

Planners turn down proposed change in zone

Bend city planners last night decided to preserve potential public park area along the riverfront, as they voted against a requested zone change which would allow an apartment facility near the river's east bank.

The zone amendment request was for property lying between Thurston Avenue and Linster Place, near the river. Land Mart Realty has been negotiating to build a 24-unit apartment structure there. In considering the request, planners earlier decided to include the requested area with a larger segment of land to be changed from R-2 (single-family dwelling) zone to R-4 (multiple-family) zone.

But the zone change motion approved by planners last night excluded the property which originally prompted the zone-amendment idea. The board voted 4-3 in favor of changing a zone lying between Revere and Thurston Avenues, and Lakeside Place and an alleyway between Division and First Streets. The proposed apartment site lies west of Lakeside Place.

The deciding vote was cast by Planning Chairman Vinton Green following a 3-3 deadlock on Dr. Brad Pease's motion to amend only the smaller area.

Favoring the motion were Pease, Robert Libby and Joan Hamm. R. G. McFarland, Robert Gabriel and Dr. Ed Timm voted against.

The planners' recommendation will now be referred to city commissioners for approval or rejection.

In other business, the board named Mrs. Roy Sailer, Mrs. George McGeary and Mrs. James Sniley as members of a special committee to study sidewalk needs. Chairman is Mrs. Sailer.

PRINEVILLE — The Crook county home extension advisory committee held its first meeting of the year this week with considerable business on the agenda.

It had been hoped, members reported, that a money-raising project could be decided, to help finance the spring festival. None was chosen, and each committee member will, instead, ask her home extension unit for ideas.

Mrs. Maud Purvine, extension agent, announced that the mosaic leader training program will be held January 13, 14 and 27, 28 at the 4-H building. Training will be given by Jesse Lee Mallie, Oregon State University recreation specialist. Leaders will be trained to instruct in incidental mosaic work as well as the standard tile.

The committee announced that each home extension unit in the county is to make a list of projects for this year and 1965. Program planners of each unit will present the ideas, and final selection of each unit is to be reported by mid-February. Each unit is also asked to continue saving cancelled stamps from envelopes, to be used to buy milk for deprived children in other countries.

The committee held a lengthy discussion of the spring festival setting the date as April 14, with further details to be announced later.

The annual alumni tea was discussed, with date and place to be selected at the February meeting.

Machine used to demonstrate cigarette threat

"Don't smoke, kids; it isn't good for you. Besides, it's morally wrong."

A generation ago, such an admonition was the accepted method of warning young people on the possible dangers from smoking. It was sort of a "Do as I say, not as I do" approach. Not so today.

Young people, like adults, in this scientific age, have to be shown. They want facts, not emotion. When they are given a scientific demonstration, they can draw their own conclusions on the basis of what they have seen.

That's the theory of Don McAfee, instructor at Bend Junior High School. For several years, he has used a "smoking machine" of his own design, to show his students the deposits of nicotine and tars that a filter cigarette can deposit on the lungs. Along with the demonstration, he presents material gained from scientific reports and smoking studies.

The demonstration is given in seventh grade health classes. McAfee has been asked several times to discuss the local health program and give the presentation at Oregon State University, for students planning to be teachers.

In the demonstration, a cigarette is placed in a holder, and smoke is pulled into a glass beaker partly filled with water. The beaker corresponds to the smoker's lungs. The smoke is drawn off much in the way a smoker exhales.

The water appears clear, but in the light of an ultra-violet lamp in a dark room, the water turns a milky color and fluoresces in the light. A smoker's hands, likewise, have a fluorescence. This is caused by the tars from the tobacco, it is pointed out. Filter cigarettes are used. The filter retains some of the nicotine, and a film of nicotine can be seen on top of the water.

The experiment has not varied noticeably when different brands are used, McAfee says. Reports and magazine articles which have appeared in recent years are also available in McAfee's classroom for the students to study.

Teachers offered new contracts

Mrs. Roberts, who teaches the primary grades, is in her fourth year at Black Butte. Kisor, head teacher in charge of the upper grades, came to Camp Sherman from Lebanon last fall.

Mrs. Roberts is also teaching a special course in advanced mathematics now in both seventh and eighth grades. The class, held every day except Friday, is designed to prepare students for new methods of modern mathematics now taught in high schools.

3 alarms keep firemen busy here Wednesday

Three fire alarms within three hours kept Bend fire crews hopping Monday afternoon.

The first was a burned out furnace fan motor at the Bend Bootery, 937 Wall Street. Crews disconnected the motor and cleared the atmosphere with a smoke ejector. Only damage was to the motor.

