

Group proposes special rites for JFK Dec. 22

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Candlelight memorial services across the nation have been suggested for Dec. 22—the last official day of mourning for President John F. Kennedy.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown of California and Charles P. Taft of Cincinnati, brother of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft, R-Ohio, said Sunday the services would be a "spiritual monument" to the slain President and a protest against hate.

Brown and Taft are co-chairmen of "America's Conscience fund," established by a group of prominent citizens including former President Harry S. Truman and heavyweight champion Sonny Liston. The organization was founded to raise money for the repair of churches damaged in racial disorders.

"The demented mind of the assassin who took the life of John F. Kennedy in Dallas is no different from the mind of the murderers who snuffed out the lives of four little girls in Birmingham," Brown and Taft said in a statement.

"The American people must not let the tragic death of John F. Kennedy pass without giving deep thought to the hate and intolerance which cause men to take the lives of other men," their statement added. "From Birmingham to Dallas this hatred has been sweeping our land."

The governor and Taft, a prominent Protestant layman, said the late President himself would cherish most a monument which symbolized "the healing of the wounds of distrust so that men could live together in peace."

They suggested that interfaith services be held Sunday, Dec. 22, in every American community, and that donations be accepted for the benefit of the "widows in Dallas and others who have suffered from the bombings and the wave of intolerance which now poisons parts of the nation."

Apartment plan opposed

MADRAS — Opposition to a proposed \$125,000 apartment house development at Ninth and Buff Streets in Madras and little interest in a new city wide zoning ordinance was expressed at a double hearing held this week by the Madras planning commission.

The planning group held a hearing on a variance to existing zoning laws for construction of the estimated quarter of a million dollar 24 unit apartment building. The development had been planned by E. Lyle Parsley, Portland, and called for a three story concrete block, brick and concrete building with swimming pool and roof top patio and barbecue facilities.

The variance hearing saw eight of 15 property owners within 300 feet of the proposed development in attendance. Vote of the property owners saw seven oppose the project and one for it.

At the planning commission hearing for the new city wide zoning ordinance only one person not connected with the planning commission or city council was in attendance. The hearing brought no objections to the 28 page ordinance which zones the city for various uses, restricts building sizes and uses of ground and buildings in the various areas.

Student leaders hold session

The meeting which was a function of the Oregon State Community College Student Association, covered subjects relating to student activities, leadership, school government and athletics.

Dr. Don Pence, President of Central Oregon College, and Andy Olsen of COC, president of OSCCSA, each presented working addresses. The remainder of the session was taken up with various discussion groups which considered problems common to two year colleges.

The 34 students who were in attendance visited the COC campus site on Awbrey Heights and completed the session with an informal social gathering.

Colleges which were represented included Blue Mountain College, Pendleton; Treasure Valley College, Ontario; Southwestern Oregon College, North Bend; Clatsop College, Astoria; Central Oregon College, Bend; and Eugene Technical and Vocational School, Eugene.

Central Oregon College delegates included Vernon Crawford, COC student body president; Andy Olson, president of OSCCSA; Bill Penhollow, Sara Moisan, and Jon Hunnell, council members; and Margaret Gall, COC student body treasurer.

Warm tribute to Johnson paid by U of O president

A Republican who served as Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare in the cabinet of President Eisenhower paid glowing tribute to the new President of the United States here Wednesday.

The speaker was Dr. Arthur S. Fleming, president of the University of Oregon.

The University President said President Johnson had been carefully "groomed" for the high position he now holds. Much of this grooming, the speaker noted, was by the late President, John F. Kennedy.

"We can be thankful that our form of government makes possible the transition that is now taking place," Dr. Fleming said, adding that President Johnson will provide the effective leadership needed. "No man has a better understanding of the role of Congress," the speaker added.

Dr. Fleming is intimately acquainted with President Johnson. Frequently, President Johnson conferred with the Cabinet on national problems, when Dr. Fleming was a member of that group.

Dr. Fleming's talk to the Rotarians had as its theme: "Hatred and Gratitude." He touched on the "black weekend" that faced Americans on the eve of Thanksgiving.

The University President was introduced by George E. Young, with Dr. Robert Bristol presiding.

Dr. Fleming was accompanied to Bend by Richard C. Williams, director of the University of Oregon development fund, and William C. Landers, alumni director.
