School to carry Kennedy name

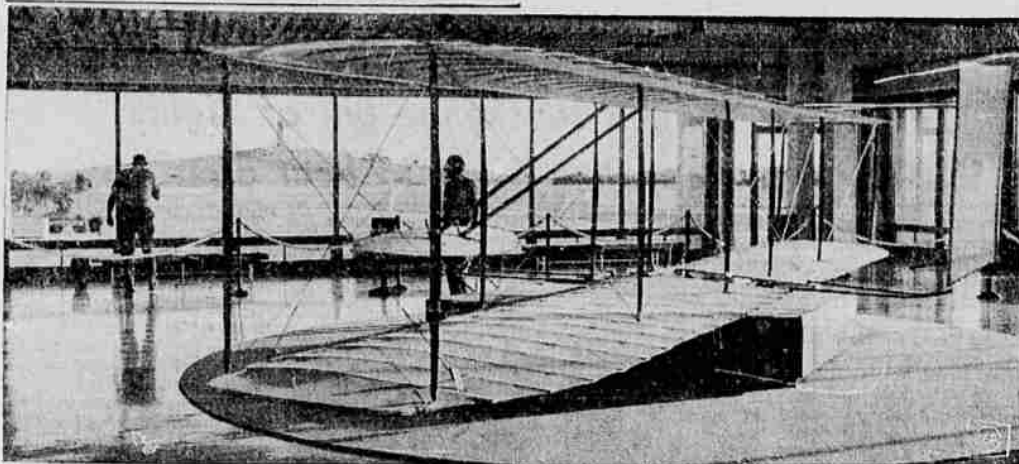
SALEM (UPI) — A new elementary school to be built next summer in the Keizer area north of here will be named the John F. Kennedy school.

Total eclipse of moon due on December 30

A big Christmas-week moon, which last night made brief appearances through clouds, is headed for its full phase and a blackout on the early morning of Monday, December 30.

The occasion will be a total eclipse of the lunar orb. As seen from Central Oregon, the moon will dip into the light fringe of the earth's conical shadow some 238,000 miles out in space at about 12:25 a.m. Monday and will move into the edge of the dark shadow at 1:25 a.m.

Totally, as viewed from the Oregon country, will begin at 2:27 a.m. and will end at 3:46 a.m. Persons who get out of bed at that early hour may have a little trouble in locating the full moon, if the eclipse proves to be a real "dark."

Across the continent, amateur astronomers will be on the alert, to assist professional sky gazers in determining the "darkness" of the eclipse. Actually, the moon never disappears in total eclipses.

Always, there is a considerable variation of brightness. Part of this is due to the position of the moon when in the umbral, or dark shadow. Various areas of coloration will be noted on the moon during the period of totality.

The eclipse will be total over the entire Oregon country.

Water turned into canals

Taking advantage of the comparatively mild winter weather, the management of the Central Oregon Irrigation District, with headquarters in Redmond, has turned water into canals of the system.

The flow will continue over the weekend, making it possible for residents of the big district to fill their cisterns and stock ponds.

Sheep killing cases studied

Two cases of sheep killing by dogs are under investigation, according to Jess H. Smith Jr., county dog warden.

One sheep was killed and at least two others were badly torn, Thursday morning at the R. E. Clark place on Ward Road, about three miles north-east of Bend. Ralph Boese, in the same neighborhood, reported that three of his sheep were killed Tuesday or Wednesday, when the family was away from home for a holiday visit.

At the Clark place, three dogs attacked the sheep in broad daylight, Smith said. One of the dogs was shot and killed by a neighbor, who was summoned by Mrs. Clark. The other two escaped, and an effort is being made to identify their owners.

Other residents in the Ward Road area reported that two sheep are missing, Smith said. The attacks on sheep this week are the first instances of molestation of domestic animals by dogs reported since mid-November.

Last month, Jim Selken, Forbes Road, lost approximately 30 chukars and 30 pheasants. A large black dog killed a number of them, and some escaped when the pen was torn open, Selken told officers. At about the same time, Bill Gassner, Butler Road reported the killing of three pheasants by a dog.

Payment for animals and fowl killed by dogs is made from a fund established through the sale of dog licenses. Payment has been made for the chukars and pheasants, Smith said.

Itinerary announced for Pope Paul's pilgrimage

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI)—Israeli authorities have announced the official itinerary for Pope Paul VI's pilgrimage to Christian shrines in Israel next week.

The pontiff is scheduled to arrive from Jordan at the town of Megiddo, 18 miles southeast of Haifa, on the morning of Jan. 5. Israeli President Zalman Shazar, Premier Levi Eshkol,

other Israeli ministers and five senior members of the diplomatic corps will meet the Pope at Megiddo.

Shazar is to welcome the Pope in Hebrew, presenting him with a special medallion struck in his honor. Pope Paul is to be driven to Nazareth to pray at the Grotto of the Annunciation—reputedly the site where an angel appeared to announce the forthcoming birth of Jesus Christ to His mother Mary.

From Nazareth, the Pope will proceed to Mount Tabor, stopping there at the Basilica of the Transfiguration, revered as the place where Jesus is believed to have ascended with three of His disciples.

The Pope and his party will then proceed to Tabgha to tour the Church of the Loaves and Fishes and will go on to visit Capernaum, in whose synagogue Christ is said to have

taught. Pope Paul will dine and rest on the Mount of Beatitudes, traditional site of the Sermon on the Mount and Jesus' selection of His apostles.

He will then go to Jerusalem, where he will visit the room of the Last Supper on Mount Zion and see the Abbey of Dormition.
