### Six horseshoe pits readied at Juniper Park

Six horseshoe courts — the first designed for public use in Bend — are being fashioned by Recreation and Park Department workmen in Juniper Park and should be ready when warm weather strikes.

At this writing workmen are flattening down the pit area. Next step is to plant turf between the blocks and install wooden backstops behind each pit. Later, if the pits prove popular, lights may be installed.

For those interested in forming a horseshoe-pitching club, Rec Department Director Vince Genna is holding a special meeting next Monday, January 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Recreation office. Experience in the game is not necessary, Genna says.

### HIGHER POSTAL RECEIPTS NOTED

Bend Post Office receipts for the calendar year 1962 aggregated \$247,381.84, about 19 per cent higher than the 1961 total.

Part of the gain is accounted for by the increase in postal rates of last January 7, when first class mail postage, for letters, went up to 5 cents.

But even without this increase, the local postal receipts show a healthy gain, around \$34,650, it was noted by Postmaster Farley J. Elliott.

Postal receipts are based primarily on stamp sales and on various services, such as box rentals.

Total receipts in 1962 were \$202,134.79, compared with the 1963 figure of approximately \$247,381.

### RETIREES FROM SERVICE

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI) — Chris Haley retired from county government service Monday at the age of 9.

Chris has been drawing names for Hamilton County grand jurors since 1959, but the law requires that such tasks be performed by children under 10. The boy will be 10 in March and the next grand jury will be drawn in September.

### Misappropriation of funds admitted by school official

SALEM (UPI) — The teaching and superintendent's credentials of Harrisburg Union High School principal Charles F. Fredrickson, 42, were suspended Monday for a one year period.

Public Instruction Supt. Leon P. Minear said he formally notified Fredrickson of the suspension on Monday.

Minear said Fredrickson admitted "misappropriating more than \$900 in student body funds" while he was principal at Eagle Valley high school at Richland in Baker County.

Minear said Fredrickson could request a hearing before the State Board of Education if he wished to dispute the suspension of his certificates.

Minear said Fredrickson had been accused by the Pine Eagle School Board and district superintendent of misappropriating the student funds.

Minear said "I received verbal notice of the charge about one month ago, and asked for a written statement and resolution from the board at Halfway."

"I turned the report over to the attorney general's office and was advised by the attorney general's office there had been a clear infraction of the statutes."

"I called a show cause hearing, at which Fredrickson appeared, on Dec. 30."

"At that time Fredrickson was given an opportunity to indicate if the charges were true or false. Fredrickson admitted the charges were true. I notified the county superintendent on Dec. 31 that Fredrickson's certificates would be suspended."

"Fredrickson was officially notified Monday of the suspensions," Minear said.

Minear said Fredrickson was principal at Richland until last June, when he moved to Harrisburg to take over as superintendent.

Minear said the misappropriation of funds was discovered in a routine audit.

Minear said Fredrickson may apply for a renewal of his certificates after the one year suspension.

### Anderson new COI manager

Robert A. Anderson Jr., Redmond, is the new manager of the Central Oregon Irrigation District. He succeeds E. G. Mansfield, who presented his resignation at the January meeting of the board. Mansfield will continue in an advisory capacity, it was announced by Arthur Horsell, Powell Butte, district president.

Mansfield served as manager for eight years, succeeding Olaf Anderson, who retired. Anderson has been assistant manager for the same period.

Horsell and Victor Payne, Terrebonne, vice - president, were reelected at the first meeting this year. Mrs. Betty Stanard, long - time secretary, was retained in that capacity.

Other members of the board are Ray Knowles, Redmond; Bertil Nelson, Bend, and Al Neirmann, Alfalfa.

The next meeting of the district directors will be Wednesday, February 5, at 9 a.m. at the district office in Redmond.

### '64 registration of aliens under way in local area

The 1964 registration of aliens living in the local area is under way, with the Bend Post Office in charge here. Actually the sign-up is a report of current addresses of aliens in the community.

There are some 200 aliens in this community, registrations of past years indicate.

Nationally supervising the registration is the Immigration and Naturalization Service. The law requires that all aliens in the United States, with a few exceptions, must report their addresses each year in January. Generally, the sign-up results in a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

Any alien who willfully or inexcusably fails to report as required is liable to be taken into custody and deported, with provisions for imprisonment or fines prior to deportation.

Forms for making the reports can be obtained from any post office in the area.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations, those who have entered the United States temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Any alien who willfully or inexcusably fails to report as required is liable to be taken into custody and deported, with provisions for imprisonment or fines prior to deportation.

Forms for making the reports can be obtained from any post office in the area.

### 1964 'jewelry' for dogs ready

The official 1964 jewelry for Deschutes county dogs has arrived at the office of County Clerk Helen Dacey, and already, pooch fanciers are making their trek to the courthouse to pay their money. Tags are also available in LaPine from B. M. Martin, justice of the peace, and in Sisters from Fred Painter, town marshal.

The new licenses are circle-shaped, about the size of a quarter, and are detailed with a small metal cutout of a dog.

The going price is \$2 apiece for males and spayed females, and \$3 apiece for natural females. On March 1, the price goes up \$2 in each category, to \$4 and \$5 respectively.

The sale of licenses reaches its peak traditionally in February, with dog owners beating the deadline and taking advantage of the lower price.

Puppies need not be licensed, but when they become dogs, they must wear tags. Adulthood is reached when the canine teeth are acquired, according to Jess H. Smith Jr., county dog warden. This occurs at the age of between five and seven months, he said.

Puppies that come of age after the March 1 deadline may be licensed at the bargain rate. Likewise, the reduced rate applies for adult dogs acquired later in the year. A grace period of 30 days is allowed after acquiring a dog, before the penalty is imposed.

After March 1, deputies will canvass the county, and unlicensed dogs may cost their owners a citation.

Before the deadline, Smith will set up headquarters in Redmond, on specified days, for the sale of licenses.

In 1963, approximately 3700 dog licenses were sold. The figure should be pretty close to the eligible dog population for the year, Smith said. The license check was thorough, and dog owners were cooperative, he added.
