Group to look into sale of Alvord Ranch

EUGENE (UPI) — Gordon Brunton, president of the Oregon Association of Real Estate Boards, said today the group would look into the sale of the \$500,000 Alvord Ranch in Harney County.

Brunton said the association's professional standards and ethics committee would investigate last November's sale upon request of Lester Crane of Redmond, past president of the Central Oregon Board of Realtors.

The property was sold to Robert B. Wilson, president of the Warm Springs Lumber Co. and president of the Port of Portland Commission, by Jim Pogue of Rocky Hill, Inc., Exeter, Calif. The transaction was handled by the Oregon Development Co. of Salem.

James F. Short, state director of agriculture, is one of three partners in the Oregon Development Co. He said he served only in an "advisory capacity" with the transaction being handled by another partner.

Brunton said that "on the surface there seems to be nothing wrong or unethical and it appears to be more a case of somebody being beaten to the punch on a sale."

Brunton added, "As far as we are concerned, it doesn't make any difference if a man holds two jobs." But he said the association would investigate "because it has been requested by one of our boards."

Short said in Salem today that someone "apparently is trying to embarrass me."

Short said that several years ago, before he was agriculture director, he arranged a sale of the property, but the owner took the ranch off the market. At that time, Short would any future sale.

Births outnumber deaths over two to one in county

Births outnumbered deaths more than two-to-one, in Deschutes county last year. The county recorded 622 births and 294 deaths, including stillbirths, in 1963, according to figures compiled in the Tri-County Health Department office.

There are more boys than girls among the new native citizens, with 54 per cent traditionally shod in blue booties, and 46 per cent in pink.

Heart ailments were the major cause of death, accounting for 41 per cent of the total, exclusive of the stillbirths. There were 144 deaths from heart disease — 77 in Bend and 37 in Redmond.

Bend was the birthplace of 327 of the infants, 175 boys and 152 girls. Redmond counted 295 babies, 159 boys and 136 girls.

Cancer was the second most prevalent cause of death, with a count of 40. Twenty-two of the cancer deaths were in Bend; 18 in Redmond.

Thirty-two persons died of cerebral hemorrhage; 22 were victims of pneumonia, and 16 lost their lives as the result of accidents.

There were 16 stillbirths, and seven infants failed to survive because of prematurity. Eight persons died of diseases of the lungs; six each of hemorrhage and intestinal hemorrhage; five of kidney ailments. There were five suicides.

There were three deaths from asphyxiation, three from cirrhosis of the liver and two each from congenital deformity and peritonitis.

Other causes of death in the tabulation, with one each, are senility, homicide, brain tumor, anoxia, emphysema and diabetes.

One hundred seventy-seven of the deaths and 10 of the stillbirths occurred in Bend; 101 deaths and six stillbirths in Redmond.

Plans almost complete for renewal work

PORTLAND (UPI) — Plans are nearly completed for a spring construction start on the first phase of the South Auditorium urban renewal project, according to Otto J. Kralovec, general manager of the Portland Center Redevelopment Co.

The 24-acre project, to be constructed in three phases, will get under way with the erection of three high rise apartment buildings containing 490 units, a four-story office building and a four-level garage with space for 160 vehicles.

In addition a 25,000 square foot commercial facility will be built to house a supermarket, drug store and service shops.

Initial construction will cost \$15.1 million.

The entire project, comprising 56 square blocks and known as Cascade Village, will be built at a total estimated cost of \$56 million.

Among the facilities projected for the site are nine high rise apartment buildings, six commercial buildings, a luxury motel, shopping facilities and parking for 2,310 autos. The completion date has been tentatively set for the summer of 1967.

Changes sought in agreements on U.S. lumber

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — The West Coast Lumbermen's Association intends to propose modification of existing trade agreements which affect the flow of U.S. lumber into Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia, the association announced Saturday.

G. C. Edgett, executive vice president of the association will appear before the Trade Information Committee, headed by Christian Herter, Jan. 7, in Washington.

The association is seeking parity of U.S. lumber shipped into Canada and a reconsideration of a 1936 agreement which precludes foreign lumber from a list of imported items which are required to be marked as to country of origin.

President Johnson recently vetoed a bill that would require Canadian lumber to be marked as to country of origin.

The association also said it would ask the United Kingdom to eliminate duty imposed on U.S. rough lumber as it does on Canadian lumber. Finally it said it would ask Australia to give U.S. lumber shippers equal treatment with Canadian shippers by reducing the rate of duty on lumber shipments by 10 shillings per thousand.

Edgett said the two points made by President Johnson when he recently vetoed the bill, which would have required marking of Canadian lumber as to country of origin, showed a lack of appreciation of the basic facts. Johnson said the bill would have violated a U.S.-Canada trade agreement.

SALEM (UPI)—Pacific Power & Light Company's request for permission to increase water rates in five cities has been scheduled for public hearings, public utility commissioner Jonel C. Hill said today.

The cities are Albany, Independence, Lebanon, Mill City and Prineville.

A consolidated hearing for the four Willamette Valley cities will be held at 10 a.m. Feb. 6 in the Linn County courthouse at Albany.

A separate hearing will be held at Prineville on Feb. 4 at 9 a.m. in the Crook County courthouse.

The power company asked for the rate increases last July, but the higher rates were suspended by Hill so hearings could be held.

The company said its water rates must be increased to help meet higher costs. Water rates at Independence have not been increased for 50 years, the company said.