A second fire broke out in the 1113 E. Seventh Street home of Gerald Windsor, when a child placed a pillow over a lamp. A small fire started which burned the pillow, lamp and a telephone. Smoke ejectors and deodorant were used, and some damage in the home resulted.

Finally firemen were called to tend a burning flue at the home of Florence Fread, 1414 W. Davenport. No damage occurred.

Bible teaching said compulsory in S. Rhodesia

SISTERS — "In sharp contrast to the United States, the Southern Rhodesian government makes Bible teaching compulsory in all public schools," Les Van Dyke, ex-banker, said when speaking to a large Sunday school group at the Sisters Church of Christ. The government welcomes and encourages missionaries to come to their country and teach their people, and offers every co-operation, he said.

Van Dyke, speaking on "Christ on the March in Southern Rhodesia," is a missionary recruit to Mashoko Christian Hospital in Southern Rhodesia. Mashoko is a name given by the missionaries to a geographical area about one hundred miles from Fort Victoria.

Colored slides were shown of the 140 bed hospital, which was built at a cost of \$200,000, half of which was given by the Southern Rhodesian government and half by church donations.

"Witch doctors are plentiful and powerful in Southern Rhodesia, and kill more people than die of normal deaths," Van Dyke said. "They are outlawed by the government, but so is murder in the United States."

Van Dyke, a former banker, his wife Marjorie, a registered nurse, and their four children will sail March 20 from New York on the Southern African Line's "The Victory." The ship has a passenger list of 12, with the Van Dykes making up half of it. Van Dyke will be the business manager of the hospital, and his wife will train the African nurses.

Sends telegram

BATTLE GROUND, Wash. (UPI) — Mrs. Emma Thankful Griffith Sunday received a telegram of congratulations from the second person named Johnson who has been President during her lifetime.

The telegram from President Johnson came as she observed her 107th birthday with friends and relatives. The other Johnson who has been President during her lifetime was Andrew Johnson.

U.S., Canada reach agreement on Columbia River power treaty

OTTAWA (UPI) — United States and Canadian negotiators Monday announced agreement on "all remaining points of substance" in the Columbia River power development treaty, including the sale of downstream benefits to the U.S.

At the same time, external affairs minister Paul Martin disclosed that Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson and B. C. Premier W. A. C. Bennett have signed an agreement covering the "relations" between their two governments, presumably in connection with financing the project.

Final approval must still come from both the Johnson administration and the Canadian government. Martin said he doubted this would come before Pearson visits President Johnson Jan. 22, but said the signing or final approval could come that day.

All details of the protocol to the treaty, originally signed in 1960 and ratified by the U. S. then, will be withheld until the final signing, a communique issued following the meeting said.

The communique said agreement was reached on "all remaining points of substance relating to clarification and adjustments" to the treaty and the "implementation of article eight of the treaty regarding the marketing of Canada's entitlement of power generated in the United States."

Documents Submitted
"The documents embodying these agreements are being submitted by the negotiators to their respective governments for their immediate consideration. When approved, these documents will be put in appropriate form for signature and released to the public."

Former Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker signed the treaty but Bennett refused to agree on its terms. The protracted negotiations during the past three years were mainly over differences

Ochoco Lumber offers top bid

PRINEVILLE — Ochoco Lumber Company was high bidder for the 35,500,000 board feet of timber on the Lytle Creek sale, according to C. L. Clark, forest supervisor. Ochoco National Forest, Pine Products was the only other bidder for this large timber sale.

Ochoco bought the nearly 33 million board feet of pine in the sale for \$17.86 per thousand board feet, the Douglas fir and western larch at \$8.95 and the 1,400,000 board feet of white fir and other species at \$4.75.

Timber involved in the sale is located about 35 miles from Prineville, north of Gray Prairie. The sale is designed to remove, selectively, the mature and over-ripe timber in the area. The sale will be administered by the Big Summit district, Clark said.

about the price for sale of downstream power benefits to the U.S. and the amount of money the U.S. would pay to build four dams on the Columbia.

U.S. Embassy minister Ivan White termed the negotiations a "real act of statesmanship" and said future generations will reap its benefits in low cost power and flood control.

Martin said if final approval is given by both governments the Canadian government will waste no time in bringing the treaty before parliament for ratification.

Monday's meeting was set up quickly after officials of the British Columbia and federal governments settled all outstanding issues over the sale of power to the U.S. and agreed on a united position.

The Pearson-Bennett agreement was signed Sunday by Bennett and by the prime minister Monday. Bennett's signature was brought back to the Canadian capital by resources minister Ray Willston.
