

McKinley does it— victories bring U. S. coveted Davis Cup

ADELAIDE, Australia (UPI)—Chuck McKinley, a 22-year-old native of St. Louis, Mo., whose temper tantrums once brought tennis disgrace to the United States, brought the Davis Cup back to Uncle Sam's shores today with a 10-12, 6-2, 9-7, 6-2 victory over Australia's John Newcombe.

McKinley's triumph in the fifth and concluding match of the 1963 challenge round came after Australian champion Roy Emerson evened the series at 2-2 with a 6-2, 6-3, 3-6, 6-2 win over Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif.

The victory marked the first time the United States has won the silver cup symbolic of world amateur tennis supremacy since 1958. Australia had held the cup for the last four years and for 11 of the last 13 years.

Tops Wimbledon Showing

For McKinley, a 5-foot, 8-inch, 155-pound "bomber" who was subjected to international criticism a few years ago when he threw his racket into the grandstands during an interzone Davis Cup final at Perth, Australia, today's victory marked the peak of his career—a triumph even greater than his win at Wimbledon.

It came when Australia seemed about to snatch the Davis Cup away from the United States which had taken a 2-1 lead in the series Friday when McKinley and Ralston defeated Emerson and Neale Fraser in the doubles competition. Fraser was so disappointed in

his performance that he announced before today's first singles match that he was retiring "for good."

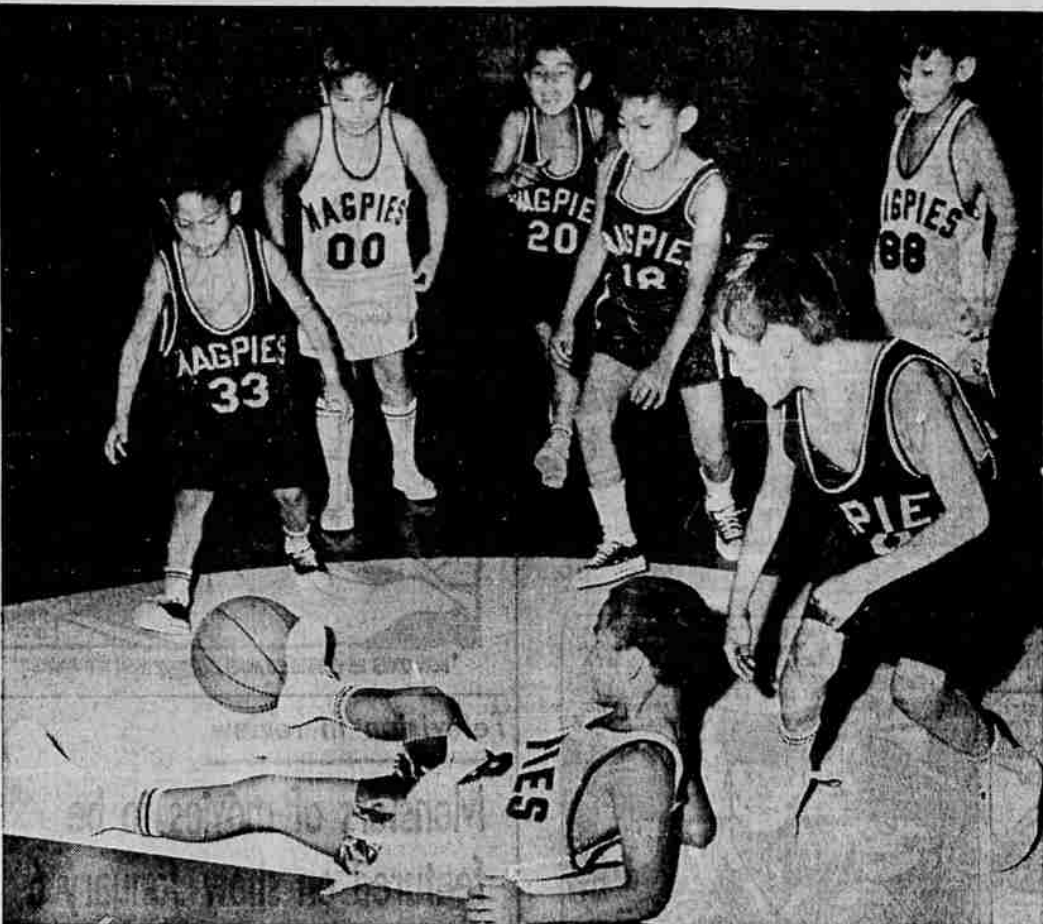
But with a crowd of 7,000 looking on the 27-year-old Emerson literally picked apart Ralston's game and subjected him to a humiliating defeat. Then the 19-year-old Newcombe thrilled the crowd by beating McKinley in the first set of their decisive match.

