PORTLAND (UPI) — Partial opening of the East Bank free-way and its connecting facilities will be staged Tuesday and again on Friday.

The first section includes opening of connecting ramps between the Banfield freeway and the Morrison Bridge and the ramp taking traffic east-ward from the Steel Bridge into Banfield.

The second major portion will allow traffic to move along the East Bank roadway from the northward two miles to a tem-porary connection with N. In-terstate Avenue and N. Failing and Shaver Streets.

The new facilities will allow motorists traveling downtown via the Burnside Bridge and Third Avenue on-ramp to use the Morrison Bridge and its new connections to the Banfield.

Tongue Point plan uncertain

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The fate of a weapons system man-agement school which the late President Kennedy proposed be established at the old Tongue Point Naval Station near As-toria, Ore., appeared uncertain today.

A spokesman for Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said a study was being made to determine wheth-er the Defense Department school would be incompatible with an Indian school to be set up by the Bureau of Indian Af-fairs at the facility.

Defense Department officials said the plan to establish the weapons school had not yet been changed but conceded that its fate was uncertain. How-ever, the defense official said the proposed weapons system indoctrination course would re-quire very little space.

William Berg Jr., Morse's administrative assistant, said a final decision on whether the defense facility would be in-cluded in plans for Tongue Point probably would be made within two weeks.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy today escort-ed her daughter Caroline to her new schoolhouse—the British Embassy.

The former first lady accom-panied her 6-year-old blonde, blue-eyed, first-grader to her class which was transferred from the White House to the British Embassy over the hol-iday.

Sir David Ormsby Gore, the British ambassador and Lady Ormsby Gore, offered Mrs. Kennedy room at the beautiful spacious embassy for the two White House classes—the first grade and kindergarten — and the wife of the late president

gratefully accepted. The embassy was selected out of several offers when it was decided that Caroline's first grade class, which form-erly met on the third floor of the executive mansion, would have to find a new location for the remainder of the school year which runs until June.

Mrs. Kennedy and the two children returned to Washing-ton Sunday from an 18-day vaca-tion in Palm Beach, Fla. Mrs. Kennedy's sister, Princess Lee Radziwill was with them when their plane landed at An-drews Air Force Base.

They were met by Sen. and Mrs. Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy

at the airport. They then drove to Arlington National Cemetery to make a brief visit to the grave of President Kennedy.

Mrs. Kennedy and her family are staying at the Georgetown home of Undersecretary of State Averell Harriman, who has moved temporarily to a hotel. Mrs. Kennedy has purchased a home on the same street, but has not moved in.
