Ministers explore various funeral practices here

Funeral customs were defended by a panel of five local ministers, in a discussion Monday afternoon at the annual meeting of United Church Women of Bend.

The Rev. James Thompson of First Methodist Church said that indeed, it is possible to be buried in a pine box, "and very reasonably." He added that he priced such caskets recently at a local mortuary. This was in answer to a question by Miss Hildur Niskanen, who said she was glad to hear that this is true.

The Rev. John Bright of Trinity Episcopal Church quipped that in Oregon, "you can be buried in your own backyard, within 24 hours, even without a box." This was apparently facetious, and prompted the Rev. James P. McGugin of First Presbyterian Church that he is not sure such a procedure would be legal.

The discussion was an introduction to a study, "The Christian Family and Its Money," which the women's group will undertake on the four Mondays in April. Yesterday's subject was apparently chosen to answer charges in two recent books and numerous magazine articles which have attacked the high cost of dying.

References were made to the books, "The American Way of Death," by Jessica Mitford, and "The Loved One," by Evelyn Waugh. No quotations were made from either.

The Rev. Thomas H. Shelton of First Christian Church was moderator. The other participants were the Rev. Richard Knutzen of First Lutheran Church.

Each minister spoke on specific aspects of funeral customs, from the clergy's point of view. There was no discussion of non-Christian burial services or morticians' charges. The ministers were in accord in advocating separation of church - related and lodge services, regulated by laws of several of the denominations.
