## Youth mauled by pet lion

**EUGENE (UPI)**—A Corvallis youth who pulled "the fastest reload I ever tried" after being mauled by a pet lion Sunday in Springfield was listed in good condition at Sacred Heart Hospital today.

Ronald Guiley, 16, shot "Cleo" a pet lion belonging to Bob Stevens of Springfield after the 250 pound cat started dragging the youth toward its cage by the leg.

The animal, which knocked Guiley down as he and a hunting companion, Pat Haxby, 15, stopped to pet it, hooked its fangs in Guiley's boot. Apparently excited by the smell of blood, the lion refused to let go when Haxby fired a shot in the air then struck the beast.

Guiley then reached into his pocket, fitted a shell in his single barrel shotgun and killed the lion with one shot through the head.

## Frost covers phone lines

Ice of the hoar frost variety, up to an inch thick in places, covered long distance telephone lines in the northern part of Central Oregon this morning, causing Pacific Northwest Bell crews considerable concern.

From eight to ten men, in different crews, were working along the line from Redmond north to Maupin, using long poles to knock the clinging ice from the high lines. In most instances, the crewmen were walking under the lines, wielding the poles from the ground.

No line breakage was reported up to this morning, but there were plenty of out-of-service calls. Some delay in making long distance calls was faced.

Although forecasts are not very favorable, there was an indication of at least a slight break in the weather this morning. Brilliant sunshine was reported from Redmond, under a fog blanket for several days.

Fog was also clearing from the Crooked River Valley and the Prineville area.

**Indian timber bill approved**  
**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Senate today passed and sent to the House a bill to remove a 53-year-old restriction on the cutting of timber on Indian reservations.

The legislation, introduced by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, would relax a law limiting the sale of timber to mature trees and to dead and down timber.

A report from the Senate Interior Committee said the legislation would modernize logging operations by permitting cutting on a sustained yield basis. The report said this would permit cutting of immature trees of poor quality.

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
