up a 841-930-919 barrage and almost brought home the bacon. Bend's Greenwood gals scored 2690, just ten pins short of first-place holder and now Class A champion, States Battery of Portland. The Portland female crew did it with a score of 2700 nailed down several weeks ago.

er, won the singles Class A competition when she rolled a 620 to barge by Dorothy Collins' 600. Mrs. Collins had done it the week before, topping Ruby Thorn's (Portland) 599. Madras' own Dorothy Farrington took Class E second with a 501 tally.

Though Mrs. Duzan won the affair, the individual heroine of the tourney came in the Class C bracket. Barbara Booher,

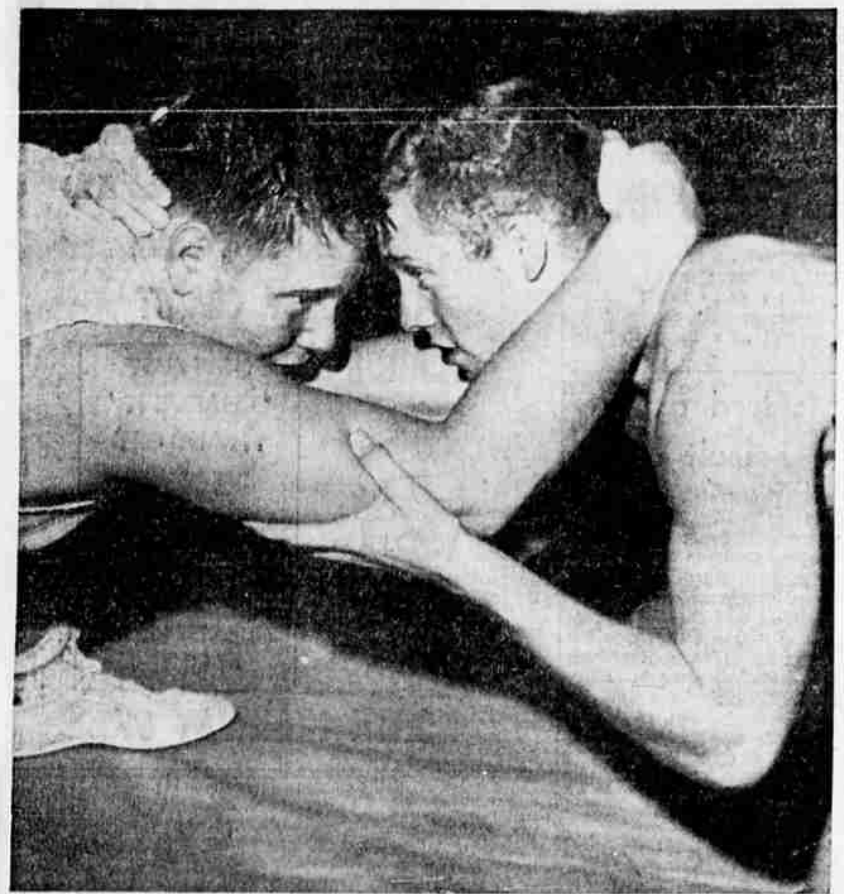

### Loyola rambles Wichita ends Tex win skein, 76-57

The University of Texas may have gone undefeated in football, but the Longhorns aren't going to win them all in basketball—at least not this year.

The Longhorns, whose five straight victories had lifted them into the No. 8 spot in the country in the latest United Press International ratings, finally took one on the chin Monday night. Powerful Wichita (No. 12) crushed Texas with consummate ease, 76-57.

The Shockers, twice upset victims this year in seven games, played their strongest game of the season as five players hit double figures. Dave Stallworth, a 6-foot-7 All-America candidate scored 16 points to pace Wichita.

But if Texas was rattled poor South Dakota was shellshocked. The Coyotes had the misfortune to walk into the middle of another Loyola scoring parade. The top-rated Ramblers flattened South Dakota, 112-68, boosting their scoring production to an average of 104 points per game.

Paul Silas, a man who believes that rebounds are more important than points, hauled down 28 caroms as 18th-rated Creighton topped Iowa, 77-72, in an overtime battle between two unbeaten teams.

Fourth-ranked Duke pulled away from game South Carolina in the final three minutes to defeat the Gamecocks, 77-70. Jeff Mullins, the Blue Devils' star forward, poured in 26 points, 23 in the second half for Duke.

Minnesota became the second Big Ten team to fall from the ranks of the unbeaten when the 13th-ranked Gophers were beaten by 19th-ranked Bradley, 78-75.

Undefeated Rice literally out-fought Georgia Tech, 84-79, in an overtime game which saw a total of 56 fouls levied against the two teams. Four of Tech's five starters fouled out during the game, and a player from each squad was ejected for fighting.

But they did them eight better at Boulder, Colo., where Colorado and Arizona State drew a total of 64 fouls between them. All five starters fouled out for the Sun Devils, who are rated 15th in the country, and as a result Colorado coasted to a resounding 93-70 victory, its 23rd consecutive win at home.

