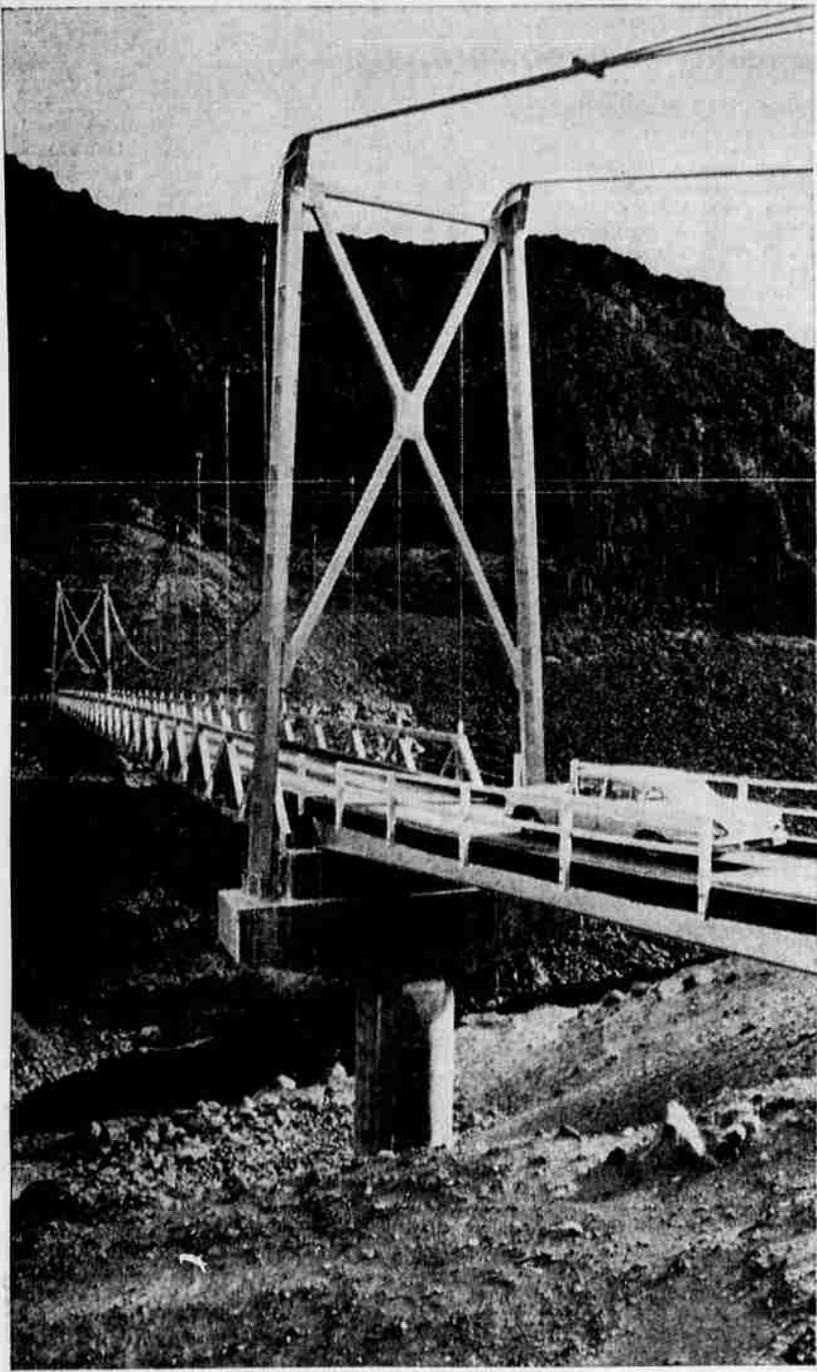

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AMA votes all-out study to determine which, if any, ills caused or made worse by smoking

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—The American Medical Association (AMA) voted Wednesday for an all-out study to determine which human ailments, if any, are caused or made worse by smoking.

The vote, by the AMA House of Delegates, came on the last day of the organization's 17th clinical meeting and followed a report on the smoking problem which covered a three-year study of nearly 74,000 men.

The report, presented by Dr. E. Cuyler Hammond, director of statistical research for the American Cancer Society, suggested that the death rate among cigarette smokers was more than twice that of non-smokers.

In addition, Hammond's report showed that cigarette smokers apparently have more illnesses and require more hospitalization.

