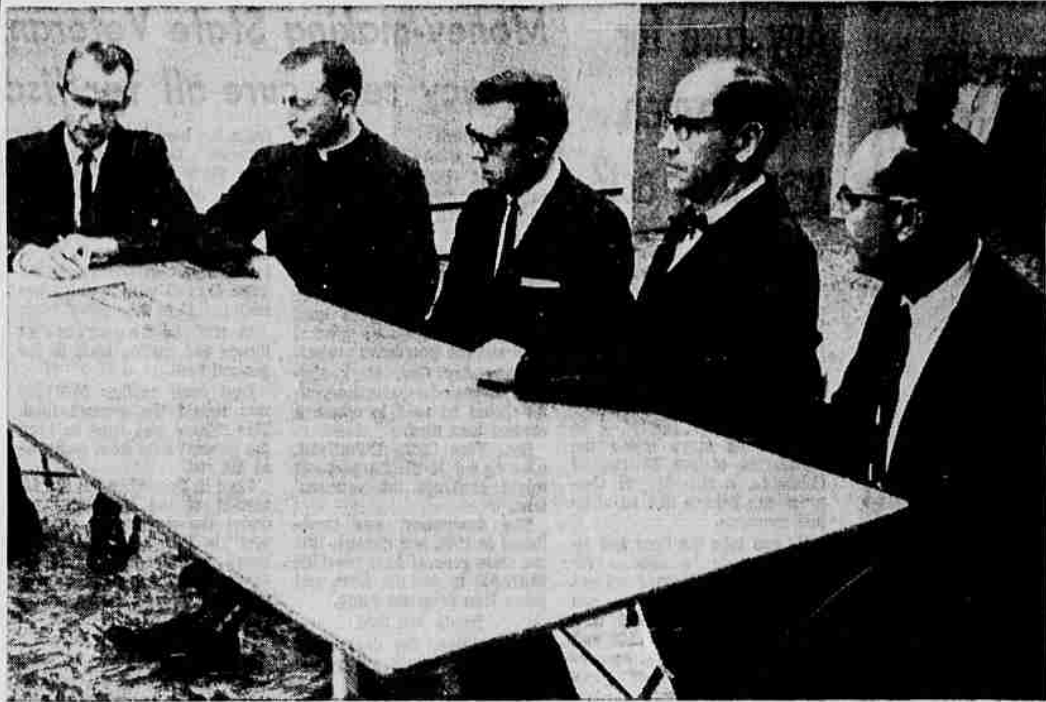

Commentators see Hatfield as V-P choice

SALEM (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield evaded comment today on the prediction by two network television news commentators that he would be the Republican vice presidential nominee this year.

Hatfield, who publicly insists he is not a candidate for national office, said only "my private interest is serving the people of Oregon."

The political forecasts were made Wednesday at a meeting in New York of the International Radio and Television Executives Society.

Chet Huntley of the National Broadcasting Company and Ron Cochran of the American Broadcasting company predicted Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton would head the GOP ticket, and that Hatfield would be his running mate.

Walter Cronkite of the Columbia Broadcasting System predicted Richard M. Nixon and Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater would top the Republican ticket. On the Democratic side, all three commentators said they believed President Johnson would head the ticket, but disagreed on who the vice presidential nominee would be.

Hatfield spent last weekend in New York, and appeared on the Mike Wallace television show.

His press secretary, Travis Cross, also went to New York last week, spent several days in Washington, D. C., and isn't expected to return to Salem until Monday. Cross refused to announce why he was making the eastern trip, but did say he was not traveling at state expense.

Skiing to be program topic

PRINEVILLE — Skiing in Central Oregon will be the subject for discussion at the Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday, January 13, in the Brownfield cafe.

Representatives of the board of directors of the Bachelor Butte group and others, will discuss the economic impact of the Bachelor Butte ski area on Central Oregon. Ray Hatfield will discuss plans of the development corporation and possible future expansion.

Pictures will be shown to illustrate the development of the Bachelor Butte area. Considerable interest is expected in the subject, since many Prineville residents make regular use of the ski facilities during the season.

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Plans reported for instruction on Catholicism

Instruction for children in Catholic religion will be extended in Central Oregon next year, it has been announced by Bishop Francis P. Leipzig of the Diocese of Baker. Four sisters of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Third Order of St. Francis, will begin work in September, 1965, in the parishes of Redmond, Prineville and Madras.

The motherhouse of the Franciscan Sisters is at Glen Riddle, Pa. They have long been associated with missionary work in eastern Oregon. They first came to the West in 1885, when they established an academy at Baker.

At present, they have schools at Baker; St. Mary's parish, Pendleton; St. Andrew's Indian Mission, Pendleton, and at Klamath Falls.

