Successor set for Gilpatric

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Army Secretary Cyrus R. Vance, a onetime aide of President Johnson, has been named to succeed Roswell L. Gilpatric in the Defense Department's second most important job.

Gilpatric, deputy to Secretary Robert S. McNamara since 1961, leaves the Pentagon Jan. 20 to return to his law practice in New York. His departure, expected since last June, has been delayed by the Senate's investigation of the controversial TFX war plane contract award.

To succeed Vance, Johnson Thursday nominated the Army's present undersecretary, Stephen Ailes, who like his predecessor, is from West Virginia.

Year-end report issued by bank

The Bend Branch of the First National Bank of Oregon reported year-end deposits of \$11,400,537 and loans totalling \$8,884,804, according to information from M. F. Shelton, manager of the local branch.

Comparable totals at the branch on Dec. 31, 1962, were \$11,075,480 in deposits and \$8,290,821 in loans.

The Prineville branch at the end of the year reported deposits of \$10,445,700 and loans of \$8,571,331. These compare with \$11,117,417 in deposits and \$7,272,985 in loans at the end of the calendar year 1962.

The Madras branch of the First National Bank reported deposits of \$2,107,665 at the end of 1963 and deposits of \$3,188,255 in loans. At the end of 1962, the Madras branch reported deposits of \$1,147,982 and loans of \$1,532,282.

First National statewide in 1963 posted the second highest earnings figure in the bank's 99 year history, according to Ralph J. Voss, president. Voss said that deposits at the end of December reached \$1,048,221,239 and loans \$636,084,036.

Weekly health report issued

Central Oregon was relatively disease-free in the past week, according to reports of communicable diseases made to the Tri-County Health Department.

Deschutes county, with 48 per cent of the sources reporting, counted 14 cases of flu and five of pneumonia.

Jefferson county had four cases of chickenpox, with 100 per cent reporting.

There were no new communicable diseases in Crook county, on the basis of reports from 50 per cent of the sources.

California pair arrested here

A man and a woman, facing California charges of armed robbery, car theft and assault with a deadly weapon, were arrested in Bend Friday night around midnight.

Held at the Deschutes county jail for California authorities are Kenneth Grover Jones, 23, from Klamath, Calif., and Harriet Mae Ward, 29, Arcadia, Calif. Both are Indians. They are suspects in an armed robbery around December 19 in Eureka. Warrants also charge assault with a deadly weapon and larceny.

Bail for the two was set by California authorities at \$11,000 apiece. The arrest was made after Deschutes county sheriff's officers received a tip from Eureka that the suspects had wired a friend there for money. The two were apprehended when they went to the Pilot Butte Inn, where night calls are handled for Western Union, to pick up the money.

The two came here from Boise, and were believed to be returning to California, officers said.

A reception in the church social room followed the ceremony. Both the bride and bridegroom were graduated from Redmond Union High School.

Accident splits trailer in two

REDMOND — A Bend-Portland tractor was rolled over on its side, and its trailer was split in two, in an unusual truck-train collision Friday noon in Redmond. The truck driver and the train engineer were uninjured.

A Bend-Portland tractor and trailer driven by Clyde Penhol-low, Redmond, stalled on the track at 12:20 p.m., as Penhol-low was headed for the Bend-Portland terminal south of town.

He left the truck to get another vehicle at the terminal, to pull it off the track.

Meanwhile, the engine of a 100-car SP&S freight train, headed north, struck the truck, rolling the tractor over on its side and splitting the trailer in two.

There was considerable damage to the front of the train engine, but it was able to proceed north under its own power. The engineer was W. G. Rhue, Wishram.

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Two firms seek Salem channel

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Federal Communications Commission (FCC) hearing examiner this week sought to determine the financial qualifications of two applicants for permission to operate a television station on channel 3 in Salem, Ore.

The financial qualifications of the Salem Television Co. and Salem channel 3 telecasters were among the main reasons the FCC ordered Examiner David Krashar to hold a hearing into the competing applications of the two firms.

The FCC said Salem television's plans to build a station to operate channel 3 would require at least \$113,500. The company's application contained a letter from C. H. Fisher in which he promised to provide

up to \$100,000 of the money. But the FCC said there was nothing in evidence to indicate Fisher's ability to pay that amount.

The application of Salem channel 3 telecasters had essentially the same trouble, the FCC said. Its plans would require at least \$88,651 but it demonstrated availability of only \$74,500.

If both firms can demonstrate the availability of funds needed to carry out their plans, the examiner will decide between them on the basis of background and experience, programming services proposed and other aspects of their plans.

The final determination, the FCC said, would be made on the basis of which promises to serve the public best.

Inscription honors JFK

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A simple inscription designed by Mrs. John F. Kennedy to honor her late husband has been carved on a mantel over a fireplace in the White House.

Inscribed on the mantel in the bedroom of President and Mrs. Johnson, it reads:

"In this room lived John Fitzgerald Kennedy and his wife Jacqueline during the two years, ten months and two days he was president of the United States."

It is directly below another mantel inscription which reads: "In this room Abraham Lincoln slept during his occupancy of the White House as president of the United States."

A Bend man, Gail Thomas, heads the Columbia River SAF Section, with Milton J. Griffith, also of Bend, in general charge of arrangements.

A number of nationally-known foresters are expected for the annual SAF meeting.

The Bend Chamber of Commerce is assisting with pre-convention arrangements.

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
