Goldmarks are under subpoena as witnesses

OKANOGAN, Wash. (UPI)—Former State Rep. John Goldmark and his wife, Sally, Plaintiffs in a \$225,000 libel suit, were under subpoena today to testify as defense witnesses in the trial of the claim.

The subpoenas, issued by defense attorney E. Glenn Harmon, ordered them to bring to the witness stand certain documents and records.

The subpoenas drew objections from the Goldmarks' attorney, William Dwyer.

Returning to the witness stand this morning was John Lautner, New York City, who said he belonged to the Communist party nearly 20 years before he was beaten up and expelled in 1950.

Since then, he said, he has appeared as a government witness testifying as an expert on communism in about 90 cases.

He said he considered the menace of communism in the last year or two greater than before. He said, "you cannot separate the issue of a domestic threat and a foreign threat. They are all part of a world wide movement."

Lautner also testified that he knew the Communist party forced marriages between its members because he had twice been married at Communist direction.

The question was raised in earlier testimony in regard to the Goldmark marriage, with Mrs. Goldmark denying that the party was involved in her marriage to Goldmark in 1942 while she was a Communist and he was a Navy officer.

Also testifying Tuesday was Ashley Holden Sr., publisher of a weekly newspaper at Tonasket and a defendant in the suit. He defended the truth of two articles in his Tonasket Tribune for which the Goldmarks seek \$50,000 damages.

Holden said his statement that "Goldmark has sponsored measures to socialize our economy" was based on Goldmark's entire legislative record. He said, as examples, that Goldmark had voted for a high tax program and for a bill which would abolish county assessors and place their authority in Olympia.

Fiery accident claims woman

JORDAN VALLEY, Ore. (UPI)—A Salem woman burned to death near here Tuesday in the fiery crash of an automobile.

Oregon police said the woman was Vera B. Harris, 37. Her husband, Wilfred, 39, was driving the car and was hospitalized with superficial burns.

Police said the woman burned to death inside the car where it went off the Folly Farm grade on state Highway 78.

Police said they found Harris unconscious beside the burned auto.

Millionth air traveler noted

PORTLAND (UPI)—Portland's one millionth air passenger of the year arrived here Tuesday on the 60th anniversary of the Wright Brothers powered flight at Kitty Hawk, N.C.

The honored passenger was Miss Thelma Duze, San Francisco, an electronics engineer. She received a big cake from one airline, champagne from another and coffee from the Port of Portland.

Johnson calls on farm leaders to assist government in solving national problems

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson called upon the nation's diverse farm organizations today to get together and help the government solve problems of commodity surpluses, rural poverty and other agricultural matters.

The President met for about 45 minutes with a group of farm leaders, who then met for lunch with Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman to try for some understanding on "positive" programs.

Before meeting with the farm groups Johnson signed legislation designed to launch U.S. vocational education into the age of automation. The bill authorizes \$1.5 billion in new spend-

ing to expand aid to vocational schools with emphasis on training workers in new skills, increasing student loan funds and continuing federal help to schools crowded by children of federal workers or servicemen.

"Let's try to really see what we can do," Johnson told the farm group. "We don't want to talk about yesterday. Let's talk about tomorrow."

Picture-taking Session

His remarks were heard by newsmen during a brief picture-taking session at the conclusion of the meeting. Freeman afterward met with reporters and told them what had occurred.

One opponent of administration farm proposals, American

Farm Bureau Federation President Charles B. Schuman, told Johnson there was one thing his organization "cannot compromise" about. He said this was the question of "whether we are going to the market price system or a government system."

Johnson told the farm leaders that "one thing I want to see pretty quick is to get a bill up there." Newsmen did not know what he specifically referred to, but Freeman said there had been "general agreement that there was a need for wheat legislation."

The secretary said they did not get into particulars about a wheat bill, however.

Vote of confidence bolsters Aldo Moro's hand in chamber test

ROME (UPI) Aldo Moro, bolstered by a vote of confidence from the chamber of deputies, today faced another crucial test in the Italian senate.

MEASURE APPROVED

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Tuesday passed and sent to the Senate a bill to cancel \$481,000 in irrigation charges against land owned by non-Indians in the Klamath irrigation project in Oregon.

The legislation, introduced by Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., would extend exemption from payment already granted to Indian land owners.

The senate debate is expected to end Saturday with another victory for Moro's new, center-left coalition government. Tuesday night the chamber voted in favor of the government by 350 to 233 with 4 abstentions and 43 absences.

But more trouble lay ahead for Vice Premier Pietro Nenni's left-wing Socialists, partners in the coalition with Moro's

Christian Democrats, the Social Democrats and the Republicans.

Twenty-five pro-Communists within the Socialist party walked out of the chamber Tuesday night rather than vote in favor of the coalition.

The party's leaders called a meeting to consider disciplinary measures against the rebels, and a formal split within the ranks appeared almost certain in the next few days.

Apart from the secession by the pro-Communists and a one-

man revolt by right-wing Republican Randolph Pacciardi, the four-party coalition held fast. The margin of victory was considered solid.

LIGHTNING PLANS SET

PORTLAND (UPI)—The City Council Tuesday laid plans to put a 10-year street lighting levy of \$18.5 million before the voters here next May.

The council instructed the city's attorney to prepare a resolution to get the measure ready for the voters.

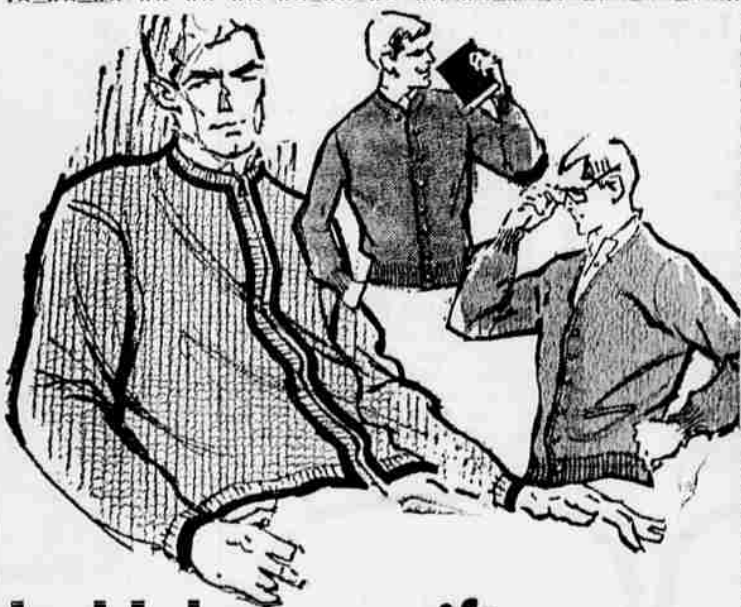
