

Sister-in-law held in death of Bartholomae

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Multimillionaire William A. Bartholomae, who amassed a fortune in oil, mining and cattle, was stabbed to death with a butcher knife Sunday in his palatial bayfront home.

His sister-in-law, Carmen Bartholomae, 25, was booked on suspicion of murder after detectives found her unconscious beside the dying 70-year-old Bartholomae, a blood-smeared blade from a kitchen knife between them.

Her sister, Minola Gallardo, 32, was to be questioned further today along with Mrs. Bartholomae.

Bartholomae, well known as a yachtsman, died en route to Hoag Presbyterian Hospital in this Southern California beach resort city about 60 miles southwest of Los Angeles.

He had been stabbed twice in the abdomen.

Investigators said cuts on Bartholomae's hands indicated he had struggled with his assailant.

The handle of the kitchen knife was stuck in the garbage disposal unit of the kitchen sink.

Mrs. Bartholomae, wife of the victim's brother and mother of a 3-month-old son, was quoted as telling police she "faintly recalled" seeing the victim come toward her and then "double over."

The next thing she remembered, Mrs. Bartholomae said, was that her sister was at her side. Miss Gallardo, who was cut on one hand, was taken to Hoag Presbyterian Hospital for surgery.

Miss Gallardo and her sister came to the United States from Malaga, Spain. Miss Gallardo is here on a visitor's visa while Carmen is a naturalized United States citizen.

Bartholomae's former wife, Sara, won a \$5.5 million divorce settlement last February, after a two-year legal battle. He had not remarried.

Adenauer 88 on Sunday

BONN (UPI)—Former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer turned 88 years old Sunday, and most of the 500 persons at his birthday party still called him "Herr Chancellor."

Telegrams of congratulations poured in from leaders around the world for "Der Alte," who led West Germany through the difficult postwar years of rehabilitation.

The highlight of the reception given by Adenauer's Christian Democratic Union (CDU) party was the surprise appearance of his successor, Chancellor Ludwig Erhard. Erhard had not been scheduled to return to the capital until today.

Messages came from French President Charles de Gaulle, Britain's Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India and Pope Paul VI.

Adenauer stepped down from office last October after leading West Germany for 14 years in which it rose from the ashes of World War II to become a powerful nation once again. Today "Der Alte," as he is affectionately known, is just another member of Parliament.

Goldwater son to head group

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Barry Goldwater Jr., 25-year-old son of the Arizona senator seeking the GOP presidential nomination, disclosed Sunday that he will head a nationwide youth movement supporting his father's campaign.

"My constant contact with young people has convinced me of the tremendous appeal which Senator Goldwater has in the eyes of youth," said young Goldwater in making the announcement.

The organization is to be known as "Young Americans for Goldwater."

Goldwater Jr., a Los Angeles stockbroker, will make his first address in his new capacity Tuesday evening before the Los Angeles County Young Republicans in the Ambassador Hotel.

Portland plant hit by blaze

PORTLAND (UPI) — Fire caused an estimated \$10,000 damage at the General Plating Corp. plant Sunday night, but operations were not interrupted.

President John Page said the blaze was confined to phosphating tanks, which are not used on a day to day basis. The firms five employees reported for work as usual today.

Romney goes to Washington on Tuesday

LANSING, Mich. (UPI) —

When Gov. George Romney goes to Washington Tuesday to begin his self-appointed task of trying to mold national Republican opinion he is certain to urge the GOP to take the offensive in 1964's political wars.

The governor, a dark horse presidential prospect, is convinced the GOP has "a tremendous opportunity in 1964," but to capitalize on it he feels Republicans must do more than just be against Democrats.

"I don't think the 1964 campaign should depend on what position President Johnson takes," Romney said in an interview.

The governor, who is due to address the National Press Club Tuesday, continued, "I think one of the things that creates the Republican opportunity is the fact that the Republican campaign may be forced to depend on an approach that is other than just 'anti' the administration of whoever has been in the White House four years or three and a half years."

"The Johnson program may not be sufficiently developed to permit that approach—and furthermore I don't think that is the right approach anyway," Romney said.

"Due to the assassination of President Kennedy and the relatively brief time President Johnson will have been in a position of responsibility, it makes it all the more desirable for the Republicans to develop their own program; to develop a positive program, a program that will put the nation back on the main road of Americanism and the road of progress."

Romney, who ended 14 years of Democratic domination of the governor's office in Michigan in 1962 with a campaign that stressed his leadership abilities, said "I think the Republican party should have a positive program. I don't think they should simply react on the basis of what President Johnson does between now and next summer."

Doris Day top box office star

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—The top box office star in the movies for the second straight year is Doris Day, according to the 32nd annual poll of the nation's theater owners.

