The paintings are priced from \$7.50 for an oil monoprint to \$200 for a marine scene in encaustic, with \$55 as the average asking.

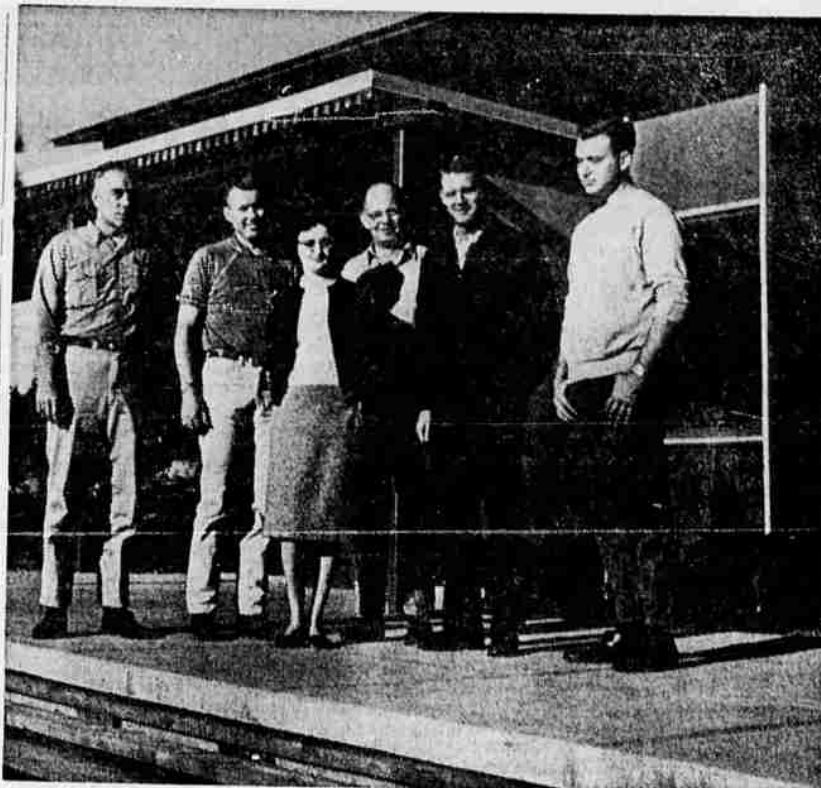
Assassination

in Australia?

MELBOURNE, Australia (UPI)—Police took strict security precautions today in the wake of an anonymous report that an attempt would be made to assassinate Prime Minister Sir Robert Menzies.

Heavily armed police patrolled the rooftops of all buildings while 30 policemen mingled with 600 workers when Menzies addressed a political rally of workers at the Ford Motor Company's big works at Geelong.

There was a momentary shock of alarm when a practical joker set off a big firecracker inside a tin can with a noise that sounded like a gunshot. But the tension quickly eased when the crowd began to laugh.

Attendance high at churches on Thanksgiving

Crisp, clear weather, with the Cascades white on the western skyline, greeted thousands of Central Oregonians who attended Thanksgiving services in various churches Thursday, and joined in family dinners and reunions.

Attendance at the church services is believed to have set an all-time mark for the area. The large turnout was attributed to tragic events of the past week that included the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

In Bend, the traditional union Thanksgiving service sponsored by the Bend Ministerial Association was at the First Baptist Church. There was also a big attendance at the various services at St. Francis Catholic Church, where a series of requiem masses were held in the days immediately following the slaying of the President.

Special services were also held at the First Church of Christ, Scientist, and there were services in several other Bend churches. In virtually all churches, sermons were themed on events of the past week. It was a seven-day period in which America, for the first time, joined in a national day of mourning and a day of thanksgiving in the same week.

In Bend, and in other Central Oregon towns, virtually all business came to a full halt Thursday, on a day described by some speakers as one of the most significant Thanksgivings in the history of America.

With Thanksgiving now history, Bend today made ready for the observance of another big holiday, Christmas, less than a month away.

LONDON (UPI) — Comedian Alan Sherman's record "Won't You Come Home Disraeli?" has become the first record in a decade to be banned by London-based Radio Luxembourg, one of Europe's leading commercial radio stations.

The disc hints at a love affair between late British Premier Benjamin Disraeli and Queen Victoria. A station policy forbids derogatory mention of politicians and royalty.

A station spokesman said "we don't mind references to King Henry VIII, but Queen Victoria has not been dead all that long."

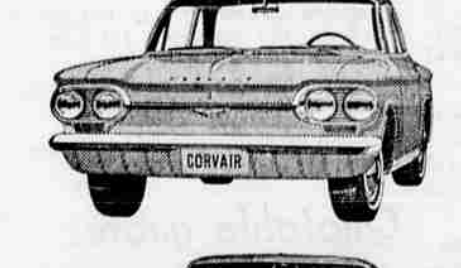
