Vacationing OSU Beavers take Hawaiians in stride, 71-55, as Peters gets 20 and Jarvis 19...

HONOLULU (UPI) — Frank Peters connected on his first six shots from the floor Tuesday night to lead Oregon State to an easy 71-55 victory over Hawaii.

The Beavers, here for a three game series, were never in trouble, holding a 34-23 lead at halftime.

The Beavers pulled away in the second half and led by as much as 21 points, 59-38, when Randy Rothman dropped in a rebound with 8:45 remaining.

Peters led all scorers for the night with 20 points. Peters finished with 10 of 12 shots from the floor. Teammate Jim Jarvis, who hit eight of 14 shots, scored 19.

Big Mel Counts, playing only about 30 minutes of the game, scored 13. The seven-foot Counts spent most of the evening feeding his teammates. He picked off 13 rebounds.

The Beavers hit on 31 of 84 field shots for the night.

Roy Walker led Hawaii with 15 points.

Hawaii coach Red Rocha, a former star at Oregon State in the late 1940s, described the Beavers as "real tough."

"They're so well rounded — they can hit from any place on the court. If you make a mistake, they'll run you through."

When asked about Counts, Rocha commented, "he's amaz-

ing." Rocha went on to say, "we were sending everybody at him whenever he had the ball, but he only lost it about two or three times all night."

The same two teams meet Saturday night. The Beavers play the Armed Forces all-stars on Friday night.

US race track attendance, betting hit high in '63

NEW YORK (UPI) — Attendance and betting at the nation's thoroughbred race tracks reached new highs during 1963, a United Press International survey revealed today, with 36,390,151 persons wagering \$2,829,375,603.

Betting in 25 states with legalized parimutuel wagering increased by \$159,836,321, or 5.98 per cent, over the 1962 total of \$2,669,539,282. Attendance 2,164,823 persons, or 6.25 per cent, over the 34,225,328 who "went racing" during the previous year.

There was more racing than ever before with Vermont joining the list for the first time with 119 days and New York staging the longest season in its history. There were 4,181 racing days in 1963 compared with the 3,900 of 1962.

New York showed the way with record totals for the state. During the year a total of \$647,298,090 was bet by 7,045,268, an increase of \$50,383,570 and 700,982 persons over the previous year.

The increase was due, for the most part, to the closing of Belmont Park and the transferring of its dates to Aqueduct as well as additional racing upstate.

California was second with \$430,066,762 in betting and 5,085,330 in attendance. California had increases of \$34,528,607 in betting and 221,509 additional attendance over 1962.

In betting New Jersey ranked third with \$258,380,341; Illinois fourth with \$268,188,747; Maryland fifth with \$170,667,104; Florida sixth with \$157,954,011. Then came Rhode Island with \$101,752,525; Michigan with \$97,550,594; West Virginia with \$96,397,410 and Ohio with \$96,035,214.

Illinois was third in attendance with 3,510,915, followed by New Jersey with 2,742,104, Maryland with 1,969,405, Ohio with 1,637,893, West Virginia with 1,562,909, Michigan with 1,492,715, Rhode Island with 1,419,629 and Florida with 1,345,164.

With the exception of New Jersey each of the top ten states reported increases in betting. In 1962, however, New Jersey staged additional racing to raise revenue for storm damage along its coast and this year had 24 less racing days than the previous year.

Attendance also dropped in New Jersey as it did in Florida and West Virginia. It was up in the other leading states.

A's preparing to move squad to Louisville

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Kansas City Athletics owner Charles O. Finley set up shop in Convention Center today to prepare for moving the A's franchise here, despite strong opposition from other club owners.

The determined Finley signed a contract Monday with the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use of the Kentucky State Fairgrounds Stadium by his major league team for the 1964 and 1965 seasons.

The contract was signed after negotiations for leasing Municipal Stadium at Kansas City fell through.

Finley, with members of his "front office" crew from Kansas City, inspected the newly renovated Convention Center in downtown Louisville Tuesday. "This is where we'll sell tickets," he said.

But before the ticket-selling can get underway, Finley must have the approval of seven of the 10 American League club owners for the move. At present he has only one certain vote—his own.

Finley said he is certain of receiving the required seven owners' votes approving the transfer here.

"I still say after they receive all the true facts about our differences, we'll receive approval for the move. Those people are fair-minded," he said.

The American League owners will meet in New York Jan. 16 to decide where the A's will play this season.

Finley termed published reports that he might bring suit against the other American League owners if approval is not granted at the New York meetings, "rumors and manufactured lies."

"I don't know where that sort of thing comes from," he added in referring to reports of possible court action.

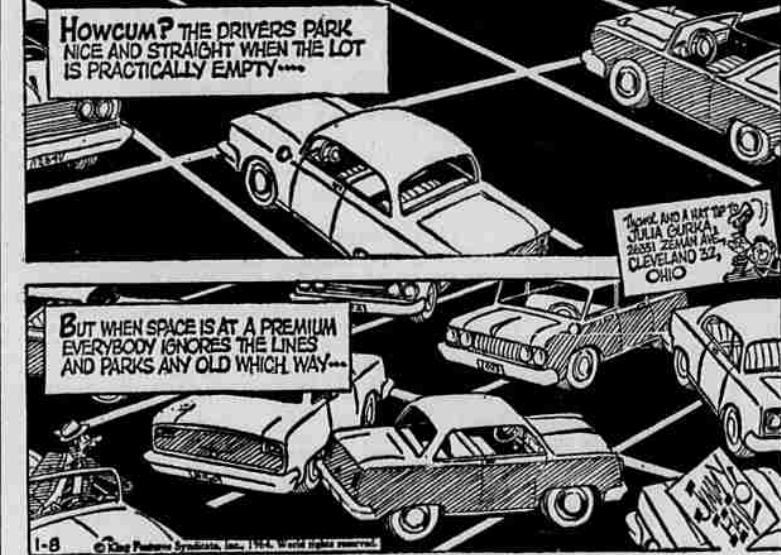
