Television in review

Reviewer liked Boone show—all but sermonizing at end

Every television dramatic series, to prove its disregard of conventional taboos and determination to be ADULT, must at some point wrestle with the problem of the unwed mother.
Tuesday night it was the turn of the National Broadcasting Company's Richard Boone show.
Take one rich father, one hysterical mother, one priggish married sister, one pal-kid younger brother and one rebellious college girl, stir all of them up with the news that the younger sister is about to have one baby and lacks one husband, then the ingredients are ready for serving.
It began on a superfluous note with a father, son, hot rod sequence, apparently designed to prove that this family was, if not average American, at least normal.
But after that it settled into a good suspense story with superb acting by Lloyd Bochner, playing one of his first lead roles, as the distraught father;
and good support from Boone, playing an abortionist.
For 45 minutes "Don't Call Me Dirty Names," managed to avoid cliches and the plaster of paris sympathy which so often destroys hackneyed drama.
The production was enhanced by the lip smacking abortionist, a cigar chewing Coast Guardsman, a defiant father of the unborn child.
But just as the Boone show appeared about to come home a winner, the script threw a show.
There ensued 15 minutes of sermonizing in which the viewer learned:
—Life is just a succession of love affairs, "round after round;"
—Fathers understand their daughters because they, too, have extra-marital affairs;
—Mothers really love their daughters, even if they don't understand them (presumably, because mothers don't have extra-marital affairs).
At one point in the proceedings, Boone asked, "do you get the feeling you are reading this in a magazine?"
Yes, Mr. Boone, unfortunately, we did. A confession magazine.

New powers granted bishops Secret Service agent honored

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI, in a historic document read to the Ecumenical Council, Tuesday granted bishops sweeping new powers dealing with such varied subjects as outdoor Masses and marriages between Catholics and non-Catholics.
The council fathers already had voted, at the invitation of the pontiff, to extend their powers and share the right of governing with the Pope.
But Paul VI, apparently bypassing the council in the interest of speed, decided to issue a document dealing with the matter.
As the pontiff sat on his red and gold throne in St. Peter's Basilica, Pericle Felici, secretary general of the council, read a decree titled "Pastorale Munus" (Pastoral Office).
The title is taken from the opening words in Latin.
The proclamation listed 40 powers which the Pope gave the bishops on a permanent basis. It also listed new personal privileges that they may exercise.
One of the powers concerning marriage is the right of a bishop to give special dispensation for mixed marriages between Catholics and others. Prior to the papal decree bishops had this power, but it had been given to them at regular intervals on a temporary basis. Now it is permanent.
Ceremonies today also marked the 40th anniversary of the Council of Trent. In the 16th Century, the Council of Trent sought to defend the Catholic church from the Protestant reformation.
The current council finished its 1963 working sessions Monday and will recess Wednesday until September.
The pontiff's document was dated Nov. 30, 1963, the day of the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle.

Ottman bound over to jury

PORTLAND (UPI)—Floyd H. Ottman waived a preliminary hearing here Tuesday and was bound over to the grand jury on a first degree murder charge.
Ottman was charged in the slayings of his wife, Nora Mae, 53, and her ex-husband, Donald G. Wymer, 63.
Bodies of the victims were found last Friday in an apartment above a restaurant.

Two indicted in shootings

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)—Oliver Dixon, 52, and Eugene Beierle, 47, were indicted on charges of first degree murder by the Klamath County Grand Jury Tuesday.
They were charged in connection with the fatal shootings of their wives last month.
Dixon is accused of killing his wife, Ellen, 42, on Nov. 26 and Beierle is accused of killing his wife, Gloria, 23, on Nov. 22.
