Television in review

Current trend is toward more tinted video, reviewer notes

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HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—If you are wondering whether to shell out your hard-earned cash for a color television set, then time and the current trend toward more tinted video are in your favor.

The cost of such a set is, of course, inextricably related to how much color programming there is, in one of those which comes first the chicken or the egg situations. And this year's breakthrough in color, though modest, is indeed a breakthrough, as your television program listings will verify.

At the networks, NBC-TV, an admirable long-time pioneer in color, already has a large percentage of its regular shows aired this way — from "Bonanza" to "Tonight" to its twice-weekly movies to "Sing Along With Mitch" to Jack Paar, and many others. But 1963 has seen the competing ABC and CBS networks, which trail way back in this area, take some major

steps. In addition, local stations are also picking up the load. And the price of color sets, already dropping, will descend more toward the range of reasonableness for the average wage-earner.

NBC is still by far the color leader, in documentaries as well as entertainment, and in this sense the public is indebted to it for bringing constant pressures. At ABC, however, this season has seen the new series "The Greatest Show on Earth" and the old one "Wagon Train," turn up tinted. And there have been such outstanding color documentaries as "1492" and "1776."

At CBS, there is not yet a regular series on the air in color. But at least two of its major specials this year, the visit to Monaco with Princess Grace and the tour of London with Elizabeth Taylor, were in color — and there are other experiments from time to time. "Lassie" had some color shows; Red Skelton's Christmas Eve program will be in color; and so will CBS-TV's New Year's Day coverage of the Tournament of Roses Parade — which, of course, NBC-TV will continue to cover in color.

The Channel Swim: ABC-TV's "My Three Sons" series is already renewed for next season. CBS-TV's Raymond Burr, "Perry Mason," left last weekend to entertain troops in the Far East. Television's Emmy awards will be presented May 25 on NBC-TV.

NBC-TV may do a series next season on "Mr. Magoo" of the cartoons. Steve Allen's producer quit; the last producer, Allan Sherman, was fired — not by Allen — and became "My Son, The Folksinger."

Eight persons hurt in crash

CLOVIS, N.M. (UPI)—Eight persons were injured Monday when the Santa Fe Railroad's eastbound San Francisco Chief slammed into a manure truck at a grade crossing near here.

Ten cars of the Chief were derailed. The truck driver, Warren J. Neill of Portales, N.M., and seven train passengers suffered minor injuries.

The Chief was traveling 20 to 25 miles an hour at the time.

The engineer of the derailed train, James H. Blankenship, 58, said he saw the truck on the crossing but couldn't stop the train. The truck pulled in front of the engine, he said, and the next thing he knew he was buried under "tons of manure."

Two passengers were being held in Clovis Memorial Hospital with minor injuries. They were H.T. Crenshaw, 80, Valera, Tex., and Mrs. Harold Soto, 23, Redlands, Calif.

Five Santa Fe employees received minor injuries in the derailment and were being treated at the hospital. They were Blankenship, porter Othah Livingston, 44, Oakland, Calif.; cook Eddie Walker, 42, Chicago; brakeman C.E. Hodge, 30, Clovis, N.M.; and waiter Troy Walker, 45, Chicago.

Danger less in Portland

PORTLAND (UPI)—Portland wouldn't suffer as much as Los Angeles if one of its water reservoirs should break, City Commissioner Mark A. Grayson said today.

The reservoirs in the city are much smaller in size than the Baldwin Hills Reservoir in Los Angeles and a break would not result in such a big concentration of water, he said.

Grayson also said that in event of a dam break in the Bull Run Reservoir the Sandy River canyon could carry off excess water with probably damage only to the Troutdale area, he said.

Message set by President

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson will deliver his first State of the Union message to Congress Jan. 8, it was decided today at a meeting between the President and Democratic leaders of both houses of Congress.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., said it also was decided that Congress should adjourn this Friday or Saturday and return Jan. 7.

Mansfield emphasized that the adjournment timetable was tentative, however, and subject to the consent of Republican congressional leaders.

The Democratic leader talked with reporters after President Johnson's weekly legislative meeting with the congressional leaders.

Speaker John W. McCormack, Mass., said Johnson "expressed great pleasure" over legislation Congress has passed this session on education and medical facilities.

McCormack called this legislation the "greatest" in these two fields that the current Congress has passed.

Agreement set on berry prices

SALEM (UPI)—A three-year agreement on strawberry prices for growers was announced Monday night by Birds Eye Division of General Foods and the Oregon-Washington Vegetable Growers Association.

The agreement provides a firm price to Birds Eye growers of 14 cents per pound in 1964 with floor-to-ceiling ranges of 13 to 15 cents in 1965 and 12 to 13 cents in 1966.

The 1963 price was 12 cents a pound.

Suspect taken in Portland

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation today announced the arrest of Buford John Clement, 45, who it said was wanted in Arizona on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for assault with a dangerous weapon.

John H. Williams, special agent in charge of the local FBI office, also said Clement was sought by Washington state authorities as a 1949 escapee from the Washington State Penitentiary.

Williams said Clement had been living with his wife and five children at Warrenton, Ore.

The Arizona charge involved the striking of a Tempe police officer over the head with a metal chair in 1958, the FBI said.

Clement was to be given a hearing before a U.S. commissioner here today and will be returned to Arizona, the FBI said.
