PORTLAND (UPI)—Two Oregon industrialists, Thomas F. Sandoz of Astoria and Ralph A. Clapman of Corvallis, have been elected to the board of directors of Pacific Power & Light Co., it was announced today.

Paul B. McKee, chairman of the PP&L board, noted both men were long-time residents of two important communities served by the firm and also were leaders in two major Northwest industries, commercial fisheries and forest products.

Sandoz, long active in Clatsop County business and civic affairs, has been associated with the commercial fishing industry since 1928 and is chairman of the board of Bumble Bee Seafoods.

Chapman is known as an inventor of wood products processes and equipment. He and his associates presently operated the Wood Processes, Oregon, Ltd., a development firm, and Chapman-Wheeler, Inc., which manufactures equipment, both in Corvallis, and Clad-Wood Co., Sweet Home, which plans to market a new exterior building board product.

SPIDER WEAVES TROUBLE

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI)—A spider almost knocked a radio station off the air Sunday.

Station WQXL was operating at about one-fourth power Sunday morning and three engineers investigated the cause.

They found that a spider had spun a web in the housing on a pole outside the transmitter holding the program signal. The web apparently got wet and shortcircuited the line, reducing broadcasts to nearly a whisper.

Details of BPA budget reported

PORTLAND (UPI) — Details of Bonneville Power Administration's \$49,704,000 budget for the 1964 fiscal year were announced today by Administrator Charles F. Luce.

The budget provides for a \$36,204,000 construction program and \$13.5 million for operation and maintenance.

Luce said the construction items include \$1.5 million for preliminary engineering and \$5 million for construction of the Northwest - Pacific Southwest power intertie, but that work cannot be started until a bill giving the Northwest preference on power produced in the region is passed by Congress.

Luce said construction would continue on all major grid additions, but President Johnson's pleas for economy have resulted in deferring appropriations for less critical projects, cutting back personnel and making savings on operation and maintenance.

BPA's major construction and engineering programs for the year include work on a new 500,000-volt extra high voltage "backbone" grid; building transmission facilities for power from John Day Dam, lower Snake River projects and the Hanford, Wash., generating plant; tests of extra high voltage direct current transmission; new industrial service facilities, and new area facilities to meet use demands.

The largest budget item for major grid additions is \$7.15 million for the Vantage-Covington project in Washington. Others include Snohomish - Blaine

No. 2, \$4.3 million; Big Eddy-Keeler, \$4.25 million; Puget Sound area service, \$3.3 million; Bell-Boundary, \$1.9 million; Alvey-Reedsport, \$1.9 million; Olympia-Aberdeen No. 2, \$1.75 million; Reston - Fairview No. 2, \$1.7 million; John Day-Keeler, \$800,000; Noxon - Hot Springs No. 2, \$290,000; Chehalis-Longview No. 3, \$156,000, and Cougar-Eugene \$66,000.

The construction budget also includes \$3,883,000 for industrial services and \$2,645,000 for system reactive facilities.