McKinley Takes Control

It looked like the United States' young tennis hopefuls were about to come apart at the seams but McKinley, a mathematics student at Trinity University, steadied a seasoned champion and took control of both his and Newcombe's game.

The match ended on the eighth game on McKinley's service when his service ball skidded and was almost impossible for Newcombe to handle. The ball trickled off his racket and fell a few feet short of the net.

The Americans immediately rushed onto the court and lifted both McKinley and U. S. captain Bob Kelleher to their shoulders. The predominantly Australian crowd cheered the winners lustily and photographers clustered around them.

Oregon dumps Cougs, 79-62, to make semis

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Defending champion Oregon State meets Colorado State and Oregon plays Brigham Young in the semi-finals of the eighth annual Far West Basketball Classic tonight.

Oregon, with Steve Jones setting a school one game scoring record with 37 points, defeated Washington State 79-62 and Brigham Young topped Seattle 77-74 in first round games of the four-day, eight-team tournament Friday night.

Oregon State and Colorado State posted opening round victories Thursday night.

In consolation games today, Washington State met Seattle

and Louisiana State faces Iowa. The finals of the tournament will be played Monday night.

Jones' performance came on the heels of a 48-point effort by 7-foot Mel Counts in Oregon State's first round win over Louisiana State.

Jones made 21 points in the first half and 16 in the second half to break Oregon's scoring mark of 36 points held by Charlie Warren and Charlie Franklin.

The 6-5 senior from Portland hit 16 of 23 field goal attempts and made 5 for 5 from the free throw line as the Ducks collected their first win in five starts this season.

Oregon, which led 30-24 at halftime, got 16 points from Jim Barnett and 13 from Jim Johnson.

Jon Stanley hit a field goal with 28 seconds remaining and Mike Gardner added two free throws with seven seconds left to give Brigham Young its victory over Seattle, previously unbeaten in six games.

The Cougars' five starters were in double figures. Bob Quinney led the way with 15 points. Dick Nemelka collected 14, Mike Gardner and John Fairchild each made 13 and Steve Kramer added 10.

The Chieftains, who led 40-39 at halftime, were paced by L.J. Wheeler, with 17 and Charlie Williams, with 16.

Clay avoids draft physical, now in Florida

NEW YORK (UPI)—Cassius Clay, the poetic pugilist, was scheduled to take a pre-induction physical examination at the U. S. Army Induction Center here at 7 a.m., EST, today. He never showed up.

The glib heavyweight contender was in the balmy climes of Florida, it developed, but not illegally. At about 10 a.m., impatient Army officials here were informed that Clay had arranged to have his papers transferred from New York to Florida.

"He now belongs to Florida," an Army official said. "New York will never see him."

Clay, 21, a prime physical specimen, is scheduled to fight heavyweight champion Sonny Liston in Miami on Feb. 25. Liston has implied that Clay's physical condition will deteriorate during the bout.

Clay has requested deferment of his induction until after the fight.

Rodriguez gets bout nod

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Louis Rodriguez scored a unanimous decision Friday night over Wilbert McClure, then set his sights on a return match with Emile Griffith for the welterweight title.

Rodriguez, who speaks five languages and knows twice as many dance steps, said: "I want Griffith, and I'll fight him for the championship any place and any time."

Angelo Dundee, who manages the Cuban dance master and former welterweight champ, said, "Let's make that time early next year."

