

Father of ten is arraigned on death count

VALE, Ore. (UPI)—A father of 10 children was to be arraigned this afternoon on a charge he engineered an auto crash in which his wife burned to death.

Wolford Keith Harris, 39, a former Mormon Church bishop at Salem was returned here by state police.

The Malheur County grand jury, in an early morning session Thursday, indicted Harris on a first-degree murder charge of "deliberate and premeditated malice" in killing his wife, Vera, 37, by "burning her to death."

The couple was in an auto Dec. 16 that, according to state police records, had gone out of control at nearby Jordan Valley and plunged down a 260-foot slope in flames.

Harris told officers the next day that he was knocked unconscious by the accident and when he awoke saw his car burning. He said he tried to rescue Mrs. Harris but intense heat prevented him. Harris was treated for face and hand burns at a Caldwell, Idaho, hospital.

Malheur County Dist. Atty. John Hutchins refused Thursday to elaborate on how or why Harris was suddenly charged with murder. He did point out an autopsy report on the woman as having something to do with the charge.

Harris was arrested at his Salem home.

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Study planned on annexation at Prineville

PRINEVILLE — A new step is being taken this week, under the auspices of the Prineville Chamber of Commerce, to determine the interest among some 40 homeowners of Valley View division, Ochoco Heights, on the subject of annexation to the city.

Cecil Sly, former county school superintendent and a property owner in the division, is making personal calls through the residential area in question to secure the desired information.

The move to promote the annexation has been underway for some time, following requests made of the chamber to act as a liaison group, according to Ivan Chappell, chamber manager.

Chappell reports that the chamber is supplying information on annexation which is to be mailed to property owners in that area. A petition for the annexation, signed by a specified number of property owners, must be presented to the city council to begin official action.

The chamber is interested in the annexation, Chappell said, from an economic standpoint. A growing community, he said, as evidenced by city annexation, tends to attract capital investment in the community. Prineville's industrial expansion is necessary, Dick McKee, chamber president stated, if the city is to keep pace with agriculture and recreation on the area to maintain a balanced economy.