The biggest money making male star of 1963 is John Wayne who placed second in the poll conducted by the Hollywood trade paper, Motion Picture Herald. Voting is based on ticket sales only and not performance.

It was the seventh appearance on the list of top ten box office attractions for Miss Day, Wayne made the charmed circle for the 14th time, placing him second among all-time box office champions to Gary Cooper and Clark Gable, both of whom appeared on the poll 17 times down through the years.

Following the blonde singer and the two-fisted western star in the top 10 poll were, in order:

Rock Hudson, Jack Lemmon, Cary Grant, Elizabeth Taylor, Elvis Presley, Sandra Dee, Paul Newman and Jerry Lewis.

Official quits for treatment as an alcoholic

MONTPELIER, Vt. (UPI) — Democratic State Chairman John M. Spencer of Cuttingsville, who managed the campaign of Vermont's first Democratic governor in 109 years, has resigned to seek treatment as an alcoholic.

Spencer, given credit for steering Gov. Philip H. Hoff into office in 1962, informed the Democratic state central committee he would enter an institution immediately for "professional treatment."

"If all goes well," Spencer said in a statement read Sunday to the committee by Burlington lawyer Bernard Leddy, "I should be completely sober within 10 days and, with God's blessing, I shall never take another drink."

Spencer, who did not appear at Sunday's committee meeting, also resigned as special assistant to the governor.

His statement was read in executive committee, with only members of the state committee allowed in the room.

"As you are doubtless aware," he said in the statement, "my absence from your midst today is due to my one major problem, alcoholism. It is a problem I have determined to resolve and defeat. The facts are that I am an alcoholic and cannot subscribe to certain social mores."

New type stamp redeemable only in U.S. bonds

PORTLAND (UPI) — A new type of trading stamp redeemable only for U.S. savings bonds will make its appearance in Oregon this week.

The stamps, called American Trading Stamps, are distributed by the American Savings Stamp Co. of Chicago. Oregon sales manager Larry Rickdall said participating merchants will give 10 stamps for each \$1 in purchases.

Eight books filled with 1,200 stamps each would be redeemable for a \$25 series E government bond. The books must be mailed to Chicago to be redeemed, Rickdall said.

He said his company also plans to move into Washington, which has heavy restrictions on trading stamps.

shortly before 3 a.m. Communist guards cleared the last stragglers returning to West Berlin and revealed the barrier which divides the city.

Officials estimated that a record 300,000 West Berliners swarmed through the wall openings Sunday for last-day family reunions, raising to 1.2 million the number of visits made to East Berlin during the 17 days covered by the agreement. Nearly half a million made it on the final weekend.

The holiday crossings to see relatives and friends were the first permitted by the Communists since they erected the anti-refugee wall in August, 1961. Whether they will allow any more in the future appeared to hinge on what political conditions they demand.

Caught at Deadline
Thousands of West Berliners clung to the pass privilege as long as possible, and were caught at deadline lined up on foot and in cars on the Eastern side of the gates, waiting for clearance. Many had tears streaming down their faces. Even some husky men were crying.

Beyond the lines of returning visitors stood a ring of lip-biting, hand-wringing East Berlin relatives. Some kept yelling "auf wiedersehen" — till we meet again — through their tears. Others waved vigorously.

Werner Jacobus, 42, a draftsman, said "I never knew a few minutes could be so precious as when midnight was approaching."

Recalls Parting
His voice cracked as he recalled the parting with his parents. "Their last words were, 'dear God, let our son come visit us again.'"

"I hope for tomorrow," he said.

Hopes for a "tomorrow" centered on a meeting later this week between West Berlin and East German representatives on the wall crossing issue.

West Berlin city government spokesman Egon Bahr said Saturday he believes there is a 50-50 chance of another agreement "in the near future." But the Communists indicated they wanted a political price.

Mrs. Hatfield receives award
NEW YORK (UPI)—The wife of Gov. Mark Hatfield was given a Golden Hat Award at a fashion luncheon of the Millinery Institute of America here Sunday.

The awards are given annually to the seven best-hatted women in the nation. The presentation to Antoinette Hatfield was made in the public affairs classification by Broadway star Jessica Tandy, a former Golden Hat winner.

Barry would renounce treaty if necessary

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater says that if he were president he would renounce the nuclear test ban treaty should it appear "to be to our advantage to test in the atmosphere."

Goldwater, who announced Friday his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination, also says he would use the threat of breaking off diplomatic relations with Russia as a bargaining weapon in the cold war.

The Arizona conservative, still on crutches from an operation on his right heel, made the statements Sunday in a wide-ranging television interview.