Jernick to enter pro ski races

HOODOO — Herb Jernick, ski school director at the Hoodoo Ski Bowl, flew via jet aircraft yesterday afternoon to Denver, it was reported today, and he will enter the Vale (Colo.) all-professional races this weekend.

Jernick, a recent addition to the Hoodoo ski staff, hails from the highest ski honor in his native Germany. He has won the all-professional races of Germany, one of Europe's top ski honors.

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Fishing industry thinks court will rule out initiative measure

SALEM (UPI) — Oregon's commercial fishing industry appeared confident today that the proposed initiative measure to ban commercial salmon and steelhead fishing on the Columbia River would be thrown out by the courts.

Commercial fishermen claim the measure would violate the Oregon - Washington Columbia River fish compact, and probably would be a violation of federal laws governing interstate trade.

These issues might explode Saturday when the Oregon Wildlife Federation meets at Corvallis.

Allan L. Kelly, president of the Save Our Salmon and Steelhead, and former president of the Oregon Division of the Izaak Walton League, sponsor of the initiative movement, is slated to issue a report on the circulation of petitions.

Industry View Given
Theodore Bugas, representing Salmon For All, an organization opposing the initiative, hinted at the industry view recently before the State Committee on Natural Resources.

Bugas said "passage of the measure would not accomplish their objective of eliminating the commercial fishery in the Columbia. Instead, it would merely eliminate the benefits to Oregon which the commercial fishery produces, and transfer them to Washington."

"Under the terms of a treaty between Washington and Oregon, ratified by Congress in 1918, these two states have concurrent jurisdiction over fishery matters on the Columbia River."

"Legal opinion is firm that neither state can act to alter the regulation of the fishery in the river without reciprocal action by the other. If the initiative should pass, Oregon could not issue licenses to fish commercially in the Columbia and commercially-caught salmon and steelhead could not be landed, bought, sold, stored, processed or shipped in Oregon, but none of these activities would be prevented in Washington."

"Fishermen licensed by Washington could fish commercially over the entire width of the river and land their catches in that state. Oregon fishermen could easily obtain Washington licenses, although they might have to move out of Oregon..." he said.

Would Ban Sales
The initiative measure proposed by Save Our Salmon and Steelhead would outlaw commercial salmon and steelhead fishing on the river, and ban the sale in Oregon of any salmon or steelhead taken from the river.

Commercial fishermen are certain the courts would rule the initiative unenforceable if it were adopted.

Attorneys point to ORS 507.010 which declares "all laws and regulations...which would affect the concurrent jurisdiction (of the Columbia River) shall be made, changed, altered and amended in whole or in part, only with the mutual consent and approval of both states."

And ORS 507.020 explains "The waters over which the states of Oregon and Washington are deemed to have concurrent jurisdiction comprise the waters of the Columbia River...where such waters are state boundaries."

Believed in violation of federal interstate trade laws is the section of the proposed initiative which would make it illegal "for any individual, firm, association, co-partnership, corporation or cooperative in this state, acting on its own account, or for the account of another, to buy, sell, ship, store, process or have in possession for the purpose of trade or sale, salmon or steelhead taken (by commercial fishermen) from the waters (of the Columbia River) ...whether landed in this state or any other state."

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Unemployment rate shows drop in U.S. in month of December

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government reported today that the unemployment rate dropped in the nation during December but cautioned that an adverse trend may be developing in employment of men.

The Labor Department said the jobless rate, on a seasonally adjusted basis, dropped from 5.9 per cent to 5.5 per cent last month.

The department said the number of unemployed dropped by 100,000 to 3.8 million during the month. This was the same as a year earlier. Unemployment during December normally goes up by about 100,000, a spokesman said.

A rise of 250,000 in the number of jobless men was in line with seasonal expectations as outdoor work was curtailed, the spokesman said. But he noted that the unemployment among adult males was going up while it was dropping among teenagers and women.

"I think we should watch the unemployment among adult men which has increased slightly," Labor Department statistician Harold J. Goldstein told newsmen in making public the report. "It is a reflection of something that may be developing for adult men."

The jobless rate for men—4.4 per cent—was not significantly different from the November figure of 4.3 per cent, Goldstein said. But he said it still was well below the early 1963 rate.

These Changing Times
Fifty persons were given Sabin oval polio vaccine, at a bargain clinic Thursday night at the Gilchrist School. The Bend Jaycees were the sponsoring group.

Muri Wood, clinic chairman, said the turnout was considered poor, and attributed this to inclement weather. Type 1 will be offered again, as well as type 2, at the next clinic, probably in March.

A rate of 75 cents per person, with a maximum of \$2 for a family of three or more, is offered.