In other games, Duquesne clubbed Baldwin Wallace, 101-81. Maryland edged Clemson, 56-48. Southern Mississippi upset Mississippi State, 65-60. Memphis State mauled Alabama, 108-75. North Carolina crushed Tulane, 109-81. Loyola (La.) lashed

North Texas State, 66-51. Iowa State stopped Utah State, 77-68. Indiana belted Detroit, 110-92. George Washington drubbed The Citadel, 100-81. Mississippi beat Louisiana Tech, 92-79, and Seattle knocked off St. Mary's, 78-70.

### It's Bears vs. Tittle, Giants in pro finale

It will be the Chicago Bears' superb defense against Y. A. Tittle and pro football's most explosive offense in the National League's championship playoff, Dec. 29.

And who could ask for a more dramatic match-up?

Although the Bears should be slight favorites for the showdown at Chicago, the New York Giants undoubtedly consider them a refreshing change from the Green Bay Packers, who walloped them two straight years in the title game.

This will be the sixth playoff meeting between the Bears and Giants. No NFL division rivals ever have met as many times. The Bears haven't won a playoff title since 1946—when they beat the Giants. And the Giants' last playoff win was in 1956—when they beat the Bears.

The Bears clinched their 10th Western crown Sunday when Billy Wade took some pressure off the overworked defense by throwing a pair of third-period touchdown strikes that produced a 24-14 victory over the Detroit Lions.

### Jim Brown, Y.A. Tittle on Pro Bowl east 11

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The rushing of Jim Brown and the passing of Y. A. Tittle again will be the feature of the Eastern Conference's team in the 14th annual All-Star Pro Bowl football game.

Brown, of Cleveland, and the veteran Tittle of the New York Giants headed the Eastern squad of 34 players announced Monday for the National Football League's All-Star game here Jan. 12.

Tittle and Brown are veterans of the Pro Bowl, each having appeared six times previously. All of Brown's appearances were on the Eastern Conference team but Tittle appeared four times for the West while with the San Francisco Forty Niners.

The Giants and the strong Pittsburgh Steelers club each landed seven men on the Eastern Conference team selected by the seven coaches of the division.

Cleveland was tapped for six players in the Pro Bowl while the St. Louis Cardinals landed five men on the team with the Dallas Cowboys, Philadelphia Eagles and Washington Redskins giving three men each to the All-Star squad.

The West leads the series, eight victories to five, but the East scored a 30-20 upset last January when Brown rushed for 141 yards to win "player of the game" honors. He will receive the George Halas Trophy prior to the next game.

The Western squad is sched-

uled to be announced Wednesday and the coaches will be selected later.

And the Giants extended their record total of Eastern Division championships to 14 with a 33-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their winner-take-all game in New York.

Both conference races thus were decided on the final Sunday of the season. Chicago finished with a record of 11 wins, one defeat and two ties; the Giants have an 11-3 record.

The Packers and Cleveland Browns wound up in second place to qualify for the Playoff (Runnerup) Bowl game at Miami, Fla., Jan. 5. Cleveland defeated the Washington Redskins, 27-20, giving them a 10-4 record. The Packers edged the San Francisco Forty Niners, 21-17, Saturday to finish with 11 wins, two defeats and one tie.

In Sunday's other games, the Dallas Cowboys upset the St. Louis Cardinals, 28-24; the Baltimore Colts edged the Los Angeles Rams, 19-16; and the Minnesota Vikings trounced the Philadelphia Eagles, 34-13.

### Offense vs. Defense

To get an idea of the offense vs. defense battle shaping up in the title playoff game: The Giants scored a total of 448 points during the season, 79 more than any other team in the NFL and 147 more than Chicago. The Bears held opponents to 144 points, 62 less than any other club in the league and 136 less than the Giants.

Sunday's 24-14 score does not adequately tell the role the Bears' defense played in the victory.

### SET RECORD ATTENDANCE

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Washington Redskins announced Monday a record home attendance for the 1963 season. The "Skins" played before 393,638 customers, about 25,000 more than in 1962.

### Ara Parseghian can't decide between Northwestern, Irish

CHICAGO (UPI)—Ara Parseghian had conferences scheduled today with Northwestern Athletic Director Stu Holcomb and Notre Dame Vice President Rev. Edmund P. Joyce to attempt to resolve whether he is football coach for the Wildcats or the Irish.

Parseghian, coach at Northwestern for eight years, was announced Saturday as the new Notre Dame mentor. But Monday, after a two hour conference with Joyce, he refused to sign the Notre Dame contract and came home.

He had planned to confer with Holcomb Monday night about his status at Northwestern and in search of friendly advice on his situation with Notre Dame.

But at the last minute, he canceled the appointment to attend a sports banquet at Grand Rapids, Mich., an appearance he had attempted to cancel.

"He's mentally and physically exhausted," his wife said. "I don't know why he went."

Failure to agree on terms of the Irish contract did not mean

that Parseghian wouldn't accept the new job in the next few days.

It was believed the differences with the Irish athletic board centered on how many assistants Parseghian would have to retain from the current Irish staff.

"The details of the contract had not been fully worked out nor have they as yet," he said in a brief statement at a South Bend press conference called to hear his plans for the future at Notre Dame.

"We expect to resolve these matters within a day or two," he concluded.

Meanwhile, Holcomb said, Parseghian remained on the Northwestern staff.

"He's never officially resigned," Holcomb said. "and we're going to get together."

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
