OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY — Just over 8000 of the 10,426 students enrolled this year at Oregon State University are from Oregon with the other 2400 coming from 46 states, 2 U.S. territories, and 66 foreign countries.

All of Oregon's 36 counties are represented. Benton county is the leader with 1853 students, followed by Multnomah, 1498; Marion, 688; Linn, 528; Lane, 458; and Clackamas, 396.

Workers reject union proposal

THE DALLES (UPI) — Harvey Aluminum Co. production and maintenance employees have rejected union representation for the third time since the company began operating here in 1958.

The vote was 276 to 137 in rejecting an affiliation with the Aluminum Workers International Union AFL-CIO. Employees voted on the issue Monday and Tuesday. Out of 417 eligible voters, 413 cast ballots.

The election was conducted by the National Labor Relations Board with representatives from Harvey and the Aluminum Workers Council of The Dalles looking on.

E. G. Strumpf, field examiner for the NLRB, said both interests had seven days to appeal the election with the Board's Portland office.
