Lava Bear grapplers shade Mac 28-24, tie The Dalles Indians in Saturday road trip duels...

THE DALLES — A refreshed Bend Lava Bear mat squad today is looking forward with a little more confidence to its duel with the strong Redmond Panthers this weekend, after an encouraging performance in a pair of dual meets — winning one and tying another — here last Saturday afternoon.

Fred Hamm, Bend heavyweight, enabled the Bruins to reach a 24-24 deadlock with the host The Dalles Indians when he pinned the Tribe's John Merrian in the second round of the final match.

Bend's photo-finish with The Dalles followed a victory earlier in the day when the Bruins shaded the Mac-Hi Pioneers, 28-24.

Hamm — Good Day

Hamm was the only Bend wrestler to gain two pins in varsity competition Saturday. He had the only fall in Bend's 28-24 triumph over the Pioneers, a match which saw three draws and two Bruins, themselves, pinned.

Dan Jarvis at 123 pounds, and Don Jacobson, 130, drew 7-7 and 0-0 with their Mac opponents, before Bend's Richard Gettmann lodged a last-gasp takedown to salvage a deadlock with his 136 pound opponent.

Gary Frazee, 115, and Jerry Terrill, 141, were nailed to the mat by their Pioneer adversaries. Ken Thompson, 98, Bill Mayer, 157, Duane Franklin, 168, and Kirk Ward, 191, all gained decisions for the Lava Bears.

Ken Booze at 178 pounds lost a match by default when he became ill at the end of the second round. Mike Borreson lost a decision at 148 pounds.

Franklin Wins Thriller

Franklin's decision over Mac's Wondra came after both men were warned for stalling. Franklin was behind going into the final round 3-1, but immediately got a reversal that knotted the match count at 3-3. Wondra then gained an escape to move back in front 4-3, but Franklin in the last minute countered his opponent's charge and gained a two-point take down to win the match.

Kirk Ward, weighing in for Bend at 162 pounds, gained his decision at 191 pounds by springing a reversal at the end of the match, countering a grape vine.

Indians - Bruins

In the finale of three dual meets, The Dalles and Bend gained two pins apiece and drew one match. This, coupled with four decisions each, put the duel into its resulting deadlock.

Three Bruin grapplers had "the chance" to give Bend the meet victory by gaining pins instead of decisions.

All three came within a whisker of doing it. Don Jacobson, Bend 130-pounder, tried for the better part of his final round to pin The Dalles' C. Her-

rick but couldn't do it. He had to settle for a 4-0 decision.

Richard Gettmann, 141, 7-2 winner over The Dalles' Bachellor, persisted with a pinning combination but couldn't make it stick. Kirk Ward, 178-pound Bruin, did everything in his power to put his opponent's shoulders to the mat. Though Ward held his foe in a near-pin situation for the better part of the final round, the fall still didn't come.

Jarvis Wins

Besides Hamm's last match pin, there was one other Bruin who won by a fall. Dave Jarvis, 106 pounds, nailed The Dalles' Swaim in the second round.

Bill Mayer decided the Indians' Joe Petroff 2-0 at 157 pounds. Ken Thompson, 98, and Ken Linville suffered pins by adversaries, Wacker and Lewis. Gary Frazee, Don Marcoulier, Duane Franklin and Ken Booze all lost decisions.

Bend's JV wrestlers fared as did the varsity. The Bruin Cubs trounced the Pioneer juniors, 43-17, and tied The Dalles, 26-28.

Gordon Iverson, Carl Wheeler, Buck Dyer, Don Marcoulier, Ray Rose and Jim McClelland all gained falls for the locals. Steve Scott won by decision, and Leslie Newton and Phil Miller gained victories by forfeit. Vern Walters got a draw.

Against the Indian juniors, it was falls by Iverson, Newton, Dyer, Dan Jarvis and Jerry Terrill. McClelland won by decision.

BAKER — Crook County High School's Cowboys are still without a conference victory today after dropping a road trip finale to the host Baker Bulldogs here Saturday evening, 71-54.

Coach Wayne Lunde's Pokes out - shot the hometown crew from the floor on the percentage basis but didn't get as many shots at the hoop.

Prineville canned 17 out of 44 from the field for a .386 figure while the Bulldogs gunned 25 out of 62.

Prineville won't have the problem of defending a whirlwind like Baker's Doug Courson (he got 35 Saturday) this Friday night when they trek to Madras with an inter-midstate match with the White Buffaloes. But they'll have to be sharp.

Both Lost on Road

Both teams suffered similar disasters on their far east swing to the Blue Mountain country. Baker and La Grande prevailed over both Central Oregon squads both nights.

Though the Cowboys' shooting was better than it has been, the Pokes still have defensive troubles. Madras, a pesky but smaller bunch, may also give the Pokes problems.

Prineville, however, was not without its bit of splendor last Saturday. Lunde's Pokes kept the Bulldogs on edge for the better part of the first half. Crook County led at the end of the first quarter, 12-11, but by the time the half ended, Baker held a 32-25 advantage.
