

Lakers remain first in NBA

The Los Angeles Lakers were still in first place in the frantic Western Division of the National Basketball Association today — thanks to their hot-shooting guards.

Dick Barnett and Jerry West smoked the nets for 75 points Monday night at Seattle, Wash., as the Lakers rolled over Baltimore, 134-120, in the evening's only NBA contest.

The win gave Los Angeles a 16-10 record. The hot race is quite a contrast to the Eastern Division, where the Boston Celtics hold a five game lead.

Baltimore and Los Angeles were tied at 64-all early in the third stanza of their game at Seattle when Elgin Baylor sunk several shots and then West got a hot hand to push the Lakers well out in front.

The jump-shooting Barnett pumped in 38 points. West had 37 and Baylor, who earned All America honors at Seattle University, scored 29 for his old fans.

Terry Dischinger hooped 37 for Baltimore.

Always tough Seattle met St. Mary's at Richmond, Calif., and romped 84-60. John Tresvnut hit 21 points and grabbed 15 rebounds for the Chiefs.

Elsewhere in a light night of cage activity involving Western teams, Gonzaga thumped Whitworth 91-77 as Elmer Deschaine swished 25 for the victors.

Touring University of Pacific was no match for Utah and fell 90-72, but a couple of Tigers had good nights. Bill Wilson and Leo Middleton hooped 28 and 22 respectively.

Bears to face Pels' 1-2 punch

Love those Lava Bears... they showed the sportslooker who's who on the hardwoods in this mid-state region. (Is my face red?)

It was a good showing. Bend demonstrated that this year, for the first time in two seasons, it has something going for Coach Chuck Hudson.

Unfortunately, the tourney tells little about what is going to happen when regular season and league action gets underway in January.

However, it does indicate, probably, who's going to be the one to watch. This year (at least at first glance) it appears to be the Lava Bears. However, the Crook County boys are going to see their share of pelt, too. Nobody will come to the Crook County city this winter, expecting to have a comfortable evening of it, and get away with it.

Bend Has Depth

Bend has the depth and some considerable altitude. Hudson's Lava Bears, however, will have their hands full this weekend when they host the Klamath Falls Pelicans Friday night and trek to the Pels' lair the following Friday.

Klamath Falls, always a bear in the basketball world, cleaved the taller Roseburg Indians twice last weekend, 57-49 and 72-55. The latter one, obviously, wasn't even close.

Bend hopes to make the most of the Pel series, as the games will be the last until the Bears host Hermiston in the first league go January 3. As a matter of fact, all the Central Oregon Class A-1 teams are in the same situation.

Panthers Trek

Redmond treks to Forest Grove for another weekend tournament. Others in the 4-way affair are Canby and St. Helens. Madras trades a home-and-home series with Estacada on successive Fridays. And Prineville hosts a Friday-Saturday night series with Corvallis.

These are the only contests for all the mid-state schools until loop action gets underway in January.

By looking at the docket... Bend, by far, has the severest test in Klamath Falls. The Pelican club, a state tournament entry two years ago, was a red-hot squad for the most of last season.

Judging by the Roseburg series, the Pels have it this year, too. Two court aces, Terry Ash, 6-4, and 6-6 center Gene Kingsbury pack a tremendous 1-2 wallop.

Ash got 19 points, and Kingsbury 15 Friday night. Saturday evening they did it a gain... Ash hit for 23. Kingsbury poured in 20. Five-8 reserve guard Lanny Guyer did good both nights. He hit 14 Friday and 10 Saturday. All of this — and against Roseburg, too!

Hands Full

Obviously, Bend will have its hands full. Perhaps the best that Coach Hudson can hope for at this point is a split. Bend, given the right circumstances, could do it on its home court. On the Pels' floor, however, it will be more difficult.

If you are a local basketball fan of several years standing, you might find it interesting

this weekend to trek over to Prineville and watch the Cowboys and Corvallis play a two-game series.

Corvallis is coached by ex-Bend mentor Glen Kinney. Kinney, well known in the Central Oregon area, was a successful and colorful coach while at the Lava Bear helm. Local fans will get another chance to see him. His Corvallis squad is bally-hoed to be on the tall side.

Little is known about Estacada, Madras' opponent this weekend and next. Coach Bob Allard's crew decidedly isn't tall. One thing for sure, the Buff foe won't be any pushover. Estacada lost to Newberg by only a 54-52 score last weekend. (What real significance can be attached to that I'm not sure.)

WRESTLING COMING

Fans of the sport of amateur wrestling will get a chance to take a peep at the year's grapple talent before Christmas, but not much before.

Wrestling — that is, the real sport of wrestling — has had to take a back seat to basketball as the latter's schedule started sooner this year.

December 21 is the date. All of the Central Oregon mat squads get together at Bend for a Central Oregon tournament, before embarking upon their individual dual meet seasons.

Glen Hayes, new mat mentor at Bend, has hopes his charges will give a good showing. Hayes, however, is not blessed with an over supply of talent. As a matter of fact, Bend's six lettermen this season are the fewest number that Hayes has ever had to work with.

Prineville, on the other hand, (grapple coaches agree) has a fair reservoir of talent. Others (fans) claim that the Cowboys' reign as Central Oregon champs and district champs is due to fall this year after two straight banner seasons.

Redmond rates a nod, too. Coach Chauncy Ball isn't shy in the number of wrestlers. There are about eight lettermen. The Panther mat crew looms as perhaps the top threat to the Pokes in the local picture.
