## LBJ tightens his drive for U.S. economy

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (UPI) — President Johnson today strengthened his drive for federal economy especially in military spending and indicated he wants a close consultative relationship with former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Johnson said Friday he had directed Central Intelligence Agency Director John A. McCone to set up a meeting with Eisenhower and discuss the Johnson administration's economic drive.

The Eisenhower-McCone meeting also would review intelligence in world affairs for the Republican and explain the administration's actions on suggestions Eisenhower has made since Nov. 22.

The President announced he had set up a board of top defense officials to survey military installations that could be reduced in cost or closed "over the next several years."

Earlier he announced closing or reduction of 33 defense installations and said Friday the action drew mail almost five to one in favor of the action.

In his sixth on-the-record news conference, Johnson also announced:

—He will meet Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateos at Los Angeles and Palm Springs, Calif., Feb. 21-22.

—Teodoro Moscoso had been relieved of duties coordinating the Alliance for Progress. Thomas C. Mann, recently designated assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs, will assume the responsibility. Moscoso, with the rank of ambassador, will be a special advisor to Mann.

—The President disclosed that cabinet departments had cut their budget requests by \$731 million and 10,000 jobs only three days after he told them to trim their spending plans. He said federal employment dropped, largely through attrition, by more than 1,000 jobs in November. He noted a 3,500-job drop in federal employment since November, 1963, but said the record of eliminating non-essential jobs must be improved.

Johnson answered questions by newsmen at a barbecue at the LBJ ranch.

Some 200 reporters and photographers were guests of Johnson on the front lawn beside the Pedernales River. He spoke from a lectern perched on a stack of hay bales.

## Father, son die on slopes of Mt. Index

EVERETT, Wash. (UPI) — A rescue party resumed efforts today to bring out the bodies of a Seattle man and his 12-year-old son who died on the slopes of Mt. Index early Friday morning of cold and exhaustion.

Dangerous terrain and light conditions forced a halt to the attempt Friday night to recover the bodies of Horace Gates, 41, and his son, Frank.

A second son, Louis, 13, was found unconscious about 50 yards from the remains of a fire apparently built to keep the group warm.

Gates was found dead with an arm around Frank. A third son, William, 16, hiked down the mountain during the night to alert authorities of the trouble at the 3,000-foot level of the 5,639-foot peak. He was treated for exposure at a Monroe, Wash., hospital and sent home.

Louis was treated at the same hospital after being lifted out by helicopter and also was discharged after treatment for exposure.

The four were on a one-day hike above Lake Serene when they strayed off the trail they were following. They decided to camp for the night but Frank collapsed from cold and exhaustion and William set out for help.

Little hope held on eclipse

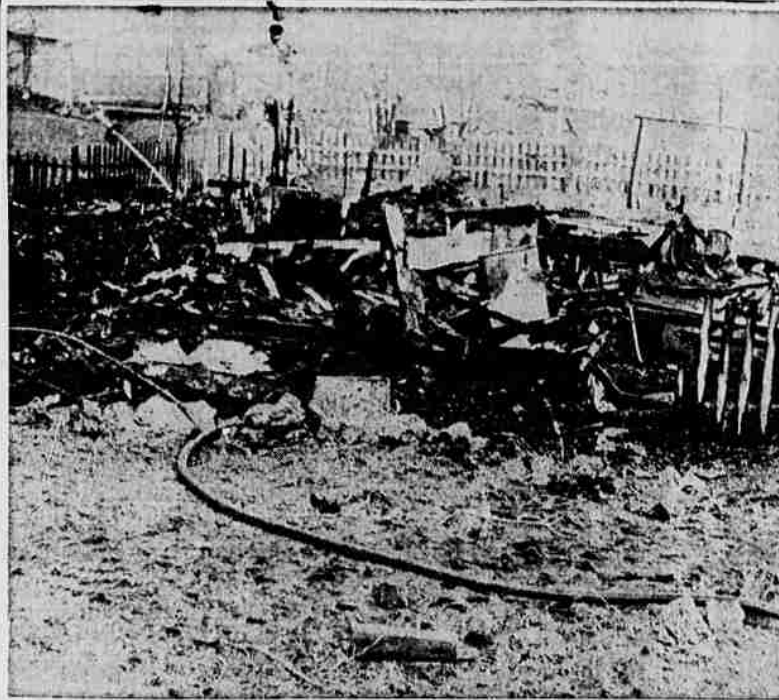
PORTLAND (UPI) — The Weather Bureau here held out little hope today that wakeful Oregonians will be able to see an eclipse of the moon early Monday.

The full eclipse will begin at 1:25 a.m. PST and the moon will be completely in the earth's shadow from 2:28 to 3:47. It will emerge entirely from the shadow at 4:50 a.m.

