'Bedsheet' ballot is in prospect

Political activity has started early, this election year, with indications pointing to a "bedsheet" ballot in the May primary, and lively contests, at most levels, in November.

In a year with a United States president to be elected, more than average interest can be expected in politics, and hopefuls for state, county and even city offices are already making their plans. There has been a surge of voter registrations in Deschutes county, Clerk Helen Dacey reported, and a number of possible candidates are eyeing the March 6 deadline for filing for the May primary.

Central Oregon residents will elect a state representative and a state senator, as well as filling four county offices, joining in the vote for a state secretary of state, treasurer, attorney general and three supreme court justices, and marking congressional ballots.

Terms of Representative Kessler Cannon, R., and Senator Boyd Overhulse, D., expire at the end of the year, and neither has so far announced intention of seeking another go at the state legislature. Apparently other possible candidates in both parties are waiting for the decisions of the incumbents, before tossing their hats in the ring.

Deschutes county will elect a county judge, a commissioner, sheriff and surveyor. Already one contest is assured for November, with Fred Shepard, Republican incumbent, and E. L. (Al) Nielsen, Democrat, in the race for commissioner.

The only office to be filled locally this year on the judicial ballot is that of the Redmond justice of the peace D. L. Ellis, the incumbent, said today that he will seek reelection. He will complete his second six-year term at the end of the year.

The City of Bend will elect five commissioners in November, but the filing deadline is 72 days before the election, and little activity in this category is expected before the primary. Commissioners whose terms are expiring are Leon Devereaux, Charles Cleveland, C. J. Rice, Dick Carlson and Nielsen, who will not be in the commission race because he is seeking a county office. Paul Reynolds and Jack Dempsey, who polled the most votes in the election two years ago, carry over for another two years.

Members of the Oregon congressional delegation will make their semi-annual bid to the electorate, and Central and Eastern Oregon residents will be filling the post held by Al Ullman, D., Baker.

Tentative pact on Clatsop Spit plan is reached

SALEM (UPI) — Tentative agreement on a proposed lease of about 900 acres of state land in the Clatsop Spit area at the mouth of the Columbia River to the Bunker Hill Mining Company of Kellogg, Idaho, was reached at a special Lease Board meeting here today.

The lease was forwarded to the attorney general for approval.

The lease is expected to be signed shortly after the justice department approves the document.

Bunker Hill plans to extract the black sands, which are largely magnetite, from the beach sands and then, through a concentrating method, end up with a sintered iron nodule—a substitute for scrap iron used by steel mills.

If the project works out as expected, Bunker Hill will build a \$12 million steel mill near the area. Royalties from the sand could amount to about \$50,000 a year.

The total project covers about 2,500 acres of land, including about 900 acres of state land. The company is negotiating with Clatsop County, the federal government, and some private owners for the balance of the area.

Bunker Hill will furnish a \$50,000 bond, and is required to spend a minimum of \$25,000 during the first two years for mineral exploration, under terms of the 25 year lease.

Company spokesmen said they expected to have exploration work completed in from three to five months after the lease is signed.

The state and county have agreed to hold rents and royalties in escrow until the boundary question is settled.

Approval given for addition

REDMOND — A 32-acre addition to Redmond, containing 68 building lots, has been approved by the Redmond Planning Commission, Deschutes County Court and Central Oregon Irrigation District, according to its owners, Dan Heierman and Walter McCormick, both of Redmond.

The new addition, located in the city limits, has 15th Street as its eastern boundary; 17th Street on the west; Obsidian Avenue on the north and Quartz Avenue, south. The land was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. John Eberhard.

City water and electric power are available on all the lots, which range from 100 by 130 to 322 by 100. Homes are restricted to one per lot, with a minimum size of 1000 square feet.

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Lewis and Clark thoroughfare group selected

SALEM (UPI) — Appointment of a special committee to plan Oregon's participation in the proposed Lewis and Clark national recreational thoroughfare was announced today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Named were Glenn Jackson, State Highway Commission chairman; Marshall N. Dana, Portland conservationist; P. W. Schneider, state game director; Thomas Vaughan, director of the Oregon Historical Society; Lew Nichols, staff assistant, Portland Chamber of Commerce; and Harold Schick, state parks superintendent.

Hatfield said the committee will assist Dan Allen, natural resources committee secretary, in making an inventory of sites along the route followed by the Lewis and Clark expedition to pinpoint existing and potential features of interest.

The plan for designation of the Lewis and Clark trail from St. Louis to the Oregon coast and return was originally advanced by the late J. N. Darling, cartoonist for the Des Moines, Iowa Register.

Darling suggested a coordinated development of sites along the route for their historic, recreational, and wildlife values, with access to the trail to be provided where it does not follow present roads and highways.

Current studies are being coordinated throughout the 10-state route traversed by the party by the new Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. Allen was recently named liaison officer for the state in dealing with the federal agency.

A number of Oregon areas already have been designated in commemoration of the Lewis and Clark journey, including Fort Clatsop national monument near Astoria; a memorial at the site of the expedition's salt cairn in Seaside; and Lewis and Clark State Park near the Sandy River east of Portland.

Treated, x-rayed and released from St. Charles Memorial Hospital was Craig Coyner, Jr., of 1062 E. Tenth. Police said his cycle was dragged 35 feet after the impact by a car driven by George Francis, 80, of 518 E. Second.

The collision occurred as young Craig motored westward on Franklin and Francis pulled onto Franklin from Second. The impact immediately threw the youth off of his cycle.

Neither vehicle suffered heavy damage, police said.

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Nkrumah overpowered, disarmed man who attempted to kill him

ACCRA, Ghana (UPI)—President Kwame Nkrumah overpowered and disarmed the man who tried to kill him with five pistol shots, officials said today.

One of the president's security guards was killed by the shots Thursday. It was the third unsuccessful attempt against the 54-year-old Nkrumah in the last 17 months and the fourth since 1956.

Officials said Nkrumah took the pistol away from the unidentified man, who was wearing a police uniform, and knocked him down before soldiers and

police closed in outside Flagstaff House, the presidential residence.

"Don't hurt him. Don't kill him. Put your guns down," the president was quoted as saying.

Despite the fact the assailant wore a police uniform, informed sources said it still was not clear whether he actually was a member of the force.

The government said all five shots were fired at close range Thursday but all missed the president.

"The assailant was arrested immediately and is in custody," a government announcement said. It did not identify the gunman further.

Nkrumah has been wounded in only one of the four known attempts to assassinate him, a bomb-throwing incident in August, 1962. Details of his injury and recovery have never been made public and it was only recently confirmed that he had been hurt in the attempt.

Nkrumah has moved increasingly toward strong personal rule since Ghana gained its independence. He recently announced plans for a referendum to make Ghana formally a one-party state and said the single party would be his own National Convention party.

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