McClure used his longer reach to hold the 151-pound Rodriguez at bay during most of the first five rounds, piling up points with looping jabs and short stabs from both sides.

Rodriguez took a hard right on the chin in the sixth, clinched, sprang to life and decked the 159-pound Toledo, Ohio, schoolteacher for an eight-count with a vicious uppercut.

McClure didn't recover from the blow until the last 15 seconds of the 10th when he covered Rodriguez' jaw with a series of rivet-like jabs. But it was too late.

Unlucky 13 fails to foil invaders

Even unlucky 13 failed to bother the high-flying Denver Invaders.

The Invaders humbled the Los Angeles Blades 9-1 Friday night for their 13th consecutive victory on home ice. They also extended their Western Hockey League lead over the second-place Blades to 11 points.

In the night's only other game, Pete Panagabko slammed home a goal with a minute and 17 seconds left to play to give the San Francisco Seals a 4-3 win over the Vancouver Canucks. The win boosted San Francisco into fourth place in the league—one point ahead of Vancouver.

Rudy Migay and Steve Witluk were the scoring stars for Denver. Migay scored two goals and had two assists, while Witluk had two goals and one assist.

The Invaders scored twice in the first period, added four more goals in the second period and had three in the final period. Denver goalie Al Millar, meanwhile, saw just 24 shots. The one that got by him was a second period shot by Blade center Norm Johnson.

Panagabko's winning goal was a beautiful solo effort. He beat a Vancouver defenseman at the Canucks blue line, weaved past two more defenders and faked goalie Marcel Paille to one side before depositing the puck.

San Francisco's other goals were by Nick Mickoski, Al Nicholson and Jerry Brisson. Vancouver's goals were scored by Buddy Boone, Phil Maloney and Dave Duke.

Only two games are on the WHL schedule tonight. Los Angeles tries again at Denver and Portland is at Seattle.

Odds makers favor West 11 by 3 in annual Shrine tilt

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The nation's greatest football players run today so that the weak may walk.

It's the 39th renewal of the Shrine East-West grid classic—the second-oldest bowl game in the country.

The West, with a pair of pinpoint passers in Don Trull of Baylor and Bill Munson of Utah State, has been installed as a three-point favorite in a late switching of odds. The East had started out as a two-point favorite.

Kickoff time is 4:45 p.m., EST, and the game will be televised nationally. The forecast is for "fair" weather. A crowd of 60,000 fans will jam Kezar Stadium.

The game is expected to turn into a ground vs. air battle with the East sticking mostly to a running game.

"I'm afraid that the boys in the East line may be too tough for us to handle," said head coach Jim Sutherland of the West. "If they establish

Bills, Patriots vie in East go

BUFFALO, N. Y. (UPI)—The Buffalo Bills and Boston Patriots, with a winter scene as the backdrop, tangle for the Eastern Division title today and a berth in the American Football League championship game Jan. 5 in balmy Southern California.

The Bills and Patriots move into snow-drenched War Memorial Stadium for the first playoff game in the four-year history of the AFL—the climax to a madcap Eastern Division race that saw the Houston Oilers dethroned after a three-year reign.

Buffalo is a two and one-half point choice to beat Boston in the nationally televised game on ABC-TV at 1:05 p.m. EST and meet the Western Division champion Chargers eight days from now in San Diego.

The Bills and Boston each finished with a 7-6 record and split regular season games. Buffalo won, 28-21, here Oct. 26 and the Patriots rebounded, 17-7, four weeks later in Fenway Park.

The cold, snowy weather has attracted just about as much attention as the playoff contest but this Queen City on the Great Lakes has been buzzing with tension for two weeks and Buffalo officials predict that between 35,000 and 40,000 will see the game "live."

Tar Heels slim favorites in 'Gator Bowl

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—The North Carolina Tar Heels, who gained a share of their first Atlantic Coast Conference title on a balanced blend of offense and defense, were slim favorites today against the Air Force Academy and triple-threat ace Terry Isaacson in the 19th annual Gator Bowl game.

