Jasper R. Blatch

Jasper R. Blatch, 80, a Madras resident since 1946, died Sunday in the Prineville Hospital.

Mr. Blatch was born in Leathertown, Surrey, England, on November 6, 1883. He later lived in Kansas, Australia, Canada and Merrill before moving to Madras. He spent most of his life as a farmer but worked for a time with the State Forest Service and Bureau of Reclamation. He was a member of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Madras Lodge 169, AF & AM, the Al Kader Shrine Temple, Portland; the Masonic Lodge, Klamath Falls, and Concordia Chapter 133, O.E.S., Madras.

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Planners favor apartment plan

Bend planning commissioners last night appeared to favor plans calling for construction of an apartment facility near the Deschutes River, but opposed the method by which the apartments should be allowed.

The 24-unit facility is being proposed by the Land Mart Realty Company in an area between Thurston Avenue and the Bend Riverside Motel, just east of the river. Because that area lies in an R-2 (single-family dwelling) zone, either the zone must be changed or the facility must be allowed under a "special uses" section of the zoning ordinance.

After lengthy discussion the board voted to recommend a zone change, not wishing to set a precedent with the special uses alternative. The proposed conversion — to an R-4 (multiple-family dwelling) zone — would encompass an area roughly south of Thurston, north of the Riverside Motel, and between the river and E. First Street, excluding the existing commercial zone.

A public hearing for the amendment was scheduled December 30. Meantime city commissioners will study the planners' recommendation and determine whether to follow their advice.

In other business, the board voted to assign a study of city sidewalk needs to a special committee.

Young School parents meet again with district board

Half a dozen Young School parents attended a meeting at the school east of Bend Monday night, to host the Bend District School Board. The meeting was one of several visits by the board to schools on the fringes of the big district.

The school patrons repeated requests made at a meeting of their parents' group several weeks ago. At that time Richard Wayman, board chairman, and R. E. Jewell, district superintendent, were told by more than two dozen of the school patrons that the future of the school should be stabilized by a remodeling or building project in the not-too-distant future.

The arguments were warmed over for the benefit of board members Bert Hagen, Carl Klippel and Maurice Shelton; assistant superintendent Albert Nelson and board attorney Alva Goodrich, with Wayman and Jewell getting a repeat performance. Irene Cothrell, school clerk, was also present.

Board members assured the neighborhood school patrons that their fear of losing their school is ill-founded; that the school has been there over 40 years, and probably would always be.

Klippel suggested that even though conditions should warrant, at some future time, moving the fifth and sixth grades to schools in town, there would still be a nucleus at Young for expansion in case of a population boom.

"That's just what we're afraid of," Don Peterman commented. Those present were unanimous in wanting to keep all six grades. Several expressed the belief that a building program could be justified even at present, by extending the boundaries of the area served by the school.

Bruce Bekins asked what school population would justify expansion, and was told by Nelson and Jewell that probably 80 or 90 would be sufficient. The school now has an enrollment of 54 pupils, evenly divided in two rooms of three grades each.

Bekins volunteered to make another survey of the area, bringing up to date one made a year ago. He pointed out that there has been considerable home building activity since that time, and said that the increase in the number of preschoolers might be surprising. His offer was accepted.

Mrs. Gordon Hallin asked if it would be possible to bring some of the younger Alfalfa pupils, who now ride buses through the Young district to Bend, to Young. Some of them meet the bus at 7:30 and aren't home until 5 o'clock, she said. Hagen asked Goodrich if it would be legally plausible to

contract a small bus to take these pupils to town directly, and cut down travel time. Goodrich said that there would be no legal obstacle.

In an abbreviated business meeting prior to the session at Young School, directors voted to award a contract for equipping the new language lab at the senior high school to the American Seating Company of Portland.

The bid price was \$14,710.50. In order to bring the cost in line with available funds for the project, directors accepted an alternate bid in which 10 booths were eliminated from the project.

This will leave 20 booths. It is hoped by directors that the other 10 can be directed at a later date.

The board also awarded a contract for fuel oil to the Economy Oil Company of Portland on bids of \$2.58 a barrel for No. 300 oil and \$2.13 for No. 400. The firm handles Richfield products.

The bid price is f.o.b. Portland, with a shipping cost of \$1.18 a barrel being added to the cost.

Directors accepted the resignation of Melvina Rhymer, teacher at the Bear Creek School, and appointed Mrs. Joyce Gribskov as her replacement.

The meeting was held at the clerk's office.

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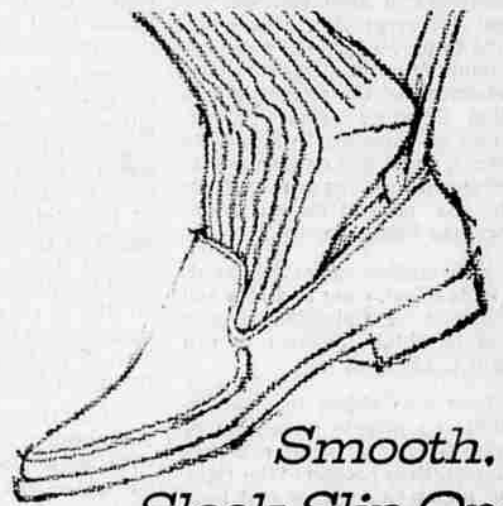


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
