

Task force seeks answers to problem of spiraling medical costs for welfare

SALEM (UPI)—A special governor's task force has begun searching for answers to spiraling medical costs that have threatened to topple the State Welfare Commission's \$40 million biennial budget.

The problem is simple: There isn't enough money to pay doctor, hospital and drug bills, because welfare's medical costs have increased 400 per cent over the past 10 years.

Nobody had a ready answer at Wednesday's first meeting of the governor's committee. The committee will meet again Jan. 29.

Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer, chairman of the committee, closed the opening session with a reminder that an attorney general's decision expected within the next two weeks might mean taxpayers would have to dig up about \$4 million to pay bills that have been prorated over the past four years.

Prorated in 1960 The welfare department, when it found it lacked funds to pay medical bills, began prorating the bills. The prorated system began with doctors and hospitals in 1960, and last November was extended to drugs.

Holmer said "if the attorney general finds the practice is illegal, it could cost the state \$2.7 million, and the counties \$1.1 million."

"The problem was accentuated by the Oct. 15 tax vote," Holmer added.

Gov. Mark Hatfield said "we have to live within our revenue, but we cannot deprive welfare recipients of adequate medical care. We must find an answer. We must find a program we can afford that will meet the needs."

Welfare Administrator Andrew Juras pointed out that almost \$26 million of his department's budget — more than half — was for medical payments.

Other States Cited He said California operated on an "open end budget" and had little control over medical welfare costs, while Washington was working with a \$35 million deficit. He said both states spent more on welfare than Oregon.

"I don't want an open end budget, or deficit financing," Juras said.

George Annala of Oregon Tax Research questioned whether it was proper to prorated medical payments while at the same time paying the full rate for other services.

Halfield suggested, "The doctors have not faced up to their job of setting standards. The doctors are highly individualistic and take different views."

Juras said he was concerned that welfare recipients sought more medical service than those who were not on welfare rolls and had to pay their own bills.

Smart cattlemen are going to grab the bull by the horns and his name will be "Certified Meat Sire."

Dean Frischknecht, Oregon State University livestock specialist, believes this is the kind of bull needed to produce top quality beef carcasses that will bring cattlemen more money.

Frischknecht will speak to cattlemen at Bend January 22 and at Redmond January 23 about producing profitable livestock. He will head a livestock management and marketing program to be presented on the Union Pacific agricultural car at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. The

car will be near the local depot at each stop.

Sheep numbers in the country are at a low level and Frischknecht recommends greater lamb production. Oregon has a surplus of lambs, most of which are shipped out of state. According to the American Sheep Producers council, per capita consumption of lamb is increasing.

Manning Becker, extension farm management specialist, will speak about "Livestock in the Farm Business."

Dick Wayman of Bend will speak at 2:15 p.m. at Bend and Redmond about gains he has made with production testing of beef on his ranch. Production testing includes keeping records of calf identity, weight and weaning condition.

County Agent Bob Sterling will speak about livestock opportunities in the county.

Two new Union Pacific movies will be shown by Dick Sneddon, the railroad's agricultural agent. They are "Green Mantle," about forage grasses, and "Making Hay," showing the latest methods of producing and handling hay.

Short course on livestock is underway

SPECIAL TO THE BULLETIN FORT ROCK — A livestock short course sponsored by the Extension Service and Fort Rock - Silver Lake Soil Conservation District opened today with a session at the Christmas Valley Recreation Hall.

Joe Wallace, Squaw Butte Experiment Station nutritionist was the leadoff man in the series. He reviewed nutritional needs of livestock and discussed ways to most efficiently provide for these needs.

With the second session due on January 17 ranchers will consider diseases and deficiencies. Dr. J. R. Haag, Oregon State University nutritionist and ag chemist, and Dr. Dean Smith of the OSU veterinary diagnostic lab will share the spotlight.

Dr. Haag will discuss Vitamin A deficiency diseases as they relate to vitamins and minerals. Smith will discuss scours, animal health problems associated with weaners and young calves, and give information on selecting pharmaceuticals in preventative medicine.

The third session of the short course will be held on January 23, spotlighting trends, problems and opportunities in financing the livestock business. A panel of bankers and ranchers will discuss financing problems and opportunities as they see them.

Opportunities for the future will be discussed at the final meeting, January 24, with John Landers, OSU extension livestock specialist reporting on new research findings and projecting some ideas for ranching in the future.

Each of the four meetings will begin at 1:30 p.m. at the Christmas Valley recreation hall. Oris Rudd, Lake county extension agent, is in charge.

Municipal Band practice called

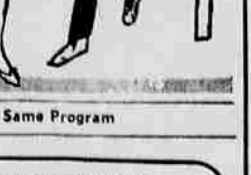