Goldwater defended his Senate vote against the test ban treaty as "a sound one" and said he still thought the pact was "of no advantage to the United States." Asked if he, as president, would renounce it, he replied:

"If it appeared to be to our advantage to test in the atmosphere, yes, I would do it."

Goldwater was reminded that he had indicated in the past he would withdraw recognition from the Soviet Union if he had the power. He was asked if he would try to do so as president.

"Yes, I would," he replied. "There would be some qualification on that. I would use the effort as a bargaining effort with the Soviet Union to try to get some things accomplished. It is to their advantage to have us recognize them. I can see no advantage to us at all."

Asked what he thought the consequences would be if the United States broke off relations with Russia, Goldwater said, "I think the Soviet Union would do a lot of things to keep from having us do that."

Renewal seen of 'tar derby' by fag firms

NEW YORK (UPI)—The nation's second largest tobacco firm announced Sunday it would issue a new brand of filter-tip cigarettes with the tar and nicotine content listed on each package.

The plan might launch a new direction in cigarette promotion and possibly competition within the industry to lower tar and nicotine content.

The announcement of the new brand and labelling policy by American Tobacco Co. appeared to signal a resumption of the so-called "tar derby" in which manufacturers several years ago made various claims about the relative tar and nicotine content of their brands.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) halted advertising on the nicotine-tar issue in 1964. It now awaits a report from the U. S. surgeon general's office on the possible link between cigarette smoking and lung disorders.

Nixon victory seen if only women voted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Census Director Richard Scammon believes that Richard M. Nixon would have been elected President in 1960 if only women had voted.

Scammon, a student of American voting habits, said Sunday in a television interview that American women generally vote more conservatively than men and John F. Kennedy's much-heralded appeal to women failed to change the trend.

But, Scammon said, women vote less frequently than men because they are less interested in public affairs.

Eva Gabor says she's through with jewelry

MIAMI (UPI) — Actress Eva Gabor leaves New York today with the vow "I'll never wear jewelry again, darling."

The Hungarian-born beauty was still recovering from a mild cerebral concussion, but doctors said no permanent marks would be left by the beating she took Saturday from two young thugs after her jewels.

"Zsa Zsa and Magda have gone through this in New York and they know it is just terrible," said Miss Gabor, who was released from a hospital here Sunday.

"But I don't think they were hit by mean boys like those who came to our place. No more jewelry for me, darling, and I mean it."

Miss Gabor — one of the beautiful Gabor sisters — and her husband, New York stock broker Richard Brown, were confronted by two masked and armed bandits when they returned to their plush apartment at the elite Racquet Club on North Bay.

Eva did battle—and lost. She was cracked on the head with a pistol, hit in the mouth, pushed about, and had a jeweled earring torn from her pierced ear.

The bandits escaped with about \$35,000 in jewels, including Miss Gabor's 15-carat diamond ring and a gold wedding band.

School suffers vandal damage

PORTLAND (UPI) — Vandals caused about \$1,000 damage to the Brooklyn elementary school here over the weekend.

Portland School District investigator Leonard Schurr said they spread 10 gallons of paint around the halls, turned on a fire hose, ripped up supplies in the principal's office and stole a small amount of money.

They apparently gained entrance by breaking a window in a rear door.

Man brought up as girl becomes father, college surgeon reports

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—A man who was brought up as a girl became a father after surgery changed him into a normal male, according to a Washington University plastic surgeon.

Dr. James Barrett Brown, a professor of clinical surgery who performed the operation, said it was the first time to his knowledge that a man undergoing such surgery had achieved fatherhood.

Brown said the operation was performed on the unidentified St. Louis man at the age of 13. The man recently became a father at the age of 23.

Anatomical Change

Brown said the young father had not undergone a "sex change."

"He was always a boy but his parents didn't know it," Brown said in an interview. "He had a congenital anomaly which occurs quite frequently. The operation was an anatomical change which completed the male sex for him."

Brown reported on the operation with Dr. Minot P. Fryer, also of Washington University, in the current Journal of Surgery, Gynecology and Obstetrics.

They said the child was mistakenly identified as a girl at birth, dressed and looked as if he were a girl and was accepted socially as one. But they said "the patient's normal feelings and personal feelings prompted medical consultation."

After consultation with other physicians, Brown said it was decided that surgery should be undertaken. He said the operation consisted of constructing genitalia and correcting malformation of the anatomic appearance that was more female than male.

Oregon fourth in spending on education

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Oregon ranks fourth in the nation in the amount of money spent to educate its public elementary and high school students, a National Education Association study showed today.

The annual expenditure in Oregon for each of its 440,000 students is \$549, according to the study. Alaska was first with an annual expenditure of \$703 and California was second with \$634.

Oregon was 13th in its average teacher salary at \$6,240, the NEA said. Alaska was first with \$8,150.