A near sell-out crowd of about 50,000 was expected for what shaped up as a close, high-scoring duel. The weather forecast called for clear skies and temperatures in the balmy 60s. The contest, possibly one of the best of bowl attractions, was to be nationally televised (CBS) with kickoff at 1:45 p.m. EST.

Today's game marks the first time since the heyday of Choo Choo Justice that the Tar Heels have won a bowl bid. They did it this year with an 8-2 record that included a 31-10 victory over North Carolina State, the ACC co-champion.

In Justice's day, North Carolina made three bowl trips in four years and lost each time. This is the second bowl game for the Air Force which began the football only seven years ago. The Air Force played a scoreless tie with Texas Christian in the 1958 Cotton Bowl.

The Air Force earned its bid to the Gator Bowl on a 7-3 record that included victories over Nebraska which is playing in the Orange Bowl and Washington which is playing in the Rose Bowl.

If North Carolina was to uphold its role of 2-point favorite, the Tar Heels had to stop Isaacson, a run-pass-and-punt quarterback who was third in the nation in scoring (80 points) and fifth in total offense with 1,747 yards.

If Carolina, second best defensive team in the ACC, can stop Isaacson, it should be able to contain the Air Force offense since the stumpy senior quarterback gained more than half of the Falcons' total yardage this past season.

Magpies break 100 to annihilate Papooses, play Fort Peck for casaba title

MADRAS — Warm Springs' determined Magpies face the powerful Fort Peck, Mont., Warriors tonight at 7:30 for the All-Indian Holiday Basketball Tournament championship.

That's the picture today, after both teams broke the century mark in semi final victories last night at the Madras Union High School gymnasium. The Warm Springs nation overwhelmed the Toppensish, Wash., Papooses 102-58 and Fort Peck squad ran roughshod over Chiloquin, 107-81.

It was the second straight win for both squads in the three-day, eight-team, double elimination affair that culminates with the championship battle this evening.

This afternoon, the Lapwai, Idaho, Nez Perce's battled Toppensish and the Sprague River Ducks fought it out against the Chiloquin Thunderbirds. The winners (yet unannounced) will play tonight in the preliminary for third and fourth places.

Two Eliminated

Last night saw two squads eliminated. The Wapato, Wash., Hawks packed up their goodie bags after taking an 85-72 shellacking from Sprague River, and the Warm Springs Cougars, a substitute team for the Brownings, Mont., Redskins who were not able to make it at the last minute, went to the showers after being trounced by Lapwai, 85-74.

Substitute Al Clements dumped in 17 points, Hank Palmer got 16, and Ellison David poured

ed through 14 in the losing effort. Lapwai's victory came on the strength of a 37 point effort by the two Taylor brothers. Gary Taylor canned 20, and Charles Taylor garnered 17.

DeMerle Lytle shot down the Wapato Hawks with a 36 point scoring effort for Sprague River. Dennis Flander dumped in 18, and Junior Adams got 16, however, in losing efforts for the Hawks.

Not Enough?

Perhaps the tournament's oddest development occurred in the first game last night. It happened to the Chiloquin Thunderbirds. Three starters boomed 24 or more points apiece, but it fell way short of the pace set by the Fort Peck Warriors.

Ed Case, who last night poured through 43 tallies, had another good evening with 25, Pat Barney got 24, and Tony Wilder banked through 23...all in a losing cause.

Dick Wiegand and Norm Redbird did the damage for Fort Peck. Wiegand seemingly ignored defenders and blitzed the hoop with amazing regularity. When the dust cleared he had 43 points. Redbird held up his end of the responsibility by canning 22 tallies.

Magpies Balanced

Warm Springs' surprising Magpies spread the bulk of their 102 points over four players. Kaniun Smith topped the scoring with a 23 point effort. Jim Macy hit 21. Byron Patt and Tom Estimo each got 14, and substitute Vernon Tanewash came off the bench to contribute 13.

This afternoon from 1 to 4, saw three solid hours of entertainment for basketball viewers in the form of Indian ceremonies and dances. Running in conjunction with the basketball tournament has been a companion All-Indian bowling tournament.