A portion of the report said that "population studies have shown that death rates in middle-aged men from heart attacks were from 50 to 150 percent higher among heavy smokers than among non-smokers."

Hammond's report was based on a continuing study of 422,094 men between 40 and 89 years of age enrolled as cancer society volunteers.

According to Hammond, new figures derived from his extensive study showed the relationship between cigarettes and lung cancer appeared to increase with age and that lung cancer deaths were "considerably lower" among men who gave up smoking for several

years than among those who continued to smoke.

Hammond added that pipe and cigar smoking were "virtually innocuous" because these smokers seldom inhale.

In New York, Dr. Clarence C. Little, scientific director of the Tobacco-Industry Research Committee, said the cigarette industry was "gratified" that the AMA recognized "the need for additional research on smoking

Assassination scene re-enacted

DALLAS (UPI)—An open top sedan cruised down Elm Street Wednesday along the same fatal route that President Kennedy took. A telescopic gun-sight was trained on it.

In rapid-fire order, three photographs were snapped through the four-power lens.

The re-enactment showed how the President looked to the sniper in the sixth floor window of the Texas Schoolbook Depository Building. A 35 millimeter camera recorded the scene.

Jerry A. McNeill, UPI photographer, snapped three pictures over an interval of less than nine seconds, the time it was estimated that it took the sniper to fire his shots at the President. The results indicated that the assassin had a very large image to shoot at.

The re-enactment was a close duplication of events which occurred Nov. 22, even to the time of day.

Little said such a research program "should speed the day when science will learn the causes of major health problems, such as lung cancer and heart disease and what role, if any, smoking may have."

He pointed out that the tobacco industry research committee last week appropriated an additional \$1 million for research during 1964.

The AMA move also had the backing of the Massachusetts Heart Association (MHA). The MHA, in its annual report issued Wednesday devoted the cover and opening pages to a public warning against cigarette smoking.

On other matters, the assembled delegates heard a warning that noise can trigger ulcer attacks, allergies and other ailments; and also voted to reaffirm to its component societies a 1960 stand opposing racial discrimination.

But the group steered away from a Rhode Island resolution denying membership to those societies who do discriminate.

Dr. Lee Edward Farr of Houston, Tex., singled out home noises as particular offenders and said control of noise may become as important a medical problem as control of viruses and bacteria.

He said pandemonium in the home from such sources as dishwashers, kitchen vent fans, vacuum cleaners, hair dryers, radios, television and record players results in sound that measures higher in decibels than that allowed by law in factories.

Two dead Kennedy children buried at father's side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy returned to a darkened hillside in Arlington National Cemetery Wednesday night to bury the bodies of her two dead children at their father's side.

In a brief and moving ceremony, lighted by the eternal flame at the head of Kennedy's grave, two white caskets were placed beside the slain President.

One contained the body of Patrick Bouvier Kennedy who died last Aug. 9 in the second day of his life. The other contained a sister who was still-born Aug. 23, 1956.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said Mrs. Kennedy was accompanied by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, his brother, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and the former First Lady's sister, Princess Lee Radziwill.

Mrs. Kennedy knelt in prayer at the graveside ceremony conducted by the Most Rev. Philip Hannan, auxiliary bishop of Washington. She remained composed throughout the reinterment.

Intones 148th Psalm
The two small caskets were placed on either side of the President. Bishop Hannan intoned the words of the 148th Psalm.

The Lord's Prayer was said, and the caskets, sprinkled with holy water, were lowered into the grave.

Under the doctrine of the Roman Catholic Church, children, untainted by sin, go directly to heaven after baptism.

When the ceremony was over the members of the family left

the cemetery immediately. The gates were patrolled by an extra guard of military police to keep the service private.

Salinger said the bodies of the two children were accompanied to Washington aboard the Kennedy family plane by Sen. Edward Kennedy.

Patrick Bouvier Kennedy had been buried at the Kennedy family plot in Brookline, Mass. His sister was buried at Newport, R. I.

Plans Kept Secret
The plans for the burial were a closely-guarded secret. The statement on the move came from Salinger, who said he was acting at the request of Mrs. Kennedy.

Little had been known about the stillborn Kennedy baby and it was not general knowledge that it had been a girl.

It was her wish that the President be buried in Arlington Cemetery. Some members of the Kennedy family had argued in favor of the family plot at Brookline.
