REDMOND — Apparent low bidder for the city of Redmond \$300,000 water bond issue is the Bank of Central Oregon, which submitted an average interest rate of 3.532 per cent.

The bid was accepted pending an audit at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday evening. Other bidders were U. S. National Bank and Dominick & Dominick of Portland.

Specifications for construction of a 2 million gallon water storage tank east of Redmond have been prepared by the engineering firm Correll, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield of Corvallis. Council will call for bids after the next regular meeting January 24.

Other action included authorization for the fire department to purchase a fourth fire siren to be installed on Juniper Avenue between 11th and 12th. Other sirens are located on the city hall and at the north and south city limits.
