Central Oregon College may share federal funds

A share of the \$50 million annual federal appropriation for public junior and community colleges and technical institutes will be available for the Central Oregon College building program, college officials have announced, providing sufficient state and local matching funds are provided through the passing of the state and local bond issues.

Funds will exist for state matching, however, only if the \$30 million bond issue, designed to provide capital for the state college and community college building program, is passed in May, at the time of the state primary election. Due to the October 15 defeat of the Oregon tax program, sufficient dollars to match the federal appropriations are not presently available.

The first buildings on the Central Oregon College campus most likely to benefit from the federal money are the Library and the Business Administration building. Because these buildings are a part of Phase II of the building program, their construction cannot start until the money is appropriated.

Don Pence, COC President, said plans are being prepared to begin construction of these two buildings in May if the state bond issue passes. Pence has indicated that he hopes the two new buildings will be completed in early fall of 1964 in order that the college will be able to move into its new campus at the opening of school.

The federal monies which are being offered for the local college building construction program are a part of the recently passed Morse - Green bill which has been signed by the President. This bill will provide \$1.2 billion for construction of public and private college classrooms, laboratories, and libraries throughout the 50 states.

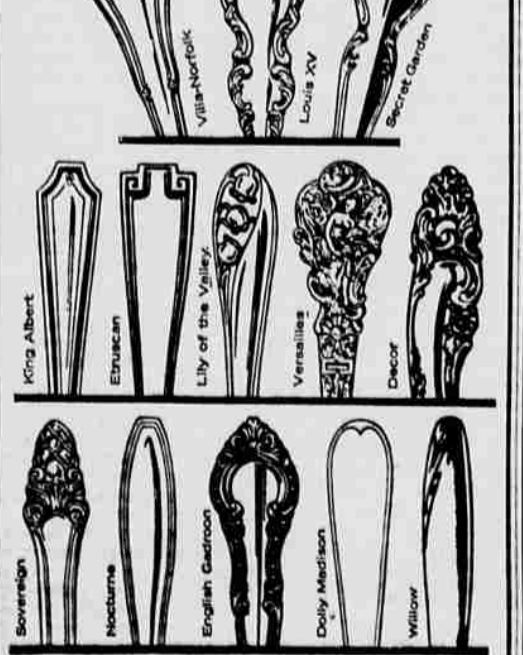
