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Work to stay on schedule, solon reports

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., said Tuesday development of Washington waterways and power dams will remain on schedule through allocations provided in the new public works appropriation measure approved by Congress.

"Hardest battle was obtaining \$150,000 in the Senate to get the Tacoma Harbor project under way," said Magnuson. The senator is a member of the Appropriations Committee and the House-Senate Conference Committee which decided the final allocations. Magnuson said the House originally had provided no money for this project.

He said Washington has obtained approval for studies for Upper Columbia River navigation to Wenatchee, and the Eagle Harbor Skagit River, Snohomish River, Stillaguamish River and Tacoma-Seattle ship channel projects. Funds were also provided to continue the Puget Sound area comprehensive water study and begin the Lower Granite lock and dam.

Sugar marketing quota is fixed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today set the 1964 sugar marketing quota for the United States at 9,800,000 tons and announced partial import quotas for foreign supplying countries.

The marketing quota is 600,000 tons below the 10.4-million tons that comprised the marketing quota for 1963.

Freeman authorized for purchase and importation during the January-October, 1964 period 1 million tons of global quota sugar.