The eclipse, caused by the earth passing between the moon and the sun, will be visible throughout North America and from the west coast of South America, weather permitting.

"It doesn't look very hopeful," a Weather Bureau spokesman said.

## Official takes verbal blow at rights groups

PORTLAND (UPI) — The national chairman of the Afro-American Association said Friday his organization believes the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and other civil rights groups are concerned only with the middle class Negro.

Oakland attorney Donald Warden said that the present posture of the civil rights groups "is not only misleading, but doing more harm than good."

Warden, here to speak on his organization and its aims, accused the NAACP of taking a "legal approach" toward segregating schools and ignoring the real criterion.

"The real purpose of education is to learn," Warden said. "They are measuring educational progress in terms of how many schools are desegregated. If desegregation were all there is to it, that would be fine."

He continued, "schools are largely desegregated in the North, and the dropout rate among Negroes is higher in the North than it is in the South. Of Negroes in graduate schools in the North, more are from the South than from the North."

Warden said his organization, which has 5,000 members, is conducting a program in the San Francisco Bay area aimed at educating the masses of Negroes and instilling in them a pride of race that will move them to help themselves.

He said they are taught such things as how to register for night classes or how to buy a used car, in addition to reading and writing in "street schools."

"We reach some people in meetings, some on the radio, and the only way to get many of the prospects is to go into the street," Warden said.

**Dog discourages would-be thief**

## Cooper reports on highway construction in past year

SALEM (UPI) — The State Highway Department awarded \$107.6 million in contracts during 1963—\$31 million more than were awarded in 1962, Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said today.

In all, 168 contracts were awarded, compared with 195 the year before, Cooper said.

He estimated the department would let \$61 million in contracts during 1964.

Of the \$107.6 million contracted during the year, \$16.7 million was for bond projects, \$3.2 million for construction on the county road system, \$260,000 for work on city streets off the state highway system, \$3.4 million in cooperation with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in connection with the relocation of U.S. 30 near the John Day Dam, \$80.1 million was in connection with federal aid participating projects, and \$3.9 million was for state-financed construction.

Contracts awarded in 1963 included 158 miles of grading, 184 miles of rock base construction, 86 miles of oiled wearing surface, 130 miles of asphaltic concrete pavement, 4 miles of Portland cement pavement, and 89 bridges and structures.

About 50 miles of interstate highway was completed or opened to traffic during the year. At year-end, 116 miles were under construction to freeway standards. This leaves 260 miles to be put under construction to complete the interstate highway system in Oregon before the target date of 1972.

The highway department and U.S. Corps of Engineers are relocating the Columbia River Highway between Rufus and Boardman to skirt waters to be impounded behind John Day Dam. The 28-mile stretch between Rufus and Arlington is all on new location high on a hill. East from Arlington to Boardman much of the Columbia River Highway will be salvaged and become a part of the final four-lane divided interstate freeway.

About 208 miles downstream from the John Day Dam, construction is underway on the \$24 million bridge over the Columbia between Astoria and Megler, Wash.

South from Ashland to the California state line, the rugged Siskiyou are bowing to the highway builders. During 1963 three contracts were let involving the expenditure of \$13.7 million for the construction of 8½ miles of highway.

## More military bases may be trimmed by LBJ

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson, apparently confident he has public support for cutting unneeded military bases, wants the Defense Department to look for even more installations to eliminate.

Johnson announced Friday he had asked Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara to appoint a board for more intensive study of the need for 6,700 bases that now exist.

He added that reaction to the department's announcement two weeks ago that it was closing or curtailing 33 military bases was running 5-to-1 in favor of the cutbacks.

Thomas D. Morris, assistant defense secretary for installations and logistics, was appointed by Johnson to study ways of trimming military installations. He has been working in the field under orders from McNamara since 1961.

A special committee also was set up to study the efficiency of 11 naval shipyards. It is known that the Defense Department plans to close four of the shipyards, but it is expected that the Pentagon will take its time deciding which ones.

The announcement on the closing may not come for another 12 months which would be after the presidential elections.

Since the Morris studies began more than 400 military facilities have been closed or curtailed. But there still are about as many as there were in the first place—6,700.

The reason that the figures do not show a net reduction is that there have been new missile, radar and other facilities opened. Also, as McNamara has explained, it is difficult to define just what comprises defense facilities and to keep a precise count.

## RATIFIES COFFEE PACT

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States deposited with the United Nations Friday its ratification of the international coffee agreement designed to set a floor under the world price for coffee.

Ratification by the United States, which imports 60 per cent of the world's coffee, was necessary to bring into effect the agreement negotiated in 1962.
