Hawaiian residents testify they thought scenic areas were in or near Lake Valley

PENDLETON (UPI) — Three Hawaii residents testified Wednesday they believed scenic areas shown in advertising material they received were in or very near the Lake Valley subdivision where they bought land.

Seven Chicago and Los Angeles area men are on trial on mail fraud and conspiracy charges here in connection with sale of the land in Oregon's arid Harney County.

Walter Cyprano, Honolulu, said he had never been to Oregon and thought that Ice Lake and Paulina Lake, pictured in the brochures of the Harney County Land Development Corp. were in the vicinity of his land.

Ice Lake is 260 miles away in the Wallowa Mountains and Paulina Lake is 150 miles away. John Baricuatro, a Pearl City service station operator, said he answered an ad in the Honolulu Advertiser and bought five lots for \$25 down. He said he received a brochure with a picture of a man boating on a lake "and took it for granted there were fish in the lake."

He said he also received the impression there was timber on the land, although earlier in the day defense attorney William H. Morrison read from an information letter sent to prospective buyers which said the tracts were bare of timber.

Didn't Complete Purchases

Cyprano, Baricuatro and Ernest Lee, also of Honolulu, said they decided not to go through

with their purchases after learning an investigation was under way.

Also on the stand Wednesday was Mrs. Loretta Murphy, Chicago, a sister-in-law of David Frank Koolish, one of the defendants. She said Koolish had asked to use her signature and she signed several documents for him.

"I didn't read what they were," she said.

A parade of other witnesses testified they had asked for their money back after seeing their land for the first time.

John Scharf, manager of the Malheur Wildlife Refuge near the Lake Valley development, identified many of the photos in the advertising brochure as being taken of the Steens Mountain, about 50 miles to the south. Some he could not identify.

He described the Lake Valley area as flat, treeless, and covered mostly with greasewood, a low, bushy plant. He said Harney Lake was alkaline, dry at times, and unable to sustain fish life for very long.

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Plans for construction of Columbia power tie with southwest U.S. approved by committee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Appropriations Committee recommended today \$6.5 million for construction of extra-high-voltage transmission lines to carry power from the Columbia River to the Pacific Southwest.

But the committee directed that construction not start until Congress acts on legislation to give the Pacific Northwest first call on power produced at federal dams in the area.

The legislation has been passed by both the Senate and the House, but is bogged down in controversy over a House amendment to the legislation. The amendment, drawn up by Rep. Jack Westland, R-Wash., would require the Bonneville Power Administration to get

specific authority from Congress before building any powerlines outside the Pacific Northwest.

The Senate committee recommended appropriation of \$5 million to purchase land and equip-

ment for the power intertie and an additional \$1.5 million for preliminary engineering.

Two Line Intertie

The committee said the two-line intertie should connect the BPA system to the Central Valley Project power system at Tracy, Calif.

It said the Pacific Northwest also should be connected through the intertie to the federal Colorado River power system. This would include connections with the existing Hoover, Parker and Davis Dams and with the proposed Bridge and Marble Canyon dams in Arizona.

The committee directed that if only one line were constructed at this time it should run from the BPA system to connect with the CVP system and the Hoover Dam power plant.

The Senate committee did not say so, but apparently took a dim view of the Westland amendment calling for specific congressional authority to build transmission lines. Instead, the committee directed that the interior secretary continue negotiations with utilities for possible private construction of the lines.

The secretary should not begin construction, the committee said, until he had conducted "good faith negotiations" with utilities and had found that outside proposals did not provide the benefits of federal construction.

The committee asked that it be given the opportunity to review the secretary's findings before construction begins.
