

Cougars survive fouls to nip rival Idaho, 85-68

There were plenty of storm warnings hoisted along the Western cage front before the Miami Hurricanes came to the San Francisco Bay area, but the Floridians hardly caused a stir when they finally arrived Tuesday night.

Miami had a 99 point-per-game average and an All-America candidate in Rick Barry, who sported a 34-point average. Santa Clara took on this whirlwind Tuesday night and tamed it, 86-77.

Barry did live up to his press notices as he maintained his record by hitting 34 points, but Bruce Asch of the Broncos had 28 and Russ Vrankovich 23 to spark a well-balanced attack.

It was a fine comeback for the Broncos, who looked as if they were in big trouble when they dropped their season opener to lowly San Francisco State.

At Pullman, Wash., Tuesday night, Washington State picked up its first victory with a foul-filled 85-68 win over Idaho.

Officials touted 57 offenses and five players wound up fouling out. Twenty-nine infractions were called against the Cougars and 28 for Idaho.

Cougar ace Byron Vadsset was one of the men who fouled out, but not until he had hit 11 of 13 field goal tries and 6 of 7 free throws for 28 points.

Two games in Southern California saw the West Coast Athletic Conference and the California Collegiate Athletic Association split.

At San Diego, Hal Catlin hit a 15-footer at the buzzer to give San Diego State a 77-75 win over previously unbeaten Pepperdine. Ted Bridges had 22 for the Waves and Catlin 20 for the Aztecs. It was a close one all the way with the half-time score 36-31.

At Los Angeles, Loyola trailed Los Angeles State 44-40 at halftime, but slowed down the pace and picked up an 80-76 decision.

It was 76-61 when Mike Lawler hit a 10-footer with 30 sec-

onds to go. Los Angeles State brought the ball up court, but lost the ball when a technical foul was called.

Jim O'Keefe had 22 for Loyola and Ken Raynaud 19 for Los Angeles State.

Ex-Vandal Gus breaks 'board, reigns turmoil

Confusion reigned supreme at Oakland, Calif., Tuesday night when Baltimore rookie Gus Johnson jumped to stiff in a shot against the San Francisco Warriors and broke the Plexiglass backboard with his efforts.

Both coaches quickly lodged protests. Warrior mentor Alex Hannum filed one over the failure of officials to call a foul on the play. Baltimore's Bob Leonard filed his over a "defective backboard."

The contest was held up 25 minutes while the backboard was fixed and the Warriors went on to a 117-108 victory.

The evening's other National Basketball Association action took place in a twin bill before 8,237 fans at New York's Madison Square Garden.

St. Louis defeated Philadelphia, 113-103, and then Boston made its record 18-2 with a 132-113 decision over New York.

At Oakland, Walt Chamberlain and Walt Bellamy led their clubs as usual. Chamberlain had 49 for San Francisco and Bellamy 36 for the losers.

In the opener at New York, reliable Mike Farmer of St. Louis had the highest one game total of his career with 27 points, but Bob Pettit still took team scoring honors with 28.

Johnny Kerr of the 76ers led everybody with 32 tallies.

In the nightcap, Boston's Tom Heinsohn and John Havlicek tossed in 27 points apiece.

Veteran Frank Ramsey of the Celts played in his first contest since being criticized Monday by Commissioner Walter Kennedy. The commissioner was irred by a magazine article in which Ramsey discussed methods of intentionally drawing fouls.

Ramsey had four fouls called on him, but he also hit in five free throws and had 15 points altogether.
