REDMOND — Funeral services for Milton Leonard Odem, 57, Camp Sherman, will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in Zacher's Chapel. The Rev. D. L. Penhollow will officiate, assisted by the Rev. James Egly.

Mr. Odem died December 5 at Central Oregon District Hospital of injuries received December 3 when a horse fell on him.

Interment will be in the Redmond Cemetery, with military rites by the American Legion. Mr. Odem was born October 2, 1906 in Enid, Okla. He came to Redmond in 1929 from Lewiston, Idaho, having purchased Redmond's only theater at that time. He later opened the Odem theater here and constructed the Odem-Medo Drive-In Theater.

He was a charter member of the Redmond Kiwanis Club and held memberships in Redmond Masonic Lodge, Al Kader Shrine of Portland, the Bend Elks Lodge, the Redmond American Legion, and the Redmond Veterans of Foreign Wars. He served for several years on the Redmond Airport Commission and the City Planning Commission.

He was a member of the board of directors of the Bank of Central Oregon, on the board of directors of the Black Butte school in Camp Sherman and newly elected to Central Electric Cooperative board of directors.

The Odems sold their theaters five years ago and moved to Camp Sherman. He was retired until two years ago when he and Laddie Jordan formed a partnership for Odem-Jordan Sales in Redmond.

Survivors are his widow, Flossie, and daughter Jacqueline, 12, both of Camp Sherman; his mother, Mrs. Zoa Ruth Odem, Lewiston, and a sister, Mrs. Charles Carr, also of Lewiston.

Negro leaders, city officials moving toward new showdown

Negro leaders and city officials at Jackson, Miss., apparently are moving toward another showdown on integration.

Six Negro women were jailed in the Mississippi capital Friday for picketing on a downtown street in the first anti-segregation demonstration since last summer. They were charged with parading without a permit and blocking sidewalks.

Negro leader Charles Evers said the demonstrations would continue until Jackson officials agreed to discuss racial grievances with Negroes. Mayor Allen Thompson said the city would continue its policy of not meeting with "agitator groups" and would hire extra policemen to protect merchants from "intimidation."

At Birmingham, Ala., federal Judge H. H. Grooms is expected to rule Monday on a suit by Negroes seeking desegregation of all public facilities in the city.

Grooms took the suit under advisement yesterday but said there was no evidence the present Birmingham city government was discriminating against Negroes. The suit was filed last year before a municipal election brought in a new city government.

Mayor Albert Boutwell said the city council last summer struck down all segregation ordinances and that all public facilities had been desegregated. Negro attorneys argued, however, that segregation still was "rooted in customs."

Elsewhere in the nation:
Oxford, Miss.: A federal court jury Friday night dismissed charges against five state law enforcement officers of mistreating a group of Negro civil rights workers. The all-white, male jury deliberated one hour and 45 minutes before returning the verdict.

Montgomery, Ala.: Negro leader Ralph Abernathy said Friday that plans are being made for Negroes to "march through Alabama like Sherman marched through Georgia" in the start of a "total assault" on segregation in the state.

Atlanta: A planned Christmas boycott of Atlanta stores was called off Friday after leaders said gains made in getting Negroes hired to better jobs made the action unnecessary.

Birmingham, Ala.: A Justice Department suit against the Jefferson County (Birmingham) Board of Registrars has been postponed at the request of the Justice Department, U. S. District Judge Seybourn Lynne said Friday.

A class in conversational Spanish will begin Monday, December 9, in Redmond, it was announced by Robert Johnson, director of continuing education for Central Oregon College. The class will meet at 7 p.m., in Room 216 of Redmond Union High School.

A similar class which had been scheduled for Bend is not being held because of insufficient enrollment, Johnson said. People in Bend who wish to learn conversational Spanish are invited to enroll in the Redmond class.

ORPHANS ATTEND GAME
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Fifteen orphans will sit in the presidential box at the Army-Navy game in Philadelphia today.

The suggestion was made by the Kennedy family and a spokesman said the children, 13 boys and two girls, were selected by charitable organizations.

Russians wary about Chinese African safari

MOSCOW (UPI) — Russia was reported keeping a wary eye today on preparations for a Red Chinese safari to Africa, an area in which rival Red actions are vying for power.

Red China's Premier Chou En-lai and Foreign Minister Chen Yi will begin an African tour in Cairo next week.

The Moscow Communist organ Pravda printed a 500-word statement Friday appealing to the Chinese comrades to rally around the international Red flag.

The feeling here was that the latest appeal would fall on deaf ears.

The Kremlin made clear it was ready to call a world conference of Communist parties to decide the validity of the Soviet policy of peaceful co-existence with non-Communist states and a no-war program.

The Peking line spurs cooperation with the "imperialists" and advocates nuclear war if necessary to establish the victory of communism over capitalism and the West.

The Chinese apparently are out to win as many friends and Allies as possible among the new African nations.

The Russians have had some successes and some crushing failures on the African continent.

Soviet diplomats only recently were expelled from the Congo for the second time in two years. The Kremlin was asked to withdraw its ambassador from Guinea in 1961.

U.S. to let Galvao come to N.Y. to appear at UN

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — The United States has agreed to let Henrique Galvao, leader of the refugee band which hijacked the Portuguese liner Santa Maria in January, 1961, go to New York to testify before the United Nations.

The U.S. consulate general here granted Galvao a visa for the trip Friday night after a hectic, two-day interchange of cables with the State Department.

The visa stipulates that Galvao may not arrive in New York until Monday, the day before the deadline for his testimony, but it imposes no other conditions. There had been reports that U.S. authorities would warn the refugee that he was making the trip at his own risk — that he might be extradited if Portugal requested such action—but they did not do so.

Galvao is wanted in Portugal on charges of piracy arising from the Santa Maria hijack. "I am overjoyed," Galvao said. "My confidence in U.S. fair play is fully justified. . . . The governments of the United States and Brazil have fully upheld the high principles of democracy and international law."

He said he plans to leave for New York Sunday night and return here after he has testified. Galvao has been promising "sensational revelations" about Portugal's overseas territories, of which he was inspector general for 15 years.

If Galvao arrives on U.S. soil, Portugal is expected to apply immediately for his arrest and extradition to that country, a Portuguese spokesman said in Washington. It has had an ex-

tradition treaty with the United States since 1908.

Galvao intends to testify before the United Nations committee investigating the status of Portuguese Africa. The committee is expected to end its hearings Tuesday.
