## Land fraud case to open Monday

PENDLETON (UPI)—A jury will be chosen Monday in federal court here for the trial of seven persons charged with mail fraud and conspiracy to sell desert land near Burns. The land development project was called "Lake Valley." Government and defense opening statements also are expected Monday in the case brought by the government against Abraham Leonard Koolish, 70, Winnetka, Ill., and six other Chicago and Los Angeles area defendants. A hearing was held in Portland Friday which indicated the trial would last at least three weeks.

In addition to Koolish, defendants are his son, David Frank Koolish, 43, Winnetka, Ill.; John Milton Phillips Jr., 38, president of Harney County Land Development Co., Evanston, Ill.; Jack Cecil Cherbo, 37, Chicago; Richard Dale Walker, 40, Los Angeles; George Edward Isaacs, 39, Glendale, Calif.; and Maurice Arthur Hall, 39, Los Angeles.

## Council fails to take firm freedom stand

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Roman Catholic delegates and Protestant observers alike appeared deeply disturbed today over the failure of the Ecumenical Council to adopt a clear-cut position on religious freedom. The council winds up the work of this year's session Monday. Pope Paul VI closes the session Tuesday and Wednesday with ceremonies including the formal publication of decrees on liturgy and communications. Delegates will return for a third session from Sept. 14 to Nov. 20, 1964. Sources at the Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity said there was no chance of a vote Monday on a statement which would put the Roman Catholic Church on record as recognizing the freedom of every man to believe and worship according to his conscience. A secretariat statement against anti-Semitism will also miss coming to a vote, the sources said. Bishop Charles Helmsing of Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., expressed American concern about the failure to act on religious freedom during Friday's council session. "We are all waiting for it before the end of this session," he said. "There is no reason why it could not come today." However, no action was taken. Protestant observers were glum. The Rev. Albert C. Outler of the World Methodist Council said a delay until next session would be "lamentable."

More than 20 prizes will be given away during the day. The invocation will be said by the Rev. Keith S. Sorensen, pastor of the Sisters Church of God. President A.R. Teater of Post will conduct the business meeting. Entertainment will include several numbers by the Harney County Folk Singers and organ music by E. A. Reuter-crona.

Manager Norlin will report on the year's operation. Revenue, he says amounted to \$439,359.99 from September 30, 1962, to September 30, 1963. This represents an increase of 12 per cent over the previous year. The Cooperative has 1226 miles of line, an increase of 14.9 over the previous year.

REDMOND—Oregon Licensed Practical Nurses Association signed a one-year contract this week with Central Oregon District Hospital in Redmond. The contract formalizes a wage increase of approximately 14 cents an hour, which went into effect July 1. The contract also provides for extended vacations after 10 years employment. Helen Dwyer of Klamath Falls, OLPNA president, was present for the signing. About 30 licensed practical nurses are employed at the Redmond hospital. Their group is the sixth in Oregon to complete this contract. The basic hourly wage for licensed practical nurses at the hospital is \$1.55.
