Giardello, tonight, gets 2nd midweight title shot

ATLANTIC CITY (UPI) — Joey Giardello, one-time "bad boy" of the ring, gets his second shot at the world middleweight crown tonight in a fight with champion Dick Tiger at Convention Hall.

Thirty-three-year-old Giardello of Cherry Hill, N.J., whose 15-year professional career has been beset by trouble, will try to take the 160-pound crown from Nigeria's Tiger, 34, with whom he broke even in two non-title bouts.

Dark-haired, streamlined Joey who almost took the championship from Gene Fullmer at Bozeman, Mont., on April 20, 1960—but was held to a draw—declared confidently today:

"I know I'll get a square deal in the ring this time—here in Atlantic City, and I'll finally get the title that I deserved years ago."

However, the wagering fraternity does not share Joey's confidence. Stocky, broad-shouldered Tiger is a prohibitive favorite at 3½ to 1. And a poll of nine sports writers, here for the fight, favored Tiger 7-2.

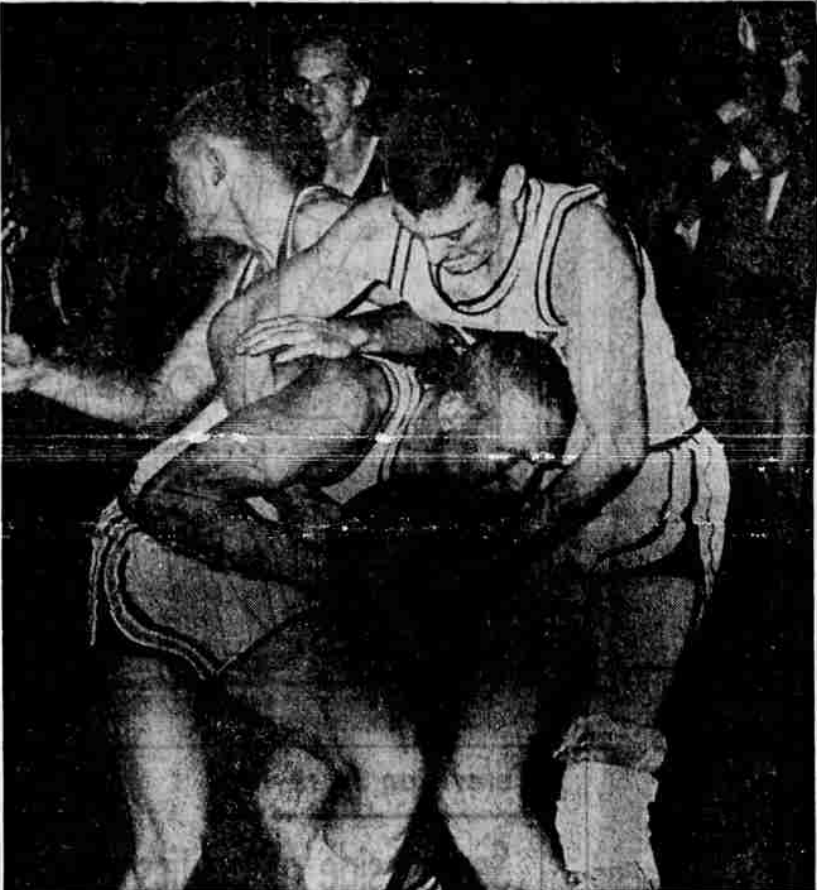
Tiger is favored because of his aggressiveness, punch, stamina and ruggedness over the 15-round championship route although he won and lost in two non-title bouts with Joey in 1959—before Tiger won the crown.

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In tumbling act

Pokes outscramble Panthers, 51-30

PRINEVILLE — Tumble down... four steps ahead in a cyclone of thundering hoofs... and follow the flying wedge. That was the story in the nightcap here last night when the hometown Crook County High School Cowboys battled their way to a 51-30 victory over the Redmond Panthers in the Central Oregon tip-off basketball tournament.

It really couldn't be termed a comedy of errors, because it was worse than that. First and goal on the 10 second line, rock 'em sock 'em all the way to the keyhole and fumble.

It happened over and over again as a laughing, boisterous crowd of casaba fans watched a tumble match that even the shepherds of Shanty Run (striped gentry) couldn't stave off.

Things Pick Up

A howling, mirth-ridden bunch of spectators, however, were treated to more than their money's worth in excitement. Things picked up in the final quarter.

Prineville won it in the third stanza. After retiring at the intermission with a deficit of one point at the colossal score of 13-12, Coach Wayne Lund's Cowboys came out of the woods immediately after play resumed.

Lund's Pokes were able to shake the shambles that befell both squads in the first two stanzas, but the Cats kept right on tripping over their own feet for the entire third frame.

It was quite a setback for Coach Buck Kauffman when his maple court charges went absolutely scoreless in the third period until Bill Hughitt dropped in a free throw with 2 seconds remaining in the period.

W. Washington gets 54-52 win

BELLINGHAM (UPI) — Mike Merriman sank a field goal with but four seconds left here Friday to carry Western Washington State College to a 54-52 basketball victory over Seattle Pacific College.

Seattle Pacific led at halftime 32-26 but Western went ahead with about five minutes left until Seattle Pacific tied it 52-52 late in the game to set the stage for Merriman's basket.

Both teams were stone cold from the floor in the first half. Neither did anything on the gift toss line, either. The third quarter synopsis would be simply: Prineville got scoring. Redmond kept missing... And so it went all through the third period nightmare.

Ron Revis, a not-so-tall forward on the Cowboy squad, got loose for two quick cripples in the final quarter and went on to garner three more points to pace the victors with high point honors for the evening, 17.

Von Thompson, Prineville center, connected for nine points. Gary Wing paced the losers as he blitzed the net for 12 counters. Panther Center Bill Hughitt, who couldn't loop one in to save his soul for nearly the whole game, came on strong in the final minutes to emerge from the contest as Redmond's second highest tallyman with seven.

Tallyless

Indicative of the kind of night Redmond was having, three of Coach Kauffman's starters went scoreless. Darwin Crenshaw tallied twice from the field for four points. Quick, tricky Wayne Marquess was just about the only ball-controlling element on either team.

Marquess, however, was one of the Cats who went pointless.

Prineville's fast-break patterns finally broke the contest open in the second half. The Cowboys used that third period to pull away from the visitors. Redmond, down 29-14 at the quarter, came on to narrow the gap to six points in the fourth quarter before the Cowboys put on another counter-attack and passed the Redmonds standing.

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Cowboys Face Bend

Last night's embattled victory over Redmond put the Cowboys in the tournament finals against Bend tonight when the team takes their second night of action in the Lava Bear gymnasium.

Redmond's humiliating demise leaves the Panthers in the Saturday night opener for consolation honors. The Cats face a shorter but quick, agile Madras five in that one.

Gametime is at 7. Bend faces Prineville about 15 minutes after completion of the first game.
