillas today after the Communists attacked an American-Vietnamese Special Forces camp near the Cambodian border, about 120 miles south of here, a military spokesman reported.

Three American advisers were wounded slightly in the attack, which was launched in broad daylight, the spokesman said.

The spokesman said Viet Cong losses could not yet be determined but reports from the camp said the planes struck with great accuracy and the results appeared "excellent."

The attack was the second by the Viet Cong on a Special Forces camp in four days. U.S. military sources Tuesday said U.S. Army helicopters firing rockets and machine guns killed 45 guerrillas in counter-attacks against the Viet Cong battalion that captured four Americans on Sunday.

The Viet Cong battalion had overrun a Special Forces training camp 20 miles west of Saigon early Sunday. Villagers nearby saw the guerrillas take three of the Americans with them when they fled, a military spokesman said. The whereabouts of the fourth American, believed wounded, was not known.

The main counter-strike began Monday when U. S. Army HU-1B helicopters using rockets and machine guns killed 15 guerrillas and cleared landing sites for troop-carrying helicopters which flew in a battalion of Vietnamese marines.

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI)—Boisterous, hard-drinking Irish playwright Brendan Behan looked at his baby daughter Tuesday night and said he hoped she would be a teetotaler.

Judge upheld by high court

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court today upheld Multnomah County Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding and declared Frank Eugene Vawter had not been subjected to unreasonable delay in bringing his case to trial.

Vawter was indicted for converting entrusted property, and tried 7½ months later. During the intervening period he was in the state penitentiary serving a sentence for another offense.

The Supreme Court held there had been no unreasonable delay in bringing Vawter to trial, and denied Vawter's motion for dismissal of the indictment.

Zoning request on TV approved

PORTLAND (UPI)—Multnomah County Commissioners Tuesday approved a request for community service zoning at a site in Northwest Portland to allow for construction of a television tower.

Oregon Television, Inc., plans to construct a 1,049 foot antenna for KPTV, Channel 12, and a transmitter building on the 16-acre site at 212 N.W. Miller Rd. The approval was given despite the objections of several residents in the area. Transmitting towers for KGW-TV and KOIN-TV already are in operation near the site, and KATU-TV has one under construction.

Wheat approval given after JFK letter is read

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate, moved by a letter from the dead President, voted Tuesday night to give the new Chief Executive a free hand in negotiating the proposed wheat sales to Russia.

By a 57 to 35 vote, the Senate defeated a bill sponsored by Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R - S.D., that would have prohibited the Export-Import Bank from guaranteeing commercial U.S. bank loans to finance the sales.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., in a dramatic prologue to the show-down vote, read to a hushed chamber a letter from the late President Kennedy, written a week before his assassination, vigorously opposing the restriction.

The letter dated Nov. 15 and addressed to Mansfield said, in part, "I write to urge in the strongest terms that the Senate should not approve" any legislation to bar government underwriting of the sales.

"It would work against the interest of the United States in crippling the American exporter in fair competition with other free countries for non-strategic trade with the Communist world," the letter said.

Calling such a proposal "against the national interest," the letter was never actually signed by the President, but bore, typewritten, the ending: "Sincerely, John F. Kennedy."

The bill had led to suspension of U.S.-Soviet negotiations for the sale of \$250 million worth of surplus wheat. Because the Russians also are balking over shipping rates, defeat of the measure does not mean the sale will go through, but the vote did remove a major roadblock to further negotiations.

The issue of Export-Import Bank credit guarantees arose after the Russians indicated they would pay 25 per cent down in cash, but wanted short-term credit terms of 18 months to pay off the balance.

Commercial U.S. banks insist that the Export-Import Bank insure or guarantee the 75 per cent balance, similar to the credit underwriting function performed by the government bank for other commercial export transactions.

'63 tourist report given at meeting

A report on tourist business for 1963 in the Central Oregon area and the state was reviewed by the Deschutes county advertising committee at an annual meeting held last night at the Bend Chamber of Commerce. Frank H. Loggan, secretary - treasurer said that from preliminary surveys that out-of-state tourists stayed a day longer in Oregon than in 1962. The average expenditure per car was up from \$60 to \$80 in 1963, he said.

Louis Davison, president of the Motel Owners' Association, said that stays in Central Oregon were for longer periods this year than in 1962, the Fair year. Prospects for winter travel appear to be good, he said.

The committee adopted a budget of \$6,785 to advertise Deschutes county in 1964. This will include 50,000 four color folders, plus advertising in magazines, newspapers and radio and a membership in the Pacific Northwest Travel Association.

The Redmond and Bend Chambers of Commerce filed reports with the committee on folder distribution for 1963. During the first ten months of this year, over 14,500 folders were mailed to all parts of the country from direct requests. This is an all-time high. M. L. Coyner, chairman said. A total of 50,000 folders were distributed through the two chamber offices.

World food output is expected to be about same as in 1962-63

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department predicts the world food output in 1963-64 will be about the same as in 1962-63.

The department's Economic Research Service (ERS) said generally increased output in many parts of the world and a record wheat crop in Canada of more than 700 million bushels largely offset the smaller grain crops of Eastern Europe and reduced output in some other regions. The ERS analysts indicated production declines in certain crops will be made up in many regions by increases in other crops.

There were highly unfavorable weather conditions for 1963 grain production in much of Europe. ERS said Western Europe's adverse weather reduced yields from last year's record high and injured the quality of wheat and feed grains. Wheat imports, therefore, will be substantial, ERS said.

The imports of feed grains by Western Europe will be influenced by the increased availability of home-grown feed-grade wheat, and the extent to which the feeding value of grain was reduced.

ERS said the domestic food supply in the Soviet Union in 1963-64 will be less than the preceding year. This will require considerable imports of grain instead of normal exports. Canada already has sold a considerable amount of wheat to the Soviet Union, and it is anticipated that the United States also will sell a large volume to the Soviet bloc.

ERS said that the domestic food situation in many other Eastern European countries will be spotty.

The extremely severe hurricane season in the Caribbean area hurt growing sugar cane and other agricultural crops, particularly those for local use, ERS said. Some drought conditions continued this year in other Western Hemisphere countries, as well as the United States.

But in a number of temperate zone areas of Latin America, including Mexico, Argentina, and Uruguay, growing conditions were improved and the level of 1963-64 production is expected to be somewhat above that of the previous year. Expanded production generally is expected this year in Central America and Venezuela.

ERS said over-all 1963-64 food production in Western Asia should about equal that of 1962-63, since an expected rise of grain production in Turkey of

10-20 per cent above 1962-63 would offset reduced production in some other areas, such as Jordan where severe drought prevailed.

Production appears to be on increase in most of Africa, ERS said. Increased commercial wheat imports and increased corn exports are expected by the Republic of South Africa.

ERS said food production in the Far East, Australia and New Zealand shows little overall change in 1963 compared with 1962. Unfavorable yields from early summer crops in Japan and Korea were followed by unusually good fall harvests of rice and other crops. For Taiwan, The Philippines, Malaysia, Mainland China, and India, no major changes from last year are reported, according to ERS.
