

Elfstrom says he's urged to run for secretary of state

SALEM (UPI) — Sen. Robert Elfstrom said today he was "getting pressured" to formally announce his candidacy for secretary of state.

Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. has called a press conference for 9 a.m. Friday in the Capitol Press Room. It is expected he will announce his political plans then.

Elfstrom, a Republican and former Salem mayor, told United Press International, "I hope Appling will make his statement first."

While Appling has refused to speculate about his political plans, informed sources say the 44-year-old Republican will not seek a second year term.

Elfstrom, who flew back to Salem from Phoenix, Ariz., to rally support for his candidacy, said "I've been getting good pledges of support. I don't expect many to get in the race, although I could of course be surprised."

Elfstrom, who commented he was anxious to get back to Phoenix, where his wife is staying, said "I think Appling may make his announcement today."

But Appling was not in his office this morning. Elfstrom said, "I wanted more time to study this out, but I'm getting pressured to make my announcement now."

He added "there's room to get in" to the race. Appling had been expected to

seek a second term, and to run for governor in 1966 when Gov. Mark Hatfield's present term expires. Oregon law prohibits Hatfield from seeking a third term as governor.

Seminar set for ministers

A seminar in pastoral counseling is to be available to ministers of the Central Oregon area, with Dr. John H. Waterman, psychiatrist, as instructor and discussion leader. Dr. Waterman is director of the community services section of the mental health division, Oregon State Board of Control.

Arrangements for the course were made by the ministerial association of the local communities, in cooperation with the Tri-County Community Mental Health Clinic. Miss Helen M. Marcy, psychiatric social worker for the Tri-County Health Department, will assist.

The course was planned to assist ministers in their counseling on family and personal problems. Monthly meetings, for instruction and discussion, are to be held.

Dr. Waterman met last Friday in Redmond with ministers of the Central Oregon area, to plan the content of the course. The communities of Bend, Redmond, Prineville, Madras, Sisters and Gilchrist were represented in the group.

Staff moves into new offices

Members of the staff of the Bend District of the Deschutes National Forest this morning moved into their new offices, near the junction of Parrell Road and the Bend Trap Club road at the south city limits of Bend.

The office building, adjacent to the Virginia Apartment properties, was constructed by John Wilson, and was designed to meet needs of the Bend District office staff, headed by Ray Bennett, ranger. The office is easily reached from U.S. Highway 97, and it is expected to be a frequent stopping point for tourists, hunters and anglers.

The staff moved to the new location this morning from the old quarters on South Second and Davis Street, in the U.S. Forest Service compound. Ranger Bennett said an open house is planned for the future, when all is in ship shape in the new quarters.
