Soils, irrigation classes offered

REDMOND — Fifteen hours of instruction on soils and irrigation will be presented at weekly sessions in Redmond, beginning January 22 from 1 until 4 p.m. in the extension meeting hall, according to County Agent Robert Sterling. The meetings will continue through February 19.

Principal instructors will be Howard E. Cushman, extension soils specialist; H. N. Shearer, extension irrigation specialist, both of Oregon State University, and Dr. Malcolm Johnson, superintendent of the Central Oregon Experiment Station.

The first meeting will include discussion of the physical and chemical properties of the soils in Deschutes County. Topics at the January 29 meeting will be soil, air, water and temperature. Soil chemistry will be discussed February 5. On February 12, the subjects will be soil testing, tissue testing and micronutrients. The final meeting February 19 will feature fertilizer recommendations. Those interested are asked to enroll by January 18. Enrollment blanks are available at the extension offices in Bend and Redmond.

All-time high in loans noted

The Central Oregon Production Credit Association reached an all time high in loans outstanding at the end of 1963. As of December 31, the association had \$5,689,821.97 in loans on its books, up over a year ago by \$377,992.93.

Charles Porter, association manager, said these loans represent short and intermediate term credit to 307 farmers and ranchers in Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Harney and Wheeler counties, the area served by the Central Oregon Production Credit Association. During 1963, the association extended \$10,715,397.03 in credit to its members - borrowers, Porter said. This also is a record high loan volume.

The Central Oregon Production Credit Association is owned by the farmers and ranchers it serves. Association loan funds are obtained through the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane, which sells short term bonds to the investing public to provide funds for 30 local Production Credit Associations in Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

The 30th annual meeting of the Central Oregon Production Credit will be held Feb. 6, 1964, in the Redmond Armory, with more than 500 members and guests expected. Paul Matson, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane, is to be guest speaker.

Alcoa signs power contract
PORTLAND (UPI)—A new 20-year power sales contract has been signed with the Aluminum Company of America, Bonneville Power Administrator Charles F. Luce said today. The contract increases the amount of firm power to be delivered to Alcoa's Wenatchee and Vancouver, Wash., plants from the present 256,000 kilowatts to 300,000 kilowatts starting July 1, 1967.
